




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A PORTION OF THE HOYSALA SECTION OF THE NEWLY DESIGNED SCULPTURE GALLERY.

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ANNUAL REPORT ON THE WORKING OF THE MYSORE GOVERNMENT MUSEUM, BANGALORE DURING THE YEAR 1953-54.

General.—The Government Museum continued to attract visitors including many distinguished persons from all parts of India. As the present accommodation is too inadequate for undertaking expansion schemes in respect of various sections, the Government Architect has been requested to send up estimates for expanding the existing building with additional structures of latest designs. Proposals have also been submitted to Government to reconstitute the Museum Advisory Committee for reviewing the progress so far made and for making suggestions and recommendations for reorganising the Museum on modern lines.

Galleries.—The Sculptures which were lent to the Royal Academy of Indian Arts for exhibition at London have since been received back and the same are now erected on decent pedestals along with the other sculptures in the newly designed sculpture gallery.

In order to avoid congestion, proper arrangements were made for easy movement of visitors in the gallery by introducing one way arrangement.

Arrangements are being made to secure portraits of National leaders for installation in the Museum.

Proposal to instal a Neon Sign Board in front of the Museum building with the word "MUSEUM" is under the consideration of Government.

List of new specimens acquired during the year under report is furnished in Appendix 'A' while the list of books added to the Library is furnished in Appendix 'B'.

Zoology.—New labels are being introduced in the section of Zoology. Action is being taken to acquire fresh specimens of birds and mammals and many taxidermists in and outside the State have been addressed in the matter.

Archæology.—Instructive and Educative descriptive labels have been introduced to facilitate the visitors to get acquainted with Archæology and Archæological specimens. This has proved to be successful.

At the request of the Director of Archæology in Mysore, the Bronze images which were recently acquired from the Bhoganandesvara Temple, Nandi, were sent to the Department of Archæology, Mysore, for study and publication.

Sculpture Gallery.—Consequent on the erection of the sculptures on decent pedestals, the sculpture gallery has become very attractive and popular. The Dravidian sculptures which were lent to the Royal Academy of Arts for exhibition at London and which have since been received back have also been erected in the Sculpture gallery. The component parts of the Hoysala temple and many other sculptures of excellent workmanship which are installed in the "Hoysala Section" of the Gallery give a vivid idea of art and Architectural perfection attained during the Hoysala period in the State of Mysore.

Numismatics — Two silver coins were presented to the Museum by the Ministry of Education, Government of India. Action is being taken to purchase a specially manufactured Iron safe for the preservation of the valuable collection of Coins.

Restoration and Cleaning.—As usual all the specimens were cleaned and rectified spirit specimens were renewed with fresh spirit wherever necessary.

Educational Work.—Gellery talks to the School children are being continued as usual. Seven thousand one hundred and forty-five students, accompanied by 237 teachers from 173 educational institutions from Bangalore and other parts of India were given facilities to visit the institution and go round the gallery.

The Curator was deputed to attend the annual meeting of the Museum Association of India held at Waltair during the last week of December 1953 and he also read a paper on "Industrial Museums". The Curator's visit to some of the North Indian Museums for study could not be undertaken for want of sufficient time.

Visitors.—Many distinguished visitors including Director General of Archæology in India and Dr. B. Chhabra, Government Epigraphist for Government of India visited the Museum. Besides, nearly 271, 598 visitors went round the galleries of the Museum during 1953-54.

Staff.—During June 1953, Sri K. Manickyam, B.Sc., was appointed as Curator. The Cottage Industries Museum which was hitherto under the administrative charge of the Curator was handed over to the Assistant Director of Industries and Commerce (Cottage Industries) in January 1954 as per the Office Memo No. B-34—52-53, dated 12th January 1954.

Library.—The book entitled "Epics, Myths and Legends of India" by P. Thomas was purchased and added to the Museum Library. The usual Journals and periodicals are being regularly subscribed and added on to the Library.

Maintenance.—The Annual budget grant for the upkeep of the institution was Rs. 12,900 and the actual expenditure amounted to Rs. 9,182-12-0. The savings which were surrendered to Government were due to the fact that purchases of certain specimens and other furniture required for the Museum could not be effected during the year as the same was under correspondence.

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


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
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
