3. Acquisitions—(a) Sculptures, etc.—During the year 107 antiquities (Museum Register no. 3795 to 3901) consisting of stone sculptures, architectural pieces, inscriptions, terracottas, clay sealings, pottery and bronzes

were added to the Museum collection. They include 38 articles presented by Sri Krishna Janmabhumi Trust and 12 by Sri Radha Raman, Saraf of Chowk Bazar, Mathura.

The following deserve special notice:

- No. 3799. Part of a terracotta clay cart nicely carved. The two sides bear flower and leaf patterns. In the centre is seated a male figure, probably the driver who holds a staff in right hand. His head is covered. Red clay. Sunga period.
- No. 5810. Salabhanjika female figure standing under an Asoka tree. The hands and the lower portion of feet are broken. The figure is exquisitely carved and wears dhoti and a scarf flowing over the shoulders. She also wears five-beaded mekhala, neck-lace, ear-pendants and ornaments of the fore-head. Her hair is tastefully arranged. Gupta period.
- No. 3867. Vishnu in his Virata form. Various gods in different poses are shown in the fragment. Gupta period.
- No. 3862. Brick-panel showing in relief an interesting scene. A lady is riding a ram. The animal is running fast. The rider is holding the tail of the animal in her right hand, while her felt hand rests on the neck of the ram. The head and part of the right leg of the lady are damaged. Red clay. Gupta period.
- No. 3874. Image of Kubera. The front is badly damaged. But the back is well-preserved. The heavy torque, scarf and the other details resemble with the figure no. C.3 already in the Mathura Museum. Red sandstone. Kushana.
- No. 3876. Staircase railing pillar showing the Buddha in abhayamudra. The Buddha stands on a full blown lotus. There is a lotus bud between his two legs. Over the head is a parasol and at the bottom is shown a railing. The face of Buddha and the right hand are damaged. Red sandstone. Kushana period.
- No. 3880. Terracotta object showing a female riding over a potbellied man. The lady wears a number of ornaments and holds some indistinct object in hands. The man below is giving her support with his hands. Black clay. Late Sunga period.
- No. 3892. Lower part of a terracotta image of Vasudhara. The goddess is holding her girdle with the left hand. Below her right hand is seen a pair of fish. Red clay. Sunga period.

- No. 3901. Terracotta elephant of large size. The tusks and part of the trunk are broken. The legs are also partly damaged. The front of the animal is adorned with garlands, one on each side. The figure was polished, traces of which are visible. Black clay. Maurya period.
- (b) Coins—In all 753 new coins were added to the Museum Coin Cabinet. They include a lot of 354 copper coins of the Kushana Emperors of Mathura.
- 4. Arrangement—The important antiquities acquired during the year were, after cleaning and mounting on wooden pedestals, displayed in the museum galleries. The exhibited objects were provided with descriptive labels both in English and Hindi.
- 5. Educational activities—As desired by the Government of India, 12 Buddhist sculptures of the Kushana period were sent from this Museum to Rangoon for the Exhibition of the Buddhist Art organized in Rangoon in connection with the Conference of the World Fellowship of Buddhists. The sculptures were much appreciated by a large number of visitors. All the 12 pieces have since been received back safely.

Photographs of important Mathura antiquities were supplied to scholars and institutions in India and abroad for study and publication.

 Research and Publications—A number of research articles were contributed by the Curator to the leading Journals and Periodicals in Hindi and English. He also broadcast several talks from the Delhi and Lucknow stations of the All-India Radio.

The ilustrated brochure Yuga Yugon Men Uttar Pradesh, written by the undersigned was sent to the press and its final proofs were seen. The book deals with the history of Uttar Pradesh in a chronological order and describes in detail all the important historical and cultural centres in U. P. As the first publication of its kind, the publication will remove a long-felt want.

Another book Braja Ka Itihasa (290 pages) written by the Curator, Sri Bajpai, was published during the year. It is a comprehensive history of the Mathura region covering the period from the pre-historic times to the present day.

- Library—During the year 65 new books on Art, History and Archæology were added to the Museum Library in addition to the important journals and periodicals.
- 7. Building-The Museum buildings, lawns and gardens, were maintained in a neat and tidy condition, as usual.
- 8. Visitors—The Museum attracted a large number of visitors and tourists from India and abroad. The batches of students from local and outside educational institutions were taken round the galleries by the Curator, and the Sub-Curator. The foreign diplomats stationed at the

capital of India took keen interest in this Museum. They were provided all facilities in the Museum. Those who desired were taken round the ancient sites in Mathura.

The Rajyapal of Uttar Pradesh, Sri K. M. Munshi, accompanied by Diwan Bahadur Sri K. M. Jhaveri, Chairman of the Board of Trustees, Prince of Wales Museum, Bombay, graced this Museum by their visit on March 20, 1955. They were taken round the galleries by the Curator. The new additions in the galleries were highly appreciated by the Rajyapal, who also discussed with the Curator about the development of Indian Art.






