



SIR,

I have the honor to forward herewith the report on the working of the Government Museum for the year 1933-34.

- 2. Personnel. -Government having, in their Order No. E. 1513-16-G. G. 17-33-1, dated 31st October 1933, transferred the administration of the Government Museum to the Director of Industries and Commerce, Mr. A. V. Ramanathan, Director of Industries and Commerce, took charge of the Museum on the 9th December 1933, from Mr. H. C. Javaraya, Superintendent, Government Gardens, who continued as Superintendent, Government Museum, until that date.
- Visitors.-The number of visitors to the Museum during the year under report, was 265,646 of whom 150,927 were males, 113,976 were females and 743 were school-children.

Thirteen thousand, seven hundred and twenty-six or five per cent of the total

number of visitors wrote their names in the Visitors' sheets.

As usual, there were large crowds on 'Karaga' and on some of the local feasts and festivals. (Classified details are furnished in Appendix A.)

Collections.—The collections were kept in good condition and 121 exhibits

were added during the year. (Detailed list is furnished in Appendix B.)

During the year under report, a Circular Memorandum was issued by Government pointing out to the Deputy Commissioners and Heads of Departments that with their co-operation it should be easy to collect specimens and to augment the exhibits in the Museum at a relatively low cost.

5. Library. - The accessions to the Library during the year were 25 Departmental and other Museum Reports and Parts of Vols. 34 & 35 of the Records of the Indian Museum.

The Museum Journal and the Journal of the Bombay Natural History Society were continued to be subscribed. (Details are furnished in Appendix C.)

Fittings, Furniture, etc.—The showcases and other pieces of furniture were kept in good condition. Two teakwood glass showcases and 17 teakwood picture frames were added to the stock during the year.

- 7. Building.—During the year, portions of the interior of the building were whitewashed and the doors and windows were painted. A galvanised pipe ladder was fixed on the northern room to give access to the roof of the building.
- Stock Books.—The General Stock Register, Register of Exhibits and Furniture and other Books of the Institution were written up-to-date.
- 9. Maintenance.—The Government Grant for the maintenance of the Museum for 1933-34 was Rs. 4,930 and the expenditure amounted to Rs. 4,549-15-0, (Details are furnished in Appendix D.)





SIR,

I have the honor to forward herewith the report on the working of the Government Museum for the year 1934-35.

2. Visitors.—During the year under report the Museum was visited by 2,70,725 persons as against 2,65,646 in the previous year. Of this number 1,54,021 were males, 1,14,513 females and 2,191 School Children.

Twelve thousand six hundred and eighty-three or about 4 per cent of the total number wrote their names in the Visitors' Sheets. As usual there were large crowds during 'Karaga' and on some of the local feasts and festivals. (Classified list furnished in Appendix A.)

3. Building.—The Building was maintained in good condition and its annual repairs and maintenance were carried out by the Public Works Department. The Building is not provided with any lights and the need for them is felt specially on cloudy and rainy days.

4. Collection.—Four hundred and thirteen exhibits were added during the year, the majority of them being Entomological specimens received from the Agricultural Department. (Details are furnished in Appendix B.)

An attempt has been made to give an idea of the natural surroundings of the individual exhibits by means of pictures and photos put above the exhibits.

5. Library.—The additions during the year were 18 Departmental and other Museum Reports. The Museums Journal and the Journal of the Bombay Natural History Society were continued to be subscribed for. (List furnished in Appendix C.)

6. Fittings Furniture, etc.—Two showcases were provided with teakwood vertical frames for putting in pictures, and three cases were provided with sliding plywood shutters to prevent direct sun-light falling on Butterflies and other insect specimens in them. The numbers on some of the pieces of furniture and showcases were repainted and the names in English and Kannada of the wood were painted on the specimens.

7. Stock Books.—The General Stock Register, Register of Exhibits and furniture and other books of the Institution were written up-to-date.

8. Maintenance.—The Government grant for the maintenance of the Museum for the year 1934-35 was Rs. 4,430 and the expenditure amounted to Rs. 3,848-3-0. (Details are furnished in Appendix D.)





SIR.

I have the honour to forward herewith the report on the working of the

Government Museum for the year 1936-37.

Visitors. During the year under report the Museum was visited by 2,99,656 persons as against 2,66,963 in the previous year. Of the total number of visitors 1,73,723 were males, 1,23,440 females and 2,493 school children. With a view to have an idea of the number of school children making use of the institution, a separate register was opened for census of visitors from educational institutions. The number of such visitors was 2,493.

Sixteen thousand, six hundred and ninety-seven or five per cent of the

total number of visitors wrote their names in the visitors' book.

As usual there were large crowds during "Karaga" and on some of the local

festival days. Details are furnished in Appendix A.

Building .- The building remained in good condition throughout the year under report. A burglary occurred on the night of 25th December 1936 when some unknown persons scaled into the Museum through a window, broke open a showcase in the Central Hall and removed imitation jewellery worth about Rs. 40. The Public Works Department have since got the windows properly secured.

Galleries .- The collection of specimens on the whole are in good condition, except in the Zoological Section where many of the specimens are old and in need

of renewal.

Fourteen new specimens under the following heads were added during the

Zoology .- A collection of shells, a monstrous chicken and a partridge, all acquired by presentation. A parrot, a pitta and a skeleton of a pigeon were purchased for display in the

Bird gallery. A tree snake and a tortoise mounted on teakwood stand were added to the

reptile collection. Numismatics.-Three silver coins* were presented to the Museum by the Director of Industries and Commerce, Central Provinces. Two copper coins, one of the Bahmani King Mahomed Shah and the other belonging to the Mahomedan period in Mysore were acquired through the Government of Mysore. A copper coin of Krishnaraja Wadiyar III presented by the watchman, Cubbon Park, was also added to the collection. Details are in Appendix B.

Restoration and Preservation .- As most of the mammal heads are old and deteriorating, it was thought desirable to repair and renovate them. As a trial, a

pair of heads (of a gazelle and a jungle sheep) were repaired.

In the Archæological Section, all the historical pictures of views in and around Bangalore were cleaned, re-backed and made insect-proof. As usual, the cleaning and arranging of exhibits in the show-cases wherever necessary were attended to.

Library.—The additions consisted mainly of Departmental publications and

reports of other Museums and bulletins (Appendix C.).

Maintenance.—The Government grant for the up-keep of the institution was Rs. 4,050 and the expenditure amounted to Rs. 4,220-10-3. The statement of receipts and expenditure is furnished in Appendix D.

Stock Books.—The General Stock Register, Register of Exhibits and Furniture

and other books of the institution were written up-to-date.

Educational Work.—Arrangements are being made with the co-operation of the Educational authorities to organise popular lectures with reference to exhibits,

for the benefit of students from the Primary Schools in Bangalore City,

Report of the Museums Association Commission.—The Official Report of
S. F. Markham, Esq., M.A., B.Litt., M.P., Empire Secretary, Museums Association
and Mr. H. Hargreaves, Retired Director-General of Archæology in India, who had been deputed to make a survey of the Museums in India, has been published. They observe that the local Museum calls for re-organisation urgently and have made some interesting remarks about certain important features of the institution. They have observed that the Geological collection has been carefully labelled and have commended the display of wooden relief models of the Fort of Seringapatam as it stood in 1800 and the Hulikere Tunnel Area. The analysis of visitors published as an appendix to the annual report of the Museum is pronounced to be instructive. The reference library attached to the institution has also come in for an approbative comment.

Staff. - The Probationer, Mr. K. Narayana Iyengar, M.A., was deputed to the Government Museum at Madras for a period of three months to acquaint himself with the methods of Museum work. On his return, he was appointed Curator in succession to Mr. K. Anantasamy Rao who retired from service with effect from 1st

December 1936.

Committee appointed to suggest measures for the re-organisation of the Museum. They have decided that the Historical and Art collections should be maintained in the Bangalore Museum along with the Industrial and Scientific Section. The question of providing additional accommo-

dation is also under consideration. An Advisory Committee with the marginally noted personnel has been constituted to advise the Director of Industries and Commerce in matters pertaining to equipment, selection and purchase of specimens and their proper display in the Museum,





SIR,

I have the honour to forward herewith the report on the working of the Mysore Government Museum for the year 1937-38.

Museum Advisory Committee.—During the year, the Government passed orders on the report of the Committee appointed to suggest measures for the improvement of the Museum. A Committee was constituted by Government to advise the Director of Industries and Commerce in matters relating to equipment, selection and purchase of specimens and their proper display in the Museum. The Committee met four times during the year and in pursuance of their recommendations action has been taken to carry out a thorough scrutiny of the specimens and other materials exhibited in the Museum resulting in the elimination of unnecessary specimens, renewals wherever necessary and rearrangement and labelling of the specimens. In view of the limited space available it was considered necessary to confine the scope of the Museum primarily, to local specimens, exceptions being made in the case of specimens useful from the point of view of comparative study.

Galleries.—The condition of specimens is generally satisfactory except in the Zoological gallery where many specimens have shown signs of deterioration. The question of improving this has been taken up. With the kind co-operation of the various scientific departments of Government and the University, the work of elimination of un-necessary specimens as also the renewal and re-arrangement of exhibits in the various sections has been started. A detailed statement of new specimens acquired during the year is furnished in Appendix A.

Zoology.—A new line of work undertaken during the year was the collection of fresh water fishes and other specimens of interest of the 'Malnad' parts in the State. The specimens acquired are being indentified and will thereafter be mounted and suitably displayed.

A trap-door-spider, a pair of wild boar tusks and three shells were added to the collection.

Botany.—With a view to affording opportunities for the students of Primary and Secondary classes in the Bangalore City and the lay visitors to acquire some knowledge of systematic Botany, it has been decided to exhibit specimens illustrating the evolution of plant life. Necessary equipment for the purpose was purchased during the year.

Archæology.—The photographic views of Mysore Architecture and Sculpture that had become foxy and worn-out have been replaced by a fresh set of thirty-two views properly mounted and framed. An interesting chart of the Kannada Alphabet showing the different stages of its evolution, from the ancient 'Bramhi' to

the modern Kannada script was acquired. A map of 'Karnataka' the area inhabited by the Kannada speaking people, an evolution tree of Indian languages and an enlarged photographic copy of the Asokan inscription at Bramhagiri (Molakalmuru Taluk, Mysore State), were also got prepared.

A representative collection of electrotype casts of 'Mysore Coins' is ready for

display.

Agriculture.—Receptacles necessary for the preservation of specimens relating to the Botanical, Chemical and Mycological sections as also the Serum Institute have been purchased. The re-arrangement of the untomological section on educative lines has been completed, the collection consisting of local plant and fruit pests and other insects. Samples of varieties of Mysore Coffee, Arecanut, Cardamom and Pepper have been received. A cabinet containing samples of wool from the various parts of the State has also been acquired. It is proposed to display miniature models of tobacco curing barns, specimens of graded and re-dried tobacco leaves, and cigarettes made out of Mysore tobacco. A crop map of Mysore is under preparation.

Geology.—The future scope of the section has been defined. The elimination of the entire fossil collection which is foreign and of other specimens of minerals and rocks of non-Mysorean origin was decided upon. Polished cubes and paper weights of local varieties of ornamental and building stones have been prepared. Specimens of cut and polished gem stones of local origin are ready. A Flow Chart showing the details of operations of the Mysore Iron and Steel Works, Bhadravati, was got made and suitably framed and exhibited. Half a dozen photographic views of the different sections of the works have been got enlarged, to be displayed along with the flow chart. Three geological maps of Mysore, one of Southern India and a diagram of a geologic clock were also mounted and framed.

Health Section.—A set of nineteen posters on health subjects published by the Department of Public Health, Mysore, have been suitably got up for exhibition. Descriptive bilingual labels in English and Kannada for the other specimens in the section were prepared. The preparation of two wooden models of sanitary houses, one of the 'malnad' and the other of the 'maidan' types is complete.

Forest.—The renewal and re-arrangement of specimens of medicinal products of the Museum which formed the programme of work for the year, could not be undertaken as the necessary equipment was not received in time.

Industries and Industrial Art.—As a first step in the improvement of this section the renewal of old and worn out specimens now on show has been taken on hand. Samples of cotton and wollen fabries and a woollen pile carpet depicting a natural scene, both woven at the Government Weaving Institute and a collection of silk bodice cloths with lace border and of up-to-date designs were added to the collection.

The Sericultural exhibits as now arranged illustrate the history of the industry from the egg of the silk worm to the finished products of the Factory. The receipt of specimens of waste and spun silk from the Mysore Spun Silk Mills, Ltd., Channapatna, is awaited.

A complete set of wooden models of indigenous fruits and vegetables made at the Government Industrial School, Channapatna were acquired.

Some objects of inlaid work of new designs and carvings in ivory, all of local handiwork were added by purchase. Amin-ul-mulk Sir Mirza M. Ismail, K.C.I.E., o.B.E., the Dewan of Mysore, was graciously pleased to present the Museum with a beautifully carved sandalwood casket with an attachment of the first electric lamp manufactured in the State.

Educational Work—An important feature of the activities of the Museum during the year was the establishment of contact with the local educational institutions. With the co-operation of the School Board Officer, City Municipal area, Bangalore, a course of lectures in Kannada on the history, fauna, flora and industries of Mysore, with reference to exhibits in the Museum, were delivered to students of the IV-year Primary classes on Sunday mornings. Another course of general guide lectures was arranged for the benefit of students from one of the High Schools in Bangalore City, who were taken round in batches. These courses of instruction have become popular and both the students and teachers have appreciated

them. A total number of 3,059 pupils belonging to sixty-nine schools of Bangalore and suburbs were thus shown round the Museum during the year. Details of work done in this direction are given in Appendix B.

Restoration and Preservation.—In the armoury section, a field gun, whose wheels had been badly affected by weathering, was got repaired. Four mammal heads (of a jungle sheep, a jungle goat, a wild boar and a sow) were renovated. The usual cleaning of exhibits in the show-cases was attended to.

Library.—The additions to the Library consisted mainly of Departmental publications, reports and bulletins of other Museums, received either through exchange or presentation. Three other books useful for reference were purchased

vide Appendix C.

Building.—The building remained in good condition throughout the year. The Department of Public Works got the windows fitted with expanded metal sheets and attended to other minor repairs. It is very necessary to improve the lighting of the central hall. A separate work and store-room for the Museum has been a long felt want. Plans for the extensions to the Museum building were received from the Government Architect and returned countersigned. The necessity for increased accommodation is keenly felt.

Visitors.—During the year under report, 302,487 persons visited the Museum as against 299,654 of the previous year. The number of school children visiting the institution rose from 2,493 to 3,059. As usual there were large crowds during 'Karaga' and on some of the local festival days. Details are furnished in

Appendix D.

The register of visitors from educational institutions has been serving a useful purpose in-as-much as it reveals an interesting record of the names of the institutions and the number of students both local and from outside making use of the Museum. On the whole the popularity of the Museum especially with the students has been increasing. But the problem still remains as to how the illiterate visitors that throng in considerable numbers should be made to appreciate the educational value of the exhibits. The Indian Museums Conference held in December 1937 at New Delhi, after due consideration of this question was of the opinion that "since the majority of persons visiting the Museum are illiterate, and can, therefore, best be reached through exhibits explained by the spoken word it is essential that special guide lecturers should be provided". The question of arranging for such guide lectures is under examination and proposals will be submitted to Government in due course.

Stock Books. - The General Register, Register of Exhibits and Furniture and other books of the institution have been written up-to-date.

Staff.—The work of the staff was satisfactory.

Maintenance. The Government grant for the up-keep of the institution was Rs. 5,514 and the expenditure amounted to Rs. 5,385-7-9. (Details are furnished in Appendix E.)
