





REVIEW THEREON.—The total number of visitors to the Museum during the official year 1887—88 was 195,118 or 11,489 less than in 1886—87

- The need of a qualified Taxidermist is much felt by Mr. Cameron. But it is observed that the salary of the present incumbent is sufficient to permit of the appointment of a professional Artist.
- 3. A collection of specimens of silk-worms indigenous to Mysore was sent to the Indian Museum, Calcutta.
- 4. One of the special subjects which engaged the attention of Mr. Cameron and Captain R. H. Tufuell was the acquisition of coins. The collection especially of purely Mysore coins received numerous additions during the year under review.
- 5. There is a public free library attached to the Museum containing 702 volumes.
- 6. The most important contributions to the Museum by the public during the year 1887—88 consisted of specimens of coins, a statue of Nammalvar and stuffed birds. In addition to this the Taxidermist personally collected a large number of birds.
- 7. The cost of the Museum during the year under review was Rs. 2,628—7—0 as against Rs. 2,762—0—0 in 1886—87.

# R. VIJAYINDRA RAO, Esq., Chief Secretary to the Dewan of Mysore.

Sir,

I have the honor to submit the Annual Report on the progress and condition of the Museum for the year ending 31st March 1888.

- 2. Statistics of Visitors.—The total number of visitors to the institution was 195,118 being 11,489 less than attended last year and 102,562 below the average of the past five years. Male visitors (men and boys) were in the proportion of 63·15 per cent of the whole against a percentage of 61·94 in the previous year. Female visitors, on the other hand, showed a slight falling off, the attendance being in the proportion of 36·84 per cent, against 48·03 pinc 1886—87. Of the whole, 23·06 per cent signed the visitors book, whereas in the previous year only 21·65 per cent were able to sign. The greatest attendance on any single day was 2,992 (on Vijaya Dasami), but although the building was then crowded to excess, perfect order prevailed, and I am glad to report that whatever slight damage occurred was entirely the result of accident. As regards the apparent falling off in attendance, I am still of opinion that it is chiefly due to a more careful system of registration. The institution was honored by a visit from His Highness the Maharaja and family.
- 3. Condition of the Building.—The Executive Engineer has supplied new coir matting to the floor, and, excepting the doors and windows which would be improved by a fresh coat of paint, the building is in good repair. But there is a general feeling that the ground floor is insufficiently lighted to display the specimens to advantage and make reference easy. This difficulty should not be experienced in a Museum and I shall be thankful if Government will draw attention to the defect and have it remedied. At the same time, I may add that a glary light would be objectionable, especially where perishable articles are preserved.
- 4. Furniture.—The staircase landing, where the mammals are preserved, has been neatly furnished by a set of eight wall cases of an uniform pattern. A plan and estimate for these was prepared in the office of the Executive Engineer, but the workmanship was carried out by Mr. Seymour at slightly reduced rates, the full cost being Rs. 734. This protection was much needed, as the specimens suffered both from the effects of exposure and the handling of nearly every school boy who passed. Suitable accommodation is now provided for a fair collection of mammals. A few exhibition cases were made up on trial, and being found admirably adapted for the display of jewelry and artware, a full set of these will be placed in the central hall of the Museum.
- 5. Mammals and Birds.—The collection of mammals has always been wretched and, as far as I can see at present, there are only two courses open for its real improvement i. e. to purchase specimens from a professional taxidermist (and there are very few of such profession in South India) or offer such emolument for this important office as will secure the permanent or temporary services of an experienced artist. The present incumbent can set up small specimens passably well, but beyond that he is quite incompetent, as the greater part of our collection will testify. Of mammals the best specimens have been preserved under glass, while the most objectionable have been destroyed. A good number of birds were set up to replace old specimens.

- on the Districts and prepare for despatch to the Indian Museum, through the British Resident, an illustrative collection of the silkworms of the Province. With the exception of a very few cocons of the Tusser and Atlas moths submitted by the Deputy Commissioner of this District, and collected at Gotagherry by one of my men, the whole collection consisted of specimens (at various stages of growth) of the domesticated silkworm, Bombyx mari. It is well known, however, that other species of silkworm are indigenous to Mysore, and it is of them especially that fuller information is needed. Of the wild forms, the Tusser worm (Antherea myllita) is at present the most important, as the demand for Tusser silk is rapidly increasing in France and other countries. Experiments conducted by Mr. Wardle of Leek, and other gentlemen interested in the advancement of Sericiculture, have thrown a new light on the value of the industry, and by the aid of improved reeling machinery and new inventions in coloring, a hopeful future is realized for the manufacture of Tusser silk. The Tusser and Atlas worms are not uncommon here and I have ascertained from several sources that they feed (the Tusser especially) on the undernamed plants, most of which have been received for identification with the cocoons upon them:—
  - Dodonsea viscosa, Kanarese, Bundari, Hangare.
  - 2. Webera corymbosa, do Papadi, Petle.
  - 3. Shorea Talura, do Jalari.
  - 4. Terminalia arjuna, do Tore matti.
  - 5. Anogeissus latifolia, do Dindiga.
  - 6. Cipadessa fruticosa, do Chitundi.
  - 7. Canthium didynum, do Yediranake.
  - 8. Ocimum sp. do Kadu tulasi.
  - 9. A weed undetermined do Halay soppu.

It will be observed that these food plants are sufficiently plentiful here and only require to be condensed in some favorable locality to afford a suitable nursery for the cultivation of Tusser silk. As far as I have seen, the Atlas worm was only found (cocoons) upon Nos. 8 and 9, which are herbs. Specimens of the above named plants, as well as the insects with some of their workings, can be seen at the Museum. Mr. Wardle is of opinion that the success of this industry depends almost entirely on good reeling.

- Fibres.—Having been largely added to during the year, this collection is now a representative one of the raw material used for economic purposes in various parts of the world.
- 8. Gums and Resins.—As the climate of Mysore is said to be favorably adapted for the production of gums and resins, many of which are so useful, and even indispensable to the arts and manufactures, I have been anxious to learn more about these products; with this object I have placed myself in correspondence with Mr. David Hooper, Quinologist to the Government of Madras, and that gentleman has very kindly analysed the most of our specimens, in addition to drawing up a correct catalogue of the whole. While examining the gums, Mr. Hooper found one or two interesting kinds of which I expect to receive a fuller report in time.
- Herbarium.—The nucleus of a herbarium has been formed by the presentation, from the Botanical Gardens, of 303 named plants. A collection illustrative of the Flora of Mysore will be of much value to students and Botanists.
- 10. Sculpture and Antiquities.—The most important contributions to this section are only lent to the Museum, but I hope the contributors will finally be able to make them a permanent gift.

They are as follows :-

 Presented by Lewis Rice, Esq., c. I. E., Director of Archaeological Researches in Mysore, " a statue of Nammalvar seated in the mode called Padmasana expounding the Dravida Prabandha." This is a well preserved specimen from a ruined temple in the Nanjangud Taluk.

- Lent by Captain R. H. Campbell Tufnell, a collection of 17 stone implements from the Ceded Districts. These are very interesting and are mostly described, Captain Tufnell tells me, by Mr. Bruce Foote, F. G. S., in his "Notes on some recent Neolithic and Palæolithic Finds in South India."
- 11. Coins.—The improvement of this collection has received special attention and I am now led to believe that the Museum contains probably the finest known collection of purely Mysore coins. Since the appointment of Captain R. H. Campbell Tufnell to arrange and catalogue the latter, every effort has been made to secure the missing links of the different series; and that we have been so far successful in this work will be apparent when I state that the collection is already nearly doubled.

The total acquisitions numbered 338, of which 32 are gold, 39 silver and 267 copper. Of gold coins, 21 were purchased, 10 received from the Huzur Treasury and one obtained by exchange. Of silver coins, 23 were purchased, 12 received from the Huzur Treasury and 4 presented. Of copper coins, 175 were purchased, 75 presented, 15 received from the Huzur Treasury and 2 obtained by exchange.

Through the kind intercession of Captain Tufnell, a very rare battle-axe coin (copper) was presented by R. Sewell, Esq., M. c. s., of Cuddapah. District Officers are responding freely to my circular letter inviting their co-operation in the matter of collecting coins. Major A. H. Macintire, Deputy Commissioner of the Bangalore District, presented 35 coins chiefly from Central and Northern India. As there are still some important issues to be collected, Captain Tufnell is not hurrying the publication of his catalogue, he hopes, however, to have it out by the close of the current year. The full collection of issues of all states now stands as under—

12. Reading Room and Library.—The wing room formerly used as a store for rejected specimens and as a workshop for the taxidermist, has been cleared out, matted, and made into a nice little Reading Room where officials and others can consult the books in the collection. The Rules adopted for the guidance of readers are the same as prevail at the Central Museum, Madras, for which we are indebted to Dr. Thurston. This simple arrangement answers very well as far as it applies, but to make the Reading Room a perfect success we require a much larger assortment of books and periodicals.

Although the Library now contains 702 volumes, there is a decided want of variety in its composition. At the same time there are books in the collection that cannot be consulted elsewhere in Bangalore, and on these grounds, I think the public should have access to the Library through the medium of a Reading Room. The following periodicals are promised by Government:—

With a few more well selected journals, and a small yearly grant for the purchase of standard works, I am positive that the Reading Room would soon become popular. During the 4 months of its existence, 105 persons (chiefly officials and

senior students) have consulted various books. A. Narasimmaiengar, Esq., Superintendent of the Mysore Vernacular Press, has contributed a selection of 23 Kanarese books. The Library has also been enriched by a copy of Ibn Khallikan's Biographical Dictionary and a valuable work on Fossil Shells presented by Captain R. H. C. Tufnell.

- 13. Catalogue of Economic Products.—The Curator has drawn up a skeleton list which I hope to enlarge upon and have ready for publication within the year.
- 14. Establishment.—The permanent staff remains unchanged, but a peon has been temperarily employed to take charge of the Reading Room, his wages being met from the contingent grant. I am glad to report that the Curator, Mr. B. Santappa, has, as usual, been assiduous to his duties.





SIR,

I have the honor to submit the Annual Report on the progress and condition of the Government Museum for the year ending 31st March 1889.

- 2. Statistics of Visitors.—During the year the Institution was visited by 194,664 persons, being 454 under the aggregate attendance of the previous year and 34,819 below the average of the past five years. Male visitors-men and boyswere in the proportion to the whole of 63.51 per cent against 63.15 per cent in the preceding year. Female visitors were in the proportion of 36.48 per cent against 36.84 per cent in 1887-88. Of the total number, male and female, 23.76 per cent or a little more than it signed the Visitors' book; the signatures in the previous year being in the proportion of 23.06 per cent. The greatest attendance in a single day-during the Dasara-was 4,441 and the smallest during the same period, 108. This continuous stream of visitors, representing all classes of people, indicates the value of public institutions such as the Museum. But of the whole number possibly not more than 5 per cent attend for the purpose of study and scientific research. It is, however, something to afford pleasure to such large numbers of people, and the impressions derived from a superficial inspection may occasionally excite greater curiosity, and hence intellectual exercise.
- 3. Condition of the Building.—The building is in good repair, but the inconvenience of having no work-room, as complained of in former reports, is much felt. It is a necessity which I would respectfully urge upon the attention of Government.
- 4. Furniture.—A set of seven exhibition cases, of an entirely new pattern, have been placed in the central hall at a cost of Rs. 60 each, or Rs. 420 for the whole. These provide suitable accommodation for valuable specimens of artware, silks, jewelry and coins, &c., while they greatly improve the general arrangement of this part from a strictly furnished point of view. A cabinet was also designed and made up for the preservation of herbarium specimens, of which a considerable number is now collected. By gradually refurnishing with artistic and suitable cases, the Museum would easily accommodate twice the number of objects it now contains. The old cases take up a great deal of space, while many of them contain comparatively little.
- 5. Mammals and Birds.—About a hundred specimens of local birds were captured and set up in the collection, also a few mammals of the smaller species. An experienced Taxidermist has been deputed from the Indian Museum to collect specimens for that institution and give lessons in taxidermy. The practical tuition thus placed at our disposal cannot fail to be of some advantage, and there is no department in the Museum so much in need of improvement as that of natural history.
- Gology.—The collection of eggs and nests although still meagre has, I am glad to say, been much improved by the Curator. The eggs have been correctly



blown and are now mounted, singly or in pairs, on pieces of white card-board of equal size and form, on which the name of the bird is neatly written. The specimens are arranged together or with the nests of the species, but for convenience of study, I intend to have the birds included in the arrangement.

- 7. Entomology.—A few specimens of insect pests were referred to the authorities of the Indian Museum, but other current duties have prevented me from recording such details of life-history as specialists require to enable them to deal thoroughly with this important subject, I shall continue to give the matter as much attention as possible. During a short stay in Bangalore, Mr. R. B. Ferguson of Trevandrum was good enough to revise the names of the butterflies, of which we have a fair local collection.
- 8. Herbarium.—The collection of cured plants has increased to 468, representing about 80 Natural Orders. As the specimens increase it is intended to arrange a separate collection of the purely medicinal herbs of the Province.
- 9. Antiquities.—Nothing of rare value has been added to this collection except, perhaps, a few relics found by Mr. A. Mervyn Smith at Chandravalli in the Chitaldroog District. The most interesting of these, of which a list is given under donations, are the Buddhist come cast in lead and other metals. The coins have been examined by Captain Tufnell and Dr. Hultzsch, but I am not in a position to say what value is placed upon them by these gentlemen. Mr. M. A. Tirunarnacharya, the Munsiff of Chitaldroog, has recently presented the Museum with a richer find from the same locality.

Of gold coins, 27 were purchased, 4 presented and 2 obtained by exchange. Of silver, 63 were purchased, 10 presented and 3 obtained by exchange. Of copper, 27 were purchased, 159 presented and 13 received from the Huzur Treasury. All the coins of other metals were presented. The full collection, of issues of all States, now stands as under:—

Captain R. H. Campbell Tufnell has completed the manuscript of his Catalogue of the Mysore coins in the collection, and its publication is only delayed on account of the illustrations, which are in the hands of an English firm. Captain Tufnell has spared no pains to make the collection worthy of the publicity which he is about to give it and as a work of reference the Catalogue will be highly prized. Now that suitable cases are at our disposal, it is proposed, with the approval of Government, to place the silver and copper issues on public view.

- 11. Government Exhibits.—When the Agricultural and Industrial Exhibition took place last October, the opportunity was taken to secure a number of useful exhibits for permanent preservation in the Museum. By this arrangement the forest and agricultural sections have been greatly enriched. The timber trees of the Province are now very fairly represented, while cereal grains, pulses and similar products of the field and garden are equally well exhibited. The Museum acquired 718 specimens from the Exhibition. A full list of them will be found under the heading Donations.
- 12. Reading Room and Library.—During the year 19 volumes were added to the Library, thus bringing the total number of books up to 721. According to the register kept, there were 158 readers.
- 13. Establishment.—The permanent staff remains the same as heretofore. The Curator continues to discharge his duties intelligently.



REVIEW THEREON.—The Museum was visited by 209,170 persons during the year, which was 4,875 more than in the previous year.

- 2. The collection of dried plants is considerable and several additions were made to the collection of mammals and birds, mostly presentations by the late lamented Colonel Sir Oliver St. John, which were secured by this officer while on tour. Some relics from a cromlech consisting of brains, bones and fragmentary swords, &c., were presented by Doctor Bain. His account of the find given in the Madras Mail may be printed and kept in the Museum.
- 3. Two hundred and sixty-two coins were acquired. Some of the specimens being quite new to the collection in the Museum, which now amounts to 2,483 specimens.
- 4. The Government approve of the suggestion of the Superintendent to send out the Curator occasionally on the work of collecting new coins.
- 5. The cost of the Museum during the year under review was Rs. 2,914-3-5 against Rs. 3,077—8—1 in the year previous.
- 6. The thanks of the Government are due to the Gentlemen who presented articles to the Museum and a copy of the Report and the order of Government thereon will be sent to each of them.

SIR,

I have the honor to submit the Annual Report on the condition and progress of the Government Museum for the information and orders of Government. It refers to the official year 1890-91.

2. Statistics of Visitors.—The Institution maintains its popularity with the public, having been visited during the year by no less than 209,170 persons. This large attendance exceeded that of the previous year by 4,875 and the average of the past five years by 7,201. Male visitors-men and boys-were in the proportion to the whole of 63.63 per cent against 62.43 per cent in the preceding year. Female visitors have also increased, the percentage of attendance being 42.02, against 37.56 in 1889-90. An important feature is the progressive increase of signatures in the Visitors' Book, which is kept for the entry of names. Either more persons are able to sign than formerly, or the Writer in charge of the book gives closer attention to this part of his duties. But the number of students is daily increasing, and their frequent' visits to the Museum would perhaps account for more signatures. The official record for the past seven years is as follows:—

The languages employed to denote names took, with reference to use, the following order of precedence; Kanarese, English, Tamil, Handustani, Telugu, Mahratti, Guzarati, Marvadi, Malayalam, Nagari and Sindhi. The largest attendance in a single day was on the Vijaya Dasami, when 6,990 visitors are said to have entered the building. The Institution was also visited at the close of the year by His Imperial Highness the Grand Duke Alexander of Russia.

3. State of the Building.—The coir matting which covers the floor was mostly renewed throughout. It is, however, of a coarse quality that will soon become ragged again. Matting of superior quality would look neater, and perhaps be more economical in the end as it would not wear down so soon. The building is generally in good repair.

- 4 Furniture.—Two large wall cases have been put up for the better preservation and exposition of pulses, cereal grains and seeds; of which a valuable collection can be made in this Province. Also a cabinet for Herbarium specimens, and an ornamental glass cover to protect mounted specimens of natural history. The latter piece of furniture occupies a central position on the landing at the top of the staircase, where it covers a local collection of stuffed birds.
- 5. Herbarium.—The mounting of dried plants progresses steadily and the collections under some natural orders are now considerable. Four cabinets of uniform pattern and size, each containing eighteen (18) roomy drawers, are gradually being filled with indigenous and foreign plants of use or interest. At present each drawer accommodates the species of a natural order, but it is only the Orders Leguminosæ, Gramineæ, Urticaceæ, Cyperaceæ and Acanthaceæ that are pretty fully represented as yet. Specimens of wild and cultivated plants are gladly received at the Museum for determination.
- 6, Mammals and Birds.—The additions under this class were mostly presented by Colonel Sir Oliver St. John, K. C. S. I. and consisted of 58 birds with a few mammals. The specimens were secured while the Resident was on tour, and on returning to head-quarters he named most of them, and kindly offered some useful hints for their preservation for ulterior study.
- 7. Taxidermist.—This official followed the Resident on tour, and took charge of the specimens referred to in the foregoing paragraph. His work is not quite satisfactory, but it has improved since last year, when useful lessons were given by the Taxidermist from Calcutta.
- 8. Entomology.—A large collection of indigenous insects was made for the Trustees of the Indian Museum at Calcutta. Also one, of beetles, for the Central Museum at Madras. In each case the expenses of collecting were borne by the institution concerned. During the work of sorting for despatch, many duplicate species have been added to the local collection.
- 9. Antiquities.—Dr. Bain presented some relics from a cromlech, consisting of brains, bones and fragmentary swords, &c., but no data accompanied the articles, although, I believe, Dr. Bain has written an account of 'the find' to the "Madras Mail." With this exception, no antiquities of importance have been received.
- 10. Coins.—The acquisitions under this class amounted to 262 pieces. They were obtained by presentation, purchase and exchange, as shown in the annexed list:—

Of the specimens purchased, some were new to the collection, while others were duplicates required to exhibit the obverse and reverse faces in the show cases. The new coins were mostly collected by the Curator, in the towns of Mysore, Seringapatam, Closepet, Channapatna and Anekal. A house-to-house search in the more remote towns and larger villages would no doubt result in many additional acquisitions. But such work requires the services of a *connoisseur* of special tact. If permitted, I propose to send out the Curator on this work occasionally, as his services

can be spared. His explorations would include other subjects than mere coin hunting. The copper coins (one or two specimens of each) have all been placed on public view. Also electrotypes of nearly all the gold and silver issues. Some of the latter have been very successfully prepared by the Curator, on whom the work reflects credit.







No. 9962-J. 552-92, DATED, BANGALORE, 29TH DECEMBER 1892.

ORDER THEREON.—The report read above is for a period of 15 months from 1st April 1891 to 30th June 1892.

- 2. The total number of visitors to the Museum during the official year 1891-92 was 187,944 and, during the next 3 months April, May and June 1892, 45,248, making a total of 233,192 for the 15 months, as compared with 209,170 in 1890-91. This large 'falling off, Mr. Cameron attributes to the counterattractions of the Lal-Bagh, where the new Exhibition building and the Orang Outang since acquired attract enormous crowds of people. The percentage of female visitors was 35.9 as against 42.02 in 1890-91.
- 3. The institution was honored by a visit from His Highness the Maharaja Gaekwar of Baroda, who was pleased to offer a donation which was utilized for the purchase of a set of 15 large photographs of temples and other places of interest at Mysore and Seringapatam.
- 4. Two hundred and ninety-five coins were acquired, of which 157 were Roman silver coins found near Subedar's Chattram on the Bangalore-Hindupur Railway Line. These range in date from 23 B. C. to 51 A. D. and are thus 1,900 years old.
- 5. Several contributions have been received to the collection of plants, mammals and birds. Some excellent specimens of gold quartz, amalgam and pure gold, kindly furnished by Mr. F. W. Grey, the Manager of the Nundydroog Mine at Kolar, have been placed in the Museum.
- 6. Through the courtesy of Dr. Warth, Officiating Superintendent of the Central Museum at Madras, the collection of local fresh water fishes has been correctly named and classified and an additional supply of specimens of the Marine Fanna is expected to be made to the present collection.
  - 7. The total number of books in the Library now amounts to 177 volumes.
- 8. The expenditure during 1891-92 amounted to Rs. 2,981—11—5 and for April, May and June 1892 to Rs. 834—4—2, or Rs. 3,816—0—1 for the 15 months, as compared with Rs. 2,914—3—5 in the previous year.
- The Superintendent is requested to convey the thanks of Government to the several gentlemen who presented articles to the Museum.

SIR,

I have the honor to submit the following report on the working of the Government Museum for the year 1891-92.

2. Statistics of Visitors.—According to the register kept, the attendance of visitors was considerably less than is recorded for former years; the total number for the period under report being 187,944. This is 21,226 less than in 1890-91 and 10,294 under the average of the past five years. The falling off is probably due to the counter attractions of the Lal-Bagh, where the new Exhibition building, and the acquisition of an Ourang Outang attracted enormous crowds of people. Male visitors—men and boys—were in the proportion of 64.9 per cent against 63.63 per cent in the preceding year. Female visitors—women and girls—were 35.9 against 42.02 in 1890-91. The largest daily attendance was on the Vijaya Dasami, when 4,019 persons entered the bailding. The official record of visitors, kept during my incumbency is now as follows:—

- 3. Distinguished Visitor.—The institution was honored by a visit from His Highness the Gaekwar of Baroda, G. C. S. L., who, on his departure from Bangalore, presented a donation of Rs. 20 to be laid out for some improvement in the Museum.
- 4. State of the Building.—The usual petty repairs have been attended to by the Executive Engineer, and the building is in good order. The words "Mysore Government Museum" have been placed on the two wings of the building, in English and Kanarese characters respectively.
- 5. Furniture and Show-Cases.—Two additional cabinets have been provided for herbarium work. This now completes a set of six cabinets of uniform size and pattern, provided at a total cost of Rs. 540. These will be ample to preserve a large collection of botanical specimens. Two large show cases were also provided for the exposition of metal-ware, of which there is a growing collection.

- 6. Herbarium.—This now contains 1,208 plants, representing 108 natural orders. The specimens are neatly mounted on medium sized sheets of Printing Demy, with the habitat, name, vernacular name and order attached to each. Some of the specimens are fragmentary and hurriedly dried, but these will be replaced as opportunity occurs, while, in the meantime, they are good enough for purposes of reference and identification. A donation of two hundred plants representing species of the lower Himalayan Flora was presented by Mr. S. Anantaramaiengar, a Mysore Forest student of Dehra Dun. Mr. Anantaramaiengar brought the collection down with him on returning to join the local Forest Department. Mr. M. A. Lawson, M. A., Botanist with the Government of Madras, presented 74 Nilgiri grasses. Persons wishing to know the names of indigenous plants should address the Curator, at the same time sending a specimen of the plant referred to.
- 7. H. H. the Gaekwar's Donation.—With this sum (Rs. 20) was purchased a set of 15 large photographs of temples and other places of interest at Mysore and Seringapatam. The views, which are nicely framed, are being hung upon the east inner wall of the upper floor. A little more pictorial decoration would not be out of place in this part of the Museum. For instance, a life-size painting of H. H. the Maharaja of Mysore would be in harmony with the surroundings, as also popular with His Highness' subjects who visit the institution continually.
- 8. \*Mammals and Birds.—Only a few acquisitions have been made to this section, as the Taxidermist has mostly been engaged in setting up the birds and small mammals collected in the previous year. The stuffing of large specimens is still unsatisfactory, but now that branches of the "Victoria Natural History Institute" have been opened in the towns of Mysore and Bangalore, it is hoped that good specimens of natural history may be procurable at reasonable prices. The specimens in the collection have been carefully preserved and labelled.
- 9. Coins.—The acquisitions under this class amounted to 295 pieces. Of these 157 were Roman silver coins found near Subedar's Chattram on the Bangalore-Hindupur Railway. An interesting monograph has been written on this "Find" by Mr. Lewis Rice, c. I. E., Director of Archæological Researches in Mysore. The coins "range in date" Mr. Rice writes, "from 23 B. C. to 51 A. D., and are thus about 1,900 years old. None are of types not previously known." Ten of these coins have been made over to the Under-Secretary for presentation to the Indian Museum, and to collectors who applied for them. The Curator has also prepared a full set of electrotypes for presentation to His Highness the Maharaja. This was necessary, as of the 10 types discovered 5 were represented by a single coin each. The entire collection of coins of all countries now stands as follows:—

10. Gold Quartz, Amalgam and Pure Gold.—Through the courtesy of Mr. F. B. Grey, Manager of the Nundidyoog Mine at Kolar, the Museum has been furnished with some excellent specimens of gold in the conditions indicated above. Mr. Grey was also very kind to the officials of this institution who visited his mine, with a view to obtaining information and specimens.

- 11. Mineralogy.—Messrs. Bellamy, Pringle, and other experts, who visited the Museum during the year, have offered useful suggestions with regard to the arrangement and classification of products under this heading. They recommend the formation of a separate but complete collection of indigenous minerals of economic value with detailed information under the following heads:—
  - The places, where such products are found, whether they are rare or plentiful.
  - Whether they are easily accessible and if the quantity is sufficient for trade and export,
  - The chemical composition of indigenous minerals, both qualitative and quantitative.
  - 4. Local information in regard to quantity, utility and export, &c. After the monetary metals, the minerals which appear to attract the greatest interest in Mysore, are asbestos, galena, antimony ore, magnetic iron ores, mica, coprolite, garnets of Kemphole, corundum and gypsum. Suggestions such as the above are of real value to the executive of a Maseum, and with the approval of Government, I shall be glad to form a cabinet of economic mineralogy on the lines recommended.
- 12. Library.—The Library now contains 777 volumes, but the number of works, inclusive of small books and pamphlets, is only 438. Very important additions have been secured from the collection of the late Sir Oliver St. John, K. c. s. I., consisting of Proceedings and Transactions of the Zoological Society of London, Mivart on the Cat and other expensive publications, which are usually confined to scientific Libraries. A special grant of Rs. 415 was sanctioned for the purchase of these books. The published volumes (5 in number) of Watt's "Dictionary of the Economic Products of India" have also been purchased for the Library at a cost of Rs. 50. The catalogue of books is under revision.
- . 13. The administrative and working staff remains unchanged. A young man (B. Kempanna) volunteered at the close of the year to attend office with the view of acquiring some insight into the Curator's work, but it is too early to form an opinion of his abilities. He has passed the Matriculation Examination of the Madras University.
- 14. Contributions from the Districts.—In former years many interesting donations were received through the Deputy Commissioners of Districts, but with the exception of an occasional monstrosity in the form of an abnormal animal, we now rarely receive contributions from the mofussil. On the other hand, District Officers are most obliging when a specific article is applied for, and the want of leisure, no doubt, prevents their making occasional selections for the Museum on their own account.



## Supplementary Report for the months of April, May and June 1892.

- 1. Metalware Exhibits for the Imperial Institute.—A collection of 45 pieces of metalware received from the Districts, through the Director of Agriculture and Statistics, were placed in the Museum for final selection and despatch to the Imperial Institute. The collection was fairly representative of ornamental and domestic articles commonly used in Mysore, especially of such as are likely to be of general utility elsewhere. A descriptive list of the articles has been retained, and drawings and photographs were secured with the view of preparing a monograph on the subject of local metalware, either for the information of the authorities of the Imperial Institute or for publication in the Indian Art Journal, as Government may deem expedient. The collection of metalware was despatched to London on the 20th May 1892.
- 2. Fresh-water Fish.—With a view to improving this collection and to have the specimens identified, the Curator made a visit to the Central Museum at Madras, taking specimens of the local fishes with him. This resulted in the collection being correctly named and classified, while Dr. Warth, the Officiating Superintendent, has kindly undertaken to supply additional specimens of the Marine Fauna.
- A revised "Catalogue of Books in the Library" has been published, a copy of which is appended to this Report.





SIR,

I have the honor to submit the following report on the working of the Government Museum during the year 1892-93.

2. Statistics of Visitors.—The "Register of Visitors" has recorded a total admission of 276,286 persons of all classes during the year. In the previous year the record was only 187,944, or 88,342 below the figures now submitted, which are also 61,816 above the average of the past five years. The exhibits collected for the Chicago Exposition were kept on public view for several weeks, during which time the building was often thronged with visitors, and this must be held to account, in some measure at least, for the large increase now reported. The monthly attendance, as also the number of signatures in the different languages, will be found in the tabular statement at the end of this report. Male visitors, men and boys, were in the proportion of 60.31 per cent against 64.9 per cent in the previous year. Female visitors, women and girls, were in the proportion of 39.68 against 35.9 in 1891-92. The largest daily attendance fell on the Vijaya Dasami, when 7,272 visitors crossed the threshold of the building.

<sup>3.</sup> Condition of the Building.—A good deal of inconvenience has been caused by the breaking up of the ground floor, which only consists of a layer of chunam and cannot therefore be expected to resist much wear and tear, even although coarse strips of matting are laid over parts of it. To mitigate this evil and make the floor worthy of the rest of the building, an application has been made to the Superintending Engineer to lay down a proper flooring of glazed tiles in the main passages, with polished Cuddapah slabs under the cases. The sconer this work is done the better, as at present the floor is not only very unsightly but a fine layer of chunam dust is always being deposited on the exhibits.

- 4. Show Cases.—The only additions under this heading were three wall-cases for bottles, in which the smaller Reptilia are preserved, and a double-faced glass almirah for the arrangement of local game birds.
- the Government to make a select and representative collection of State products for exhibition at the Chicago Exposition, carried out its work promptly and efficiently, but in so doing it threw an amount of labor and responsibility on the staff of this institution which deserves some recognition. In fact all the Museum and a few of the Lal-Bagh hands were almost exclusively employed in this work for nearly three months, at the close of which 70 large packages of valuable products were made over to Messrs. Tellery & Co., the Government Agents for the Exposition. On receipt from the districts, every exhibit was unpacked, cleaned, altered if necessary, numbered, described, invoiced, catalogued, and re-packed securely for the voyage. It is needless, therefore, to say that all this incurred much labor. Forest and agricultural products were exhibited for a short time at the old Palaco in the Fort, while artware and other valuable exhibits were kept on view in the Museum, where they were much admired by the public. The gross value of the exhibits made over to the Agents is about Rs. 15,000, but fuller information bearing on the value and nature of these articles will be found in the Committee's catalogue, published for the Agents at the time of despatch.
- Herbarium.—The final mounting of specimens was completed and a small collection of 21 indigenous plants was received from the Lal-Bagh.
- 7. Mammals and Birds.—One hundred and nineteen specimens have been added to this collection, mostly secured by a hired shikari and set up by the Taxidermist. Of these the most interesting are:—

Ægithina tiphia-The Common Dwarf Bulbul. Alcedo bengalensis-The Little Indian King-fisher. Ammomanes phonicura—The Rufous-tailed Finch-Lark. Anas precilor hypcha-The Spotted Billed Duck. Ardea alba-The Large White Heron-Brachypternus aurantias—The Golden-backed Woodpecker. Carpophaga sylvatica-The Imperial Green Pigeon. Centroccccyx rufipennis-The Common Coucal or Crow Pheasant. Ceryle rudis-The Pied King-fisher. Coracias indicus-The Indian Roller, Criniger icterious-The Yellow-browed Bulbul. Dafila acuta-The Pin-tailed Duck. Dendrocitta rufa-The Common Indian Magpie. Dissemurus paradiseus—The Great Racket-tailed Drongs. Gallus sonneratti-The Grey Jungle Fowl. Gracula religiosa-The Southern Hill Mynah. Grancalus Macci-The Indian Cuckoo Shrike. Haliaster indus-The Marcon-backed Kite. Hydrophasianus chirurgus—The Pheasant-tailed Jacana. Lalage sykesi-The Black-headed Cuckoo Shrike. Loriculus vernalis-The Indian Loriquet. Merops quinticolor-The Chestnut-Headed Bee-eater. Motacilla Madraspatensis-The Pied Wagtail. Pericrocotus flammeus-The Orange Minivet, Pitta bengalensis-The Indian Pitta or Ground Thrush. Pomatorhinus Horsfieldi—The Southern Scimitar Babbler. Sturnia Blythii - The White-headed Mynah. Terpsiphone paradisi-The Paradise Fly-catcher. Thamnebia fulicata-The Black-backed Indian Robin. Tartur humilis.-The Red Turtle Dove,

The game birds of the province are being exhibited in a separate case, with a label attached to each specimen giving local and scientific names, district or locality, season when procurable, and such information as may be generally useful to sportsmen and naturalists.

- Reptilia.—The collection of small reptiles, preserved in spirit, was sent to the Government Central Museum, Madras, to be correctly named, and on its return the specimens were classified and placed in new cases prepared for the purpose.
- 9. Marine Fauna.—The Officiating Superintendent of the Government Central Museum, Madras, has presented a collection of 21 salt-water fishes, which are nicely set up and correctly named. For this, and other favors mentioned in the preceding paragraph, Dr. Warth deserves due acknowledgment. The ichthyological collection has been re-arranged and classified under Orders, Families, and Genera, according to Deputy Surgeon-General Day's latest work on the Fauna of British India including Ceylon and Burma, published under the authority of the Secretary of State for India.
- 10. Inscriptions.—No additions have been made to this collection, but an application has been made to Government to secure for the institution from Atakur, the stone slab bearing the "Atakur inscription of the time of Krishna III; dated Saka sambat 872." Dr. Hultzsch knows this stone well, and is of opinion that it would form a good companion to the Begur stone now in the collection. The village of Atakur is only 15 miles from the Bangalore-Mysore Railway, so that the cost of moving the specimen to Bangalore might not be prohibitive.
- 11. Mineralogy.—Eight small sets of minerals have been furnished to the Education Secretary, as specimen objects for purposes of lecturing in the districts.
- 12. Specimens of Woods.—A number of duplicate specimens, for which there was no room in the Museum, and a few large pieces presented by the Mysore Committee for the Chicago Exposition, have been placed on view in the exhibition building at the Lal-Bagh. Later on, these woods will be classified according to the "Forest trees of Mysore and Coorg," third edition, now in the Press.
- 13. Library.—It will be seen from the lists of donations and purchases that a number of useful books have been acquired during the year. Nineteen volumes of important works were very nicely re-bound at the Government Press. The total number of volumes is now 819.
- 14. Printing.—With a view to make the labelling of articles more instructive than it now is, a new set of carefully revised labels are being printed in neat type at the Government Press.
- 15. Coins.—Having had so much special work on hand, the collection of coins has made no progress, the total number being the same as on the date of my last report. But a few useful exchanges have been effected with the authorities of the Indian Museum, especially in the case of six rare Pathan coins, obtained in lieu of ten Roman coins, of which there are many duplicates. The collection stands as follows:—

16. Proposal to establish an Art Sale Room.—This proposal has been made to the Durbar at the suggestion of Colonel Henderson, c. s. i., British Resident at this Court. The scheme has worked successfully at Lahore, Lucknow and elsewhere, and there is no reason why it should not be equally convenient and remanerative here, where the best art-workers are usually isolated from the large centres of trade and population. The whole object is to help them by placing their products within convenient reach of the monied public.

- 17. Establishment.—T. Jacob, who had been writer of the institution for 17 years, died of cholera. The post is now filled on a reduced salary by B. Chourappa Chetti, who has passed his Middle School Examination.
- 18. List of Donations received.—The principal benefactors to the Museum have been Mr. Graham Anderson, Mr. A. W. Morris, and the Committee appointed to select exhibits for the Chicago Exposition.



SIR,

I have the honor to submit the Administration Report of the Government Museum for the official year 1893-94.

2. Statistics of visitors.—During the year, 288,270 visitors entered the Museum, or 11,984 in excess of the previous year, and 73,799 above the average of the past five years. This large increase cannot be clearly accounted for, unless it was due to the opening of the Bangalore-Hindupur Railway, and the subsequent influx of a great number of country folks, who were bent on sight-seeing. In the Museum itself there was no exceptional feature of attraction which could account for so large an increase of visitors. The monthly attendance, with book entries and tabular statements, will be found in the appendices. Male visitors, men and boys, were in the proportion of 59.52 against 60.31 per cent in the previous year. Female visitors, women and girls, were in the proportion of 40.47 against 39.68 in 1892-93. The largest daily attendance was registered, as usual, on the Vijaya Dasami, when 9,654 persons entered the building. The official record for the past eight years is hereto appended:—

- 3. Gosha visitors.—Government accorded its sanction to my proposal to set apart Monday afternoon in each week for the exclusive attendance of ladies. This arrangement has proved satisfactory, I am glad to report; and the number of Gosha ladies who visited the institution since the 9th October 1893, date of closing to the general public is 7,359.
- 4. Condition of the building.—The ground floor has been in a very unsatisfactory state throughout the year, but latterly some improvement was effected by using a superior class of matting in the main passages. Although a proposal to lay down a good floor was submitted in February 1893, the Public Works authorities have not yet commenced the work. A few petty repairs such as painting and color-washing were done, and with the exception of the floor, the building is in good repair.
- Show cases.—Six new glass cases were provided for the preservation of arms and specimens of natural history. The cost, which amounted to Rs.224, was met from the budget allotment for furniture.
- Natural History section. One—hundred and eighty-one (181) new specimens have been added to this collection, and to make room for them, a number of wormout exhibits were removed and destroyed. Although the major part of these addi-

tions are duplicates secured by the shikari, a considerable number consist of new and rare species obtained by purchase. Of the latter, the most interesting among birds are :--

Grus antigone—The Sarus crans.

Ascalaphia Bengalensis—The Rock-horsed Owl.

Coriornis melanocephala—The Simla-Horsed Pheasant.

Eupodotis Educardsi—The Indian Bustard.

Falco jugger—The Lugger Falcon.

Metopidius indicus—The Bronze-winged Jacana.

Pavo spicifer—The Javan Peafowl.

Of mammals, the feet of the rhinoceros, (Rhinoceros unicornis), (which died at the Lal-Bagh,) have been cured and set up, also a fine head of the Iudian bison (Bos gaurus). The mutilated skeleton of the rhinoceros has also been preserved, but it is doubtful if the specimen can be set up without skilled assistance from Madras. Mr. Purnaiya, the Deputy Commissioner of Hassan, presented the carcase of a large crocodile (Crocodilus palustris) which was captured in a tank near the Yagati river.

- 7. Inscriptions.—My application to secure for the Museum the stone slab bearing the Atakur inscription, dated saka sambat 872, has met with the approval of Government, and although the stone had not arrived at the close of the period under report, the orders of Government had been issued for its careful transfer to this institution. Dr. Hultzsch, Epigraphist to the Government of Madras, presented a large fac-simile of the inscription of Sundara Pandya at Srirangam. Government is indebted to this gentleman also for copies, presented to the Museum Library, of his publications on the epigraphy of Southern India. The possession of the Atakur inscription is due to a friendly suggestion of Dr. Hultzsch's also.
- 8. Mineralogy.—During his residence at Bangalore, Dr. Warth of the Geological Survey of India, has interested himself in this collection, and has offered useful suggestions for its re-arrangement and improvement, which will be carefully considered. He is also very kindly putting the Curator in the way of preparing a set of wooden models of crystals illustrative of the six systems of Crystallography. With the latter on view, students of mineralogy will be better able to grasp the fundamental principles of this interesting study. The arrangement of minerals will necessitate the printing of a new catalogue, but in dealing with a small collection, such as the Museum contains, this would not be a difficult task. It is needless to say that such voluntary help from specialists is much appreciated by me.
- 9. Herbarium —One hundred plants were presented to the herbarium by the Superintendent of the Lal Bagh.
- 10. Library.—The important books which have been added to the Library are "Griffith's Rigveda," "Dubbis on the Manners and Customs of the people of India" and the "Census of India." Other additions will be seen in the appendices.
- 11. Art-sale room.—This new feature has been started on the recommendation of Colonel P. D. Henderson, c. s. i., British Resident at the Court of Mysore, and a sum of Rs. 500 was placed at my disposal early in February last to enable me to purchase some articles of artware. A sum of Rs. 415 was also sauctioned to provide cases and fit up the sale room. The latter is situated at the west end of the gallery, where it occupies a floor space of twenty by ten feet.
- 12. The scheme was made known to Deputy Commissioners and Sub Division Officers in the following letter, dated the 20th February 1894, which had appended to it, in each case, a copy of the Chief Secretary's No. 1931—6.557, dated 28th July 1-93:—
- "SIR.—In submit ing a copy of Chief Secretary's No. 1931—G 557, dated 28th July 1893, for infor an in, I have the honor to state that an 'Art sale Room' will be opened in the Government Museum at Bangalore on the 15th of next month.
- 2 In the meantine, I shall be glad to receive sample contributions of purely Mysore Artware from reputable artuans in your District, should they wish to take a lyantage of this arrangement to have their goods advertised and disposed of free of charge in a Government institution.
- "3. But to render the scheme successful, it is necessary that the class of workmanship under each article should be of the highest order, while the prices attached to each article should be in ratio with what the manufacturer would realize in the ordinary course of business. But as the manufacturer will have to bear the cost of sending his wares to the Museum, and getting them back again should they not be sold within a rea onable time, it will be necessary to enhance the prices so as to cover this initial outlay.
- "4. With due regard to these particulars, and with the facilities now offered for wider advertisement, it is hoped that a larger demant will arise for local artwars, which, in some industries at least, is comparatively little known to the European public.

All articles submitted for the sale-room should be carefully packed, as also fully samed and "5. All articles submitted for the sale-room should be carefully packed, as also fully samed and priced. Packages should be addressed to the Supermendent, Mysore Covernment Museum, the railway or other charges being fully prepaid. When sales are effected, the proceeds will be remitted to the consigner free of charge, but the Museum will not hold itself responsible for breaks ges in transmission, inferior workmanship, nor exorbitant prices. Trusting that you will cause the subject of these letters to be clearly and fully explained to such tradesmen and artisus residue in your District as may wish to take advantage of the privilege now offered.

The above letter has not been acknowledged by the authorities of the respective Districts, nor have we received a single article of artware from any part of the mofussil.

Letters explaining the intention of Government with regard to the sale-room were also addressed to Mr. Standish Lee, in charge of the Artware Department at Mysore, Messes. Ahmed Ali and Muhammad Mukdum, artware manufacturers, the Superintendent of the Central Jail, and various local tradesmen. The Curator visited Mysore and Commapatna with the dual object of purchasing specimens and explaining to the artisans the conditions of sale at the Museum. A collection of sandalwood carvings have also been ordered from Sagar, through Mr. Namakal Rao, the Sub Division Officer.

13. Register of Artisans. - To enable the officials of the Museum to offer, to intending purchasers, reliable information regarding the different classes of art manufactures produced in the Province, with the name of the locality in which they are found and full addresses of approved workmen, it was decided to keep a register in the sale-room. ## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE MYSORE GOVERNMENT MUSEUM FOR THE YEAR 1894-95.

I have the honor to submit the Administration Report of the Government Museum for the past official year 1894-95.

2. Statistics of Visitors.—The tabulated register for the whole year, in which the entries are made by classes, is given under Appendix C. The aggregate attendance is 263,871 against 288,270 in 1893-94, being a decrease of 24,399, but still 18,763 above the average for the past five years.

Male visitors—men and boys—were in the proportion of 59·14 against 59·52 in the previous year. Female visitors—women and girls—were in the proportion of 40·93, or approximately the same as last year. The number of Gosha visitors—which includes all females who attended on the afternoons reserved for Gosha ladies—was 7,789. The largest attendance on a single day (Vijaya Dasami) was 7,454.

- 3. Condition of the Building.—Excepting that the condition of the ground floor is unsatisfactory and gives rise to much fine dust, the building is in good repair. Owing to defective lighting in the side passages directly under the gallery floor it is proposed to paint the ceiling of the latter in some whitish colour.
- 4. Furniture.—As new articles of furniture were not urgently required, the small allotment of money (Rs. 200) made for its provision was mostly re-appropriated for the purchase of books. Such a re-appropriation will not be asked for again, as a separate grant has now been sanctioned by the Government for the purchase of scientific and other valuable books.
- 5. Natural History.—Eighty-seven new specimens consisting mostly of birds and the smaller mammalia, were added to the collection in this section. A good proportion of these specimens had died in the Zoological Gardens at Mysore, and are well set up by Mr. Van Ingen, a local Taxidermist. The most interesting are:—

Struthto camelus-The Ostrich (young one hatched at Mysore).

Euplocamus nycthemerus—The Silver Pheasant.

Euplocamus nobilis-The Bornean Fireback.

Polyplectron thibetan-The Grey Peacock Pheasant,

Phasianus wallichii-The Cheer Pheasant.

Phasianus torquatus-The Ring-necked Pheasant.

Pteromys caniceps-The Grey-headed Flying-Squirrel.

Oryx capensis-The Gembok.

Cervus porcinus-The Hog-deer.

nuntjac-The Muntjac.

nnetti-The Indian Gazelle.

as-The Indian Wild Boar.

abica-The Arabian Gazelle.



A re-arrangement of the stuffed birds is under consideration. The oldfashioned almirahs in which the collection has been kept hitherto are overcrowded, and take up nearly a whole side of the gallery. Wall cases of a modern pattern would provide ample accommodation for representative specimens (the male and female of each species with nest and eggs) of the feathered tribes, while the arrangement of the latter could be made far more instructive than it is at present. It was a mistake in the first instance to utilise old and unsuitable furniture for a fine building such as the present Museum, and although this has been remedied to some extent during the past few years there is still much to be

A fairly large specimen of the American rattle-snake (Crotalus durissus) has been secured at a trifling cost of Rs. 20.

- 6. Mineralogy.—The collection of minerals have been re-arranged as suggested by Dr. Warth, under the following headings :-
  - Miscellaneous collection.
  - II. Indigenous specimens according to Districts, with their locality, &c.
  - III. Minerals used as gems.
  - Meteorites.
  - V. Models of crystals in wood.

Local students of mineralogy prefer the above arrangement as a practical help to the study of this interesting subject. A few specimens have been made over to the State Goologist for examination purposes. Also a few surplus cases.

- 7. Herbarium, -One hundred and twenty-five plants, mostly of the indigenous flora, have been presented from the Lal-Bagh.
- Coins .- This collection stands the same as in the previous year, with the addition of two copper coins which were presented.

Duties in connection with the Art Sale Room have prevented the Curator from making his usual excursion in quest of rare coins.

- 9. Library.—Attached to this report is a copy of the new catalogue of books, from which it will be seen that the collection, although still small, contains some valuable works. The catalogue has been compiled by the Curator and his assistant. The most important new books are "The Game Birds of India" (Hume and Marshall), "Indian Antiquary," and "The journal of the Royal Asiatic Society of Great Britain and Ireland" in 25 volumes. Now that a small grant is allowed for the purchase of books, the Library will soon im-
- Art Sale Room .- An account current of receipts and expenditure in connection with the Sale Room from the date of opening will be found under Appendix E. Of the sum of Rs. 1,000 advanced for the purchases of articles of Artware, Rs. 819-10-8 had been expended at the close of the official year, while the unexpended balance of Rs. 180-5-4 was retained for expenditure in the cur-

The sales effected at the close of the year amounted in value to Rs. 484-7-10, all articles being sold at cost price, exclusive of charges for packing and carriage. In addition to the above, articles of jail manufacture (Central Jail) were sold to the value of Rs. 174-11-11. Also a few pieces of inlaid work from the Factory of Messrs. Ahmed Ali and Muhammad Mukdum of Mysore. But with the latter exception, the Mysore artisans have not submitted a single article for sale until it was first paid for by Government. It is hoped, however, that in the course of time some of the leading manufacturers may appreciate the advantage of exposing their wares in a central position such as the Museum offers. Difficulty has been experienced in securing anything like a varied assortment of local artware at market prices, and it always must be so while the maker is apathetic and suspicious in the matter of keeping the Sale Room well supplied. Even sandalwood carvings cannot be supplied except at long intervals, although there is a brisk demand for them by tourists and local residents. There is also a good demand for the lacquered toys of Channapatna and the small brass images of Mysore, of which the supply has been well maintained in the Sale Room. Five show cases have been provided to the latter at a cost of Rs. 415.



Report on the working of the Government Museum for the year 1895-96.

REVIEW THEREON.—The total number of visitors to the Museum during 1895-96 was 243,775 as compared with 263,871 in 1894-95, but the percentage of female visitors rose to 41.6 from 40.93 in 1894-95.

2. About 139 fresh specimens were added to the collection of mammals and birds, and a small increase made to the collection of coins in the Museum. The library was enlarged by an addition of twenty-one volumes.

3. With reference to the proposal to enlarge the two wings of the Museum building the Superintendent is requested to make it the subject of a separate communication, as also his proposal to revise the Office establishment of the instintion.

4. The sale proceeds of the artware kept in the sale room amounted to Rs. 1,268-9-7. Government note with satisfaction the Superintendent's remarks regarding this sale room which, he says, is beginning to fulfil a useful purpose in bringing articles of special workmanship within convenient reach of the buyer. A little more confidence has, it would seem, been shown by the artisans, although the actual number who supply goods at their own risk is very small. Government observe that continued efforts will gradually produce the desired results.

5. Government note with regret the loss sustained by the death of Mr. A. M. Lawson, who was a benefactor to the Herbarium section of the Museum; and they trust that the Superintendent has suitably acknowledged the donations

mentioned in the Appendix to his report.

# ANNUAL REPORT ON THE MYSORE GOVERNMENT MUSEUM FOR 1895-96.

I have the honor to submit the Administration Report of the Government Museum for the official year 1895-96.

 Statistics of Visitors.—The tabulated register for the whole year will be found under Appendix C, in which the entries are made by classes.

The aggregate attendance of visitors is 242,775, which shows a decrease of 21,096 against the attendance of last year, and 9,054 below the average of the past five years. The fluctuation of a few thousands, more or less, scarcely needs comment, as, in either case, it may be due to accident or temporary diversion. It is when the average attendance persistently rises or falls over a lengthened period, as the case may be, that the cause is usually traceable to some merit or defect in the institution itself. Taking this view of the matter, the Museum continues to be most popular with the people.

Male visitors—men and boys were in the proportion of 58:35 to 59:14 in the previous year. On the other hand, female visitors were slightly on the increase being 41:6 to 40:93 in 18:34-95. Gosha visitors numbered 8,845; but this includes all females admitted on the afternoons set apart for ladies.

The largest attendance on a single day—third day after the close of the Dasara—was 3,634, being a little more than half the number that entered the building on the same day in the previous year. The official record of visitors for the past nine years now stands as follows:—

- 3. Condition of the Building.—The low ceilings over the side passages on the ground floor have been painted white. This has considerably improved the defective lighting in these passages, and the specimens are now viewed to more advantage. A few petty repairs were made by the Department of Public Works, and excepting the floor, which is still unsatisfactory, the building is in good repair.
- 4. Furniture.—Four additional cases have been provided for specimens of Geology and Natural History. Also a stand with folding panels to exhibit the fine collection of bromide enlargements of Khedda operations, temples and rustic scenery, prepared for the Chicago Exposition. These pictures are now well set up and serve to give the sportsman and tourist a fair idea of what can be seen in the Mysore country. It is under consideration to utilise similar folding panels for scientific charts that are likely to be of value to local students.
- 5. Natural History.—A number of decayed specimens have been removed to make room for more worthy ones. In time, it is hoped to entirely remove the badly mounted exhibits, and have them replaced by the specimens of a competent taxidermist such as Mr. Van Ingen. The Museum official who is supposed to do this work is quite incompetent to undertake anything beyond cleaning and the merest rudiments of taxidermy, when it comes to anything larger than a crow. The

newly set up specimens, of which the finest were purchased from Mr. Van Ingen, ere 139 in number. Appended is a list of the more interesting:

 Mineralogy.—A few additions have been made to the collection of minerals but nothing of special importance. The system of labelling has been much im-

proved.

7. Herbarium.— A benefactor to this section has unfortunately passed away in the person of Mr. A. M. Lawson, late Botanist with the Government of Madras. The deceased gentleman took the keenest interest in herbarium work, and in addition to presenting specimens, named many of the plants in this collection. A small assortment of dried plants has been contributed from the Lal-Bagh, but otherwise little was done in the year under report.

8. Numismatology.—At the close of the year the Curator toured through the taluks of Mysore, Seringapatam and French Rocks, in quest of coins and other relics of the past. Of the former he secured 4 silver and 32 copper issues of Mysore. But nothing really new was discovered. A good specimen of kazmi or Sultan's one-anna piece was about the rarest coin in the lot. Library and Reading Room.—A sum of Rs. 191-9-9 has been carefully expended on the purchase of books, while a small number have been presented.

"The Chemist and Druggist", a weekly periodical, has been subscribed for and is placed on the reading table. More room is required for this part of the Museum, which would then become popular with the reading community.

10. Proposed enlargement.—Without spoiling the symmetry of the building, which is an exceptionally handsome one of its size, it may be possible to enlarge the two wings a little. The Superintending Engineer might be consulted in regard to this, as any extension of the existing wings would relieve the cramped accommodation now provided for the Library, Reading Room, Herbarium and Office.

11. Sale of Artware.—Although business is still done on a very limited scale, there are signs that the sale-room is beginning to fulfil an useful purpose in bringing articles of special workmanship within the convenient reach of the buyer. A little more confidence has also been shown by the artisans, although the actual number who supply goods at their own risk is very small. But enquiries are being made by workmen and several have brought their wares for sale on cash payment. Altogether, the local interest in the scheme is keener than it was last year. While no regular supply is maintained by the manufacturers themselves, it is difficult to procure articles of the fine industries and best workmanship at the usual market value, and it is not the object of the scheme to raise the normal value of local artware until a permanent trade has been established. The sale proceeds for the year amounted to his. 1,268-9-7 and were realised from the following sources:—

- 12. Class of Articles sold.—As it is undesirable that stock should accumulate in the sale-room, the supply is mostly regulated by the popular demand. It therefore consists mostly of lacquered ware from Channapatna, sandalwood carvings from Shimoga, brassware from Mysore, inlaid work, fancy teapoys, sets of chessmen pieces of silk, and so on. The Jail articles are mostly of a domestic nature, although the carpet and check patterns are highly artistic. With perseverance it is hoped to collect a more representative assortment of the art industries of the Province, although, for the reasons stated, there are difficulties to be overcome in the meantime.
- 13. Lists of presents, with articles purchased during the year, are given under Appendix A.
- 14. Establishment.—A. Appaji, acting Assistant Curator, has been confirmed in the appointment, which was rendered vacant by the retirement of B Kempanna.

The Curator and staff are poorly paid considering the responsibility attaching to their respective duties. If permitted, a revised scale of pay will be submitted for the consideration and sanction of Government during the current year.








ORDER THEREON.—The total number of visitors during the year was 270,769 as against 242,775 in the previous year. The percentage of male visitors rose from 58:35 in 1895-96 to 59:49 in the present year, and that of female visitors from 41.6 to 44:57.

- 2. The collection of coins in the Museum received an addition of 199 during the year, and the Library was enlarged by the addition of 32 new volumes.
- 3. The sale proceeds of the Artware Department were slightly less than in the previous year, being Rs. 1,055-0.9 as against Rs. 1,268-9-7. It is, however, satisfactory to note, as observed by the Superintendent, that though the sale of Government articles showed a slight falling off, there was a marked increase in the value of artware exhibited and sold by the artisans themselves.
- The cost of maintaining the institution during the year was Rs. 3,342-7-0 as against Rs. 3,404-8-5 in the previous year.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE MYSORE GOVERNMENT MUSEUM FOR THE YEAR 1896-97.

I have the honor to submit the Administration Report of the Government Museum for the official year 1896-97.

 Statistics of Visitors.—The total number of visitors during the year was 270,769 against 242,775 in the previous year.

But of this large number only 34,628 males and 2,226 females have signed their names in the Visitor's Book. It seems possible, however, that through oversight or negligence all had not been invited to sign, while in some cases visitors decline to do so when requested.

The attendance of ladies on gosha days was 8,867 or about the same as in

the previous year.

Male-visitors (men and boys) were in the proportion of 59:49 against 58:35 in 1895-96. Female-visitors are recorded at 44:57 and 41:6, respectively, for the same periods.

The greatest attendance on a single day (the second day after Vijaya Dasami) is put down at the large figure of 10,442. This, the Curator vouches, is correct. The average attendance for the preceding five years is 268,394, while the official record during the past ten years now stands as follows:—

- 3. Condition of the Building.—The Museum was tastefully illuminated on the occasion of the Diamond Jubilee of Her Most Gracious Majesty the Queen Empress. The slight chipping caused to the external walls, by driving in nails, was promptly attended to by the Department of Public Works, as also the usual petty repairs throughout the year.
- 4. Furniture.—Of the grant of Rs. 200, provided under this heading, a sum of Rs. 177 was expended on a folding stand to exhibit temple and khedda views. A few old-fashioned cases still require to be replaced as opportunity occurs.
- Natural History.—This section has been considerably increased and improved. In the entomological branch many decayed specimens have been replaced by the Taxidermist, and the collections of butterflies, moths, beetles, and other insects are thereby decidedly improved.

A separate case will shortly be apportioned to insect-pests indigenous to the Province, and by the aid of popular descriptions and suitable drawings it is hoped to make the collection an interesting feature of the institution. A catalogue of the named butterflies in the collection (copy attached) has been compiled by the Curator to facilitate exchanges with kindred institutions and private collectors. A tusker-elephant's head of good proportion has been purchased and set up in

the gallery, where it is well seen. The following list gives the more important specimens secured by purchase and presentation:-

Acridotheres fuscus-The Jungle Mynah. 6. Labelling.—During the year much attention has been given to descriptive labelling, setting forth the salient points of life-history, order, and economy. As an example of this important work the label attached to the money cowry may be quoted:-

"The Money Cowry (Cypræa moneta) Kan.—Kavade ಕವಚೆ.

The cowry shells, used as currency, are procured on the coast of Congo, and in the Philippine and Maldive Islands. At what remote, or at what early stage of rudimentary civilization, this singular representative shell-currency was introduced, it is, perhaps, vain to enquire, but the extensive area over which it has long been recognised proves its great antiquity."

Mineralogy.—The precious stones in the collection have been separately arranged with a descriptive label attached to each specimen. It is found that specialities of this class attract the keenest attention fr m the public, hence the advantage of having them brought together for easy reference. As the collection grows, a strongly made cabinet will be required for its safe custody. A number of red stones having the general appearance of garnets, but deficient in transparency and lustre, were collected by me in the bed of the Kempkal river, Manjarabad Taluk. They are of all sizes, most abundant and very pretty when seen in the water.

Small specimens have been deposited in the Museum and in the Geological Laboratory.

In the bed of the same river, there are splendid collections of pebbles of different sizes. Painted on, these make nice table ornaments, paper-weights and suchlike. In Japan, they would afford material for a decorative industry. Specimens have been secured for the Museum.

8. Numismatology.—The Curator visited Hassan, Belur and Halebid, in search of coins, medals, and other antiquities; but nothing, of great value was discovered. The trip added about 143 copper coins to the collection which now

9. Herbarium. - A small collection of 120 plan's, mostly collected by me in the Manjarabad forests, has been added to the dried collection. Many of the specimens are fragmentary and incomplete, owing to the season, when collected, (February) being unfavorable to the work.

As the trees and other plants on the ghats flower progressively and not in quantity at any given season, a full herbarium collection can only be made by persons living on the spot.

10. Library and Reading Room-Of 32 new books added to the library, the following are the most interesting :-

11. Extension of the Building .- This will be made the subject of a separate

communication at an early date, as requested in Government Proceedings No. 681—Mis. 112, dated 15th July 1897.

12. Art Sale Room.—This continues to work fairly well, although the sales were slightly less in value than in the previous year. But though the sale of Government articles fell off a little, there is a marked increase in the value of artware exhibited by the artisans themselves, which is a hopeful sign.

The samples of sandalwood-carving, ivory inlaid in ebony and rosewood, lacquered toys, and such like, are fairly representative of the best work done in the Province. But there are occasional exceptions in supplies received from the districts. In keeping such back, the provincial officers, who scrutinise and forward, would save much trouble and at the same time render good service to the scheme. The collection of really good artware in a central place like Bangalore is a great convenience to tourists, who are admittedly the chief buyers. But the advantages of selling, advertising, and earning a good reputation under the above arrangement, have to be more fully realised by the artisans.





The percentage of male visitors was 60.94 and of female visitors 39.05.


- The work of re-arrangement and labelling of exhibits was in progress and considerable additions were made to the Natural History Section, Minerals, Coins and Library.
- 3. Specimens of destructive caterpillars, which caused great damage to crops in the takes of Hassan and Tarkere in the months of August and September 1897, were forwarded to the Indian Museum where they were identified as larvæ of the Noctues Moth "Heliothis armigera," identical with the "Boll worm" of the United States; and a paper drawn up by Mr. Cameron on the means of extirpating the pest was published in the Mysore Gazette for general an formation.
- 4. The sale proceeds of Artware kept in the Art Sale Room amounted to Rs. 873-5-3 against Rs. 1,055-0-9 in 1896-97, while the realisations from the sale of articles exhibited by manufacturers themselves were Rs. 460 against Rs. 384 in 1896-97,
- The cost of maintaining the institution during the year was Rs. 3,233-14-10 as against Rs. 3,342-7-0 in the year previous.

# ANNUAL REPORT OF THE MYSORE GOVERNMENT MUSEUM FOR THE YEAR 1897-98.

I have the honor to submit the Administration Report of the Government Museum for the official year 1897-98.

Statistics of Visitors.—The aggregate attendance has been 227,174 against 270,769 in the previous year. Of the total number, 41,397 male and 2,227 female visitors have signed their names in the Visitors' Book. This is a considerable increase as compared with the signatures of last year.

Male Visitors-men and boys-were in the proportion of 60.94 against 59.49, and female visitors-women and girls-39.05 against 44.57 in the previous year. On the second day after Vijaya Dasami the attendance was 5,728 which is the largest number recorded in one day during the year under report. The attendance of gosha and other ladies on reserved days (Monday afternoons) was 6,676 against 8,867 in the previous year. Enquiries are being made as to the cause of this falling off. The average attendance for the past five years is 258,571, and the official record for eleven years stands as follows:-

- 3. Condition of Building .- No addition has been proposed as yet. The existing building is kept in good repair by the Department of Public Works.
- Furniture .- The small grant provided under this heading was not fully expended, an office almirah for the preservation of records being the only article of importance provided during the year.
  - Natural History Section .-
- Aves. More than a hundred specimens of the indigenous birds (mostly from Hassan and Magadi) have been secured and set up by the Taxidermist. These specimens are fairly representative of the birds of the Province, and furnish a separate case in addition to replacing some decayed specimens in other cases. Nests have also received attention in arrangement and labelling.
- Mammals.-Although somewhat mismanaged in preparation, the most important addition under this class is the remains of the fine Orang-outang—Simia satyrus, which died at the gardens in April last. Mr. Van Ingen was to have set up the specimen but found the skinning so badly done by the Museum officials that he declined to undertake the work, which then devolved on the Taxidermist attached to the institution. Thus put on his mettle, the man did his very best, and the stuffed remains of the Kadu Manushya are not without interest. interest to visitors. I was unfortunately absent from the station when the animal died. A full-grown cheets and a few other specimens have been added to the stuffed collection.

- (c) Insecta.—The collection of butterflies and moths has mostly been improved by the purchase of new and rare specimens. A few insect pests have been collected in view to forming a special cabinet as suggested last year, but the work has been delayed by more argent duties. Destructive caterpillars received from Hassan and Tarikere and forwarded to the Indian Museum have been identified as larvæ of the Noctnes moth, Heliothis, armigero, which is identical with the dreaded "Bollworm" of the United States. Remedies have been suggested through this Department and published by the Government for the suppression of this pest.
- (d) Mollusca.—The more important shells have been provided with descriptive labels in separate cases where visitors can study them conveniently.
- 6. Forestry.—Short descriptive labels copied from the "Forest Trees of Mysore" are being attached to all the indigenous specimens of timber and it is hoped this useful work will soon be completed. The difficulty in getting labels promptly returned from the Government Press is the chief cause of delay.
- 7. Fibres.—Duplicate specimens have been removed to afford space for labelling and re-arranging the entire collection.
- 8. Cereals and pulses. These have also been overhauled, and are having descriptive labels attached to the most important exhibits.
- Minerals,—The labelling of minerals has received due attention, although
  much yet remains to be done. The collection of gems has been enriched by indigenous specimens of cornudum, fuchsite, apatite and kyanite presented by Dr. Evans,
  the State Geologist.
- 10. Coins.—Under this class, 1 gold, 108 silver, 236 copper, 1 zinc and 3 leaden coins have been added to the collection, the greater part being purchased at a cost of Rs. 225. More than half the above are new coins, while the duplicates will be exceedingly useful for exchange with private collectors or kindred institutions. The full collection of coins now stands as under:—

- 11. Imitation Jewelry.—Many of these have been electroplated, and all the sets have had Vernacular names attached to them. But efforts to increase the collection have not met with much encouragement. A full assortment of the simple ornaments worn by the nomad tribes of the country is desirable and will be acquired if possible. A history of the charms and foibles attached to such trinkets would also be of interest.
- 12. Arms.—A more effective arrangement of this group is being attempted. The additional specimens acquired by purchase consist of three Gurkha knives (kookeries), a Borneo Padang, eight Malay Creeses and a large bow with a set of arrows from New Guinea.
- 13. Library and Reading Room.—Many excellent books of reference including standard works on history, science and travels are now placed at the disposal of the student and general reader. But of the large number of persons who visit the Museum only a very small percentage find time or perhaps the inclination to refer to books. The "Educational Review" has been subscribed for and is placed on the table with other periodicals. The new books and pamphlets acquired during the year by presentation and purchase are named under Appendix B.
- 14. Art Sale Room. Sales realised on articles provided by the manufacturers, that is, put in by the latter for sale at their own risk, are slightly better than in the previous year.

But in the case of Government and Jail articles, the realisations are considerably less. This confidence on the part of artizans is encouraging, and will doubtless grow as the local demand for artware increases. Appended is an account current of sale transactions for the year:—




