The usual recurring grant of Rs.1,500 for maintenance and repairs to the museum buildings was reduced this year to Rs.700 only.

Generally the amount for maintenance and repairs to the Government buildings is calculated by the P. W. D. at the rate of one per cent of the total cost of the building. Taking into consideration the total cost of the Museum building, which is over Rs.1,60,000, a sum of Rs.700 is quite insufficient and it is not possible to maintain properly the main Museum building and its out houses with a petty amount of Rs.700 per year.

- 4. Acquisition—(a) Sculptures, etc.—During the year twenty-seven antiquities (Museum Register nos. 3621 to 3647) consisting of sculptures and terracottas were acquired for the Museum. The following of them deserve special notice:
 - (1) A male figure (no. 3624) wearing coat and trousers as found on Saka figures. He holds a horn (Turhi) with both hands.

 This is a very interesting piece of red sandstone. Kushana Period.
- shown five winged lion figures in motion. The reverse is more interesting. Worship of Buddha is shown here by celestial beings carrying flowers, garlands, etc. This piece is full of life and action and ranks among the first rate lintels of the early Kushana Period.
 - (3) Upper part of a female figure (no. 3632) with tastefully arranged coiffure. The usual Sunga ornaments are also there.
 - (4) Beautifully carved head (no. 3638) of a girl. The hair is artistically arranged, first parted in the middle and then tied on the back in the shape of a heavy coiffure.
 - (5) Terracotta Mother and Child (no. 3637). The mother wears round ear-rings and heavy torque. She held a pot in her right hand.
 - (6) Beautiful head (no. 3642) of Parvati. The headdress is elaborate. The skul over the head is remarkable. Late Gupta.
 - (7) Female bust (no. 3643) probably of Hariti. The right hand was held in the abhayamudra. The armlets here are of special interest.
- (b) Coins—In all 390 coins were added to the Museum Coin Cabinet, They included 200 punch-marked silver coins and 190 copper coins.
- 5. Arrangement—Nearly all the new antiquities were suitably mounted and the important ones were exhibited in the galleries. Slight changes were made in the arrangement of heads displayed in Bay no. 1. Most of the old and faded labels were renewed.
- 6. Educational activities—This Museum, as usual, attracted a large number of students and scholars interested in Indian Art, History, and Archæology. Students of the local and outside educational institutions and military soldiers of Mathura Cantonment visited the Museum. They were taken round the galleries in batches by the Curator and were explained the

significance of the antiquities displayed therein. Members of the Foreign Embassies, stationed at the capital of India, evinced keen interest in the Museum and they were specially attended to by Sri Chaturvedi. The photographs of important sculptures and estampages of inscriptions were supplied to scholars and institutions.

- 7. Library-Besides the journals and periodicals, thirty-five new books on Indian Art, History and Archæology were added to the Museum Reference Library.
- 8. Museum Building and Garden—The experiment of examining the cracks in the walls of the Museum building was continued by the P. W. D. The cement till-tales were replaced by glass ones this year to see the development of the cracks. The final report of the P. W. D. in this respect, still remains to be submitted to Government.

The garden and lawns were sufficiently improved this year. They were kept in a neat and tidy condition. Some new trees were also planted during the rains. Necessary changes in the inner courtyard of the Museum were also made.

The Bharatpur Mound, locally known as Hariparvat, lying to the west of the Museum building, was acquired this year by Land Acquisition and a long-felt want was thus removed. Adequate steps are to be taken now to get the site properly levelled and cleaned. It is hoped that Government will be pleased to allot funds for levelling and enclosing of the mound before construction of the proposed blocks is undertaken.
