

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Annual Report on the working of the Curzon Museum of Archaeology, Muttra, for the year ending 31st March, 1935

1. Committee of Management—The personnel of the Committee as reconstituted by virtue of Education Department notification no. 367/G, dated the 16th March, 1932, read with corrigendum no. 564/G, dated the 4th May, 1932, remained unaltered throughout the year.

One meeting of the Managing Committee was held during the year.

2. Working of the Museum—In February, 1935, the Chairman of the Committee, Mr. H. S. Ross, I.C.S., was transferred to Agra as Commissioner of the Division and the Committee was thus deprived of his valuable help. The Committee gratefully acknowledge the great interest evinced by him in the affairs of the Museum, partly as its Chairman, and partly as Commissioner and Controlling Authority. The Institution is greatly indebted to him. Since then Mr. W. F. G. Browne, I.C.S., has held the office of the Chairman of the Museum Committee.

Pandit Jagan Prasad Chaturvedi continued to work as Curator of the Museum in addition to his own duties throughout the year.

3. The grant for upkeep of the Museum during the financial year under report amounted to Rs.6,715.

4. Archaeology—Ten antiquities (nos. 2546 to 1555, Appendix A) were added to the Museum collection during the year. A terracotta rectangular plaque (measuring 5"×2½", Museum no. 2552) showing a male figure standing in a graceful attitude is one of the rarest

gems emanating from the skilled terracotta makers (Pusta-kāras) of the early Mathura School. It represents the Indian God of Love (अग्वान कामदेव or कुन्नानुष) elegantly dressed and tastefully decorated with ornaments and holding arrows in his right hand and a large bow in his left. The perfect workmanship is indicative of the high aesthetic skill of the Mathura clay-moulders. (Plate I). Another noteworthy piece represents the Child Nārāyana (Museum no. 2551) reclining and sucking the toe of his left foot, which is a famous subject of the Markandeya legends and is symbolical of Life floating on a leaf of the Cosmic Tree at the time of the Great Dissolution.

The Committee acknowledge with thanks the generous gift to the Museum of seven antiquities by Pandit Govind Charan (Agent of the Museum) and three by Pandit Narayan Prasad Sharma, Head Clerk, Kishori Raman High School, Muttra.

- 5. Library—Nineteen new books were added to the Museum Library (Appendix B). Of these eight were presented by Government and the rest were presented by the Mysore Government, the Superintendent, Archaeology, Gwalior, and the Varendra Research Society, Rajshahi, Bengal. To all of them the Committee wish to offer their very grateful thanks.
- 6. Museum Building—The building has been maintained in a fairly good condition throughout the year, but the demand to provide a suitable railing or enclosure wall round the Museum together with the laying of a pipe line to irrigate the lawns still continues to be very urgent.

The plans and estimates for the fencing were prepared by the Executive Engineer, Provincial Division, Agra, and submitted to Government early in February, 1935. Since then the project is awaiting sanction.

7. Visitors—The Institution on account of the richness of its art collections continues to grow in popularity and was able to attract a large number of eminent and distinguished visitors during the year.

The most important of them were His Excellency Sir Harry Haig, K.C.S.I., C.I.E., I.C.S., Governor of the United Provinces and Lady Haig. They were much pleased to see the collection and its display in the galleries.




