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ANNUAL REPORT ON THE WORKING OF THE ARCHÆOLOGICAL MUSEUM, MATHURA, FOR THE YEAR ENDING MARCH-31, 1952

The amount

1. Managing Committee—There was no charge in the personnel of the Managing Committee of the Museum, reconstituted under G. O. no. A-2-1158/XV-960-48, dated May 6, 1950, read with G. O. no. A-2-8569/XV-960-48, dated March 21, 1951.

No meeting of the Committee could be held during the year for want of funds to meet the Travelling Allowances of the members.

- 2. Administration—The office of the Chairman of the Managing Committee was held by Sri H. G. Misra throughout the year.
- Sri K. D. Bajpai, M.A., worked as Curator from April 1 to May 8, 1951. He handed over charge of the Museum to Sri J. P. Chaturvedi, Sub-Curator, on May 8, 1951 afternoon, vide notification no. A (2)-1384 (a) /XV-960-51, dated April 9, 1951 subsequent to his appointment as Archæological Officer, U. P.

By virtue of G. O. no. A-2-3680/XV-609 (6)-51, dated August 21, 1951, Government was pleased to appoint Sri Chaturvedi as Officiating Curator of the Museum with effect from May 9, 1951, till further orders. Sri Chaturvedi worked as Curator in addition to his own duties from May 9, 1951 to March 31, 1952.

3. Finances—The Government grant for the year was spent under various heads as follows:

The amount realized as sale-proceeds of above was credited into the local Government Treasury under the head "XLV-Printing and Stationery, U. P., Acts and other Books".

(b) Sale of Grass and Flowers

The amount of Rs.105 realized as sale of grass and flowers in the Museum Compound during the year was deposited into the Government Treasury, Mathura, under the head "XXXVI-Miscellaneous Department, Museum Receipts".

- 4. Acquisition—(a) Sculptures, etc.—During the year eighteen antiquities (Museum Register no. 3603 to 3620) mostly consisting of stone sculptures and terracottas were added to the Museum. The following deserve special notice:
 - No. 3603. Upper part of a terracotta female figure. Her head-dress is of special interest. She wears heavy ornaments. Red clay. Late Sunga Period.
 - No. 3607. Architectural piece with a chaitya window in the centre.

 A female face is carved inside this window with the hair arranged very tastefully in curly fashion. Red sandstone.

 Gupta Period.
 - No. 3608. Lower part of a female figure wearing dhoti and four-fold mekhala. There are trivali marks on the waist. Red sandstone. Gupta Period.
 - No. 3612. Part of a cross-bar carved on both sides. On one side is seen a double-humped camel having parts of the mouth, neck and feet broken. There is a tree behind. On the reverse is a bull, partly damaged. Between its horns and the coiled circular tail there is a full blown flower. Red sandstone. Sunga Period.
 - No. 3615. Headless seated Buddha with ubhayamsika drapery.

 On the pedestal is shown a Bodhisattva in the centre, being adored by two devotees on each side. There is a Brahmi inscription of one line over the upper rim of the pedestal. Red sandstone. Kushana.
 - No. 3615. Grotesque head probably of a gana or yaksha. Black clay. Kushana.
 - No. 3616. Terracotta mithuna wearing heavy ornaments. Beautiful figure of Sunga Period.
- (b) Coins-In all 366 new coins were added to the Museum Coins-Cabinet. They consisted of one gold coin of Chandragupta I (King and Queen type, well-preserved), one silver, and 364 copper coins.

- 5. Arrangement—The important pieces, out of the antiquities acquired during the year, were suitably mounted and exhibited in the galleries. Slight changes were also made in the arrangement of the Gupta gallery of the Museum.
- 6. Educational activities—As usual, the students of local and outside educational institutions visited this Museum. They were taken round the galleries by the Officiating Curator, Sri Chaturvedi, and were explained the local history and significance of the antiquities displayed therein. Members of Foreign Embassies stationed at New Delhi took keen interest in this Museum. A number of photographs of important antiquities and estampages of inscriptions were supplied to the scholars and institutions.
- Library—Besides the subscribed journals and periodicals, 64 new books dealing with Art, History and Archæology were added to the Museum Library.
- 8. Museum Building and Gardey -Investigations to the cracks in the walls of the buildings were continued by the P. W. D. during the year.

Museum lawns and gardens were maintained in a neat and tidy condition. Several new flower plants were planted and the lawn in the western side of the Museum building was improved.

- 9. Visitors—During the year under report the Museum, as usual, attracted a large number of visitors from India and abroad.
- H. E. Sri H. P. Mody, Governor of Uttar Pradesh, accompanied by Mrs. Modi and his personal staff, graced this Museum by their visit on November 12, 1951. Sri Chaturvedi took them round the galleries and explained some of the oldest and valuable exhibits. His Excellency was kind enough not only to appreciate his enthusiasm and keenness in his work, but also admired very much the building, good lighting-arrangement and excellent display of the antiquities.
