

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IINDIRA GANDHI NATIONAL CENTRE FOR THE ARTS

Concept

The Indira Gandhi National Centre for the Arts (IGNCA), established in the memory of Smt. Indira Gandhi, is visualised as an autonomous centre encompassing the study and experience of all the arts--each form with its own integrity, yet within a dimension of mutual interdependence, interrelated with nature, the social structure and cosmology.

This view of the arts, integrated with and essential to the larger matrix of human culture, is predicated upon Smt. Gandhi's recognition of the role of the arts as essential to the 'integral quality of a person, at home with himself and society'. It partakes of the holistic world view so forcefully articulated throughout the Indian tradition, and emphasised by modern Indian leaders, especially Mahatma Gandhi and Rabindranath Tagore.

The arts are here understood to comprise the fields of creative and critical literature, written and oral; the visual arts, ranging from architecture, sculpture, painting and graphics to general material culture, photography and film, the performing arts of music, dance and theatre in their broadest connotation; and all else in fairs, festivals and life-style that has an artistic dimension. In its initial stages, the Centre will focus attention on India; it will later expand its horizons to other civilisations and cultures. Through diverse programmes of research, publication, training, creative activities and performance, the IGNCA seeks to place the arts within the context of the natural and human environment. The fundamental approach of the Centre in all its work is both multi-disciplinary and inter- disciplinary.

The principal aims of the Centre are:

- (i) To serve as a major resource centre for the arts, especially written, oral and visual source materials;
- (ii) To undertake research and publication programmes of reference works, glossaries, dictionaries and encyclopaedias concerning the arts, the humanities and general cultural heritage;
- (iii) To establish a tribal and folk arts division with a core collection for conducting systematic scientific studies and for live presentations;

- (iv) To provide a forum for creative and critical dialogue between and among the diverse arts, traditional and contemporary, through performances, exhibitions, multi-media projections, conferences, seminars and workshops;
- (v) To foster dialogue between the arts and current ideas in philosophy, science and technology, with a view towards bridging the gap in intellectual understanding that too often occurs between the modern sciences on the one hand and the arts and culture, including traditional skills and knowledge, on the other;
- (vi) To evolve models of research programmes and arts administration more appropriate to the Indian ethos;
- (vii) To elucidate the formative and dynamic factors in the complex web of interactions between diverse social strata, communities and regions;
- (viii) To promote awareness of and sensitivity to historical and cultural linkages between India and other parts of the world;
- (ix) To develop networks of communication with other national and international centres of arts and culture, and to affiliate with universities and other institutions of higher learning within India and abroad, towards the conduct and recognition of related research in the arts, the humanities and cultural heritage.

Through specific programmes and projects, the interdependence amongst the arts and between the arts and other forms of cultural expression, the mutual influences between diverse regions and the inter-relationship of the tribal, rural and urban as well as the literate and oral traditions will be investigated, recorded and presented.

Formation of the Trust

In pursuance of Government of India, Ministry of Human Resource Development (Department of Arts) Resolution No. F. 16-7/86-Arts dated 19th March, 1987, India Gandhi National Centre for the Arts Trust was duly constituted and registered at New Delhi on 24th March, 1987. The Trust was enlarged and reconstituted on subsequent occasions.

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The Trustees of the Indira Gandhi National Centre for the Arts during 1998-99 are listed in Annexure-I.

The Members of the Executive Committee of IGNCA Trust are listed in Annexure-II.

Organisation

To fulfil the objectives outlined in the Conceptual Plan of the Indira Gandhi National Centre for the Arts and its principal aims, the institution functions through following five Divisions that are autonomous in structure but interlocked in programming.

Kalanidhi Division

The Indira Gandhi Kalanidhi comprises (a) a Cultural Reference Library of multi-media collections to serve as a major Resource Centre for research in the humanities and the arts, supported by; (b) a computerised National Information System and Data Bank on arts, humanities and cultural heritage; (c) Cultural Archives and multi-media collections of artists/scholars.

Kalakośa Division

The Indira Gandhi Kalākośa undertakes fundamental research. It initiates long-term programmes for (a) a lexicon of fundamental concepts and interdisciplinary glossaries/thesauruses on basic technical terminologies in the arts and crafts; (b) a series of fundamental texts of the Indian arts; (c) a series of reprints of critical writing on Indian arts; and (d) a multi-volume encyclopaedia of the Indian arts; and (e) Area Studies.

Janapada-sampada Division

The Indira Gandhi Janapada-sampadā develops (a) a core collection of material and documentation of folk and trihal arts and crafts; (b) makes multimedia presentations; and (c) launches multi-disciplinary life-style studies of tribal communities for evolving alternative models for the study of the Indian cultural phenomenon in its totality and the interwebbing of environmental, ecological, agricultural, socio-economic, cultural and political parameters. This Divison has established a children's theatre; and proposes to set up a conservation laboratory.

Kalādaršana Division

The Indira Gandhi Kaladarsana provides a forum for inter-disciplinary seminars, exhibitions and performances on unified themes and concepts; the buildings will comprise three theatres and large galleries.

Sūtradbāra Division

The Indira Gandhi Sūtradhāra provides administrative, managerial and organisational support and services to all the other Divisions:

The Academic Divisions of the institution, namely Kalānidhi and Kalākośa concentrate on the collection of multi-media primary and secondary material, exploration of fundamental concepts, identification of principles of form, elucidation of technical terminologies at the level of theory and text (śāstra) and intellectual discourse (vimarśa) and interpretation at the level of mārga. Janapada-sampadā and Kalādarśana focus on manifestations, processes, life functions and life-styles, and oral traditions at the level of the loka, deśa, and jana. Together the programmes of all the four Divisions place the arts in their original context of life and relationship with other disciplines.

Methodologies of research, programming and final output are analogous. The work of each Division complements the programmes of the others.

ANNUAL REPORT FOR THE PERIOD 1st APRIL, 1998 TO 31st MARCH, 1999

BRIEF SUMMARY AND HIGHLIGHTS

Introduction

During 1998-99, the Indira Gandhi National Centre for the Arts (IGNCA) continued to progress in all areas of its activities despite some unexpected disruptions. The implementation of the majority of its programmes remained well within the specified targets. The activities of the Centre, particularly its exhibitions, lectures and presentations were widely appreciated. The Credit for successful execution of programmes and projects was possible mainly due to the guidance provide by Smt. Sonia Gandhi, the President of IGNCA Trust, Shri. P.V. Narasimha Rao, Chairman, Executive Committee; and overall supervision of Dr. Kapila Vatsyayan, Academic Director of the Centre.

As a principal resource centre for art and culture, the IGNCA in 1998-99 undertook a variety of programmes, viz., carrying out integrated studies. bringing out publications, holding of exhibitions, lectures, discussions, etc., and collection of reference and source materials. The highlights of IGNCA's activities mainly included : researches on diverse topics, from seminal concepts pertinent to the fundamental sciences, speculative thought and cultural traditions to contemporary studies, connected with the disciplines of archaeology, anthropology and art-history; compilation of interdisciplinary glossaries of technical terms; and organization of seminars, workshops, lectures, educative exhibitions, puppet and film shows, which served as a creative dialogue between scholars and common people and thereby contributing in the dissemination of knowledge at various socio-cultural levels. Constant efforts were made by IGNCA to further deepen and widen its base by undertaking collaborative programmes with many institutions and scholars in order to enhance its national and international network represented by individuals and learned bodies. Details of major programmes are as under :

Collections

During this year (1998-99) too the Reference Library continued to acquire printed books, microfilmed manuscripts, slides, photographs, films, audiovisual material etc., encompassing the field of history, archaeology, religions, philosophy, language, literature, arts, anthropology, ethnology etc., It added 3950 volumes of printed books. Of them 3143 books have been donated by

eminent individuals and institutions besides books were also received in exchange. Thus upto 31st March 1999, the total number of books comes to 1,13,033.

In addition, IGNCA received "Dev Murarka Collection" consisting of 6,750 volumes on art and literature and nearly 11,000 Journals and periodicals on art, literature, history and social science, in Russian and English languages after the death of Shri Murarka in Moscow.

Efforts have also been continued to access, classify, catalogue, document and computerize the material received during the previous year, During the period under report 6000 volumes of books were bound bringing the total number of bound volumes to 51,380.

Under the microfilm/microfiche programme, 727 rolls covering 7,749 manuscripts (5,58,782 folios) in Sanskrit and other languages written in different scripts; 34 rolls from Bayeriche Staatsbibliothek, Munich (Germany) and 7 rolls from Tubingen University, Tubingen (Germany), containing 404 and 49 Sanskrit manuscripts respectively; besides 131 microfiches on historical source material in Russian language from the Scientific Information in the Social Science (INION), Moscow, have been added to the Reference Library. Duplicate microfilm rolls pertaining to various collections were also prepared by in-house team and supplied to various holders of manuscripts collection as per terms of agreements.

In the programme of building up the slide collection on art and architecture 1,311 colour slides have been added to IGNCA collection which comprise 343 slides on little-know Kashmir School of miniature paintings alone besides other sources. Further, 968 slides were also prepared by in-house team of IGNCA.

In the Cultural Archives of the IGNCA two video documentations relating to the life of Santhals and contemporary visual arts of Bengal over 2000 slides covering illustrations from a manuscript of Bhagvata-Purana; items of Coomaraswamy collection, masks and Rajasthani Phad, etc., were acquired.

The Janapada-sampada Division also continuted to enrich its archival collection by the acquisition of 26 traditional masks from different areas of India and 28 from foreign countries. In addition, 38 Chikan embroidery garments were also purchased under the programme of creativity of women in their daily life and life-style.

Programmes

With the specific purpose of looking into the textual traditions pertaining to Indian-art and culture and bringing to light the knowledge and wisdom enshrined therein, the Kalakośa Division of IGNCA had taken up diverse programmes of research, compilation of lexicons, bringing out critical editions of the fundamental texts relating to the field of music, dance, architecture, sculpture, painting, rituals, traditions and allied subjects. Consequently the Division continued its efforts to bring out lexicons, critical editions of seminal texts, research work and monograph based on in-depth studies, besides reprinting of well-known critical writings of well-known scholars, whenever possible with revisions. The significant publications brought out in 1998-99 comprised: (1) Kalātattvakośa Volume IV, edited by Dr. Kapila Vatsyayan; (2) Latyayana-Śrauta-Sūtra Volumes I, Il and III, edited and translated by Shri H.G. Ranade; (3) Sangītopanisatsāroddhāra, edited and translated by Allyn Miner; (4) Nartana-Nirnaya Volume III, edited and translated by R. Sathyanarayana; (5) A.K. Coomaraswamy's Hinduism and Buddhism, edited by K.N. lengar; (6) Barabudur by Paul mus, translated into English by A.W. Macdonald; and (7) Prof. N.K. Bose Memorial Lecture (III in the series) delivered by M.A. Dhaky.

As a part of the East-Asian Studies Programme, two monograph containing research papers titled (i) "Across the Himalayan Gap: An Indian Quest For Understanding China", and (ii) "In the Footsteps of Xuanzang: Tan Yun-shan and India" have been brought out. A monograph containing select papers of late Dr. H.B. Sarkar on South-East Asian heritage has been finalized for printing.

Equally significant publications were brought out by the Janapada-sampada Division in 1998-99 containing papers presented during the seminar/conferences and research works carried out by various scholars. Notable monographs published during the year under reference consisted of (i) "The Use of Cultural Heritage as a tool for Development" by Baidyanath Saraswati; (ii) "Conservation of Rock-art" edited by Dr. Bansilal Mella; and (iii) "Dhvani", edited by Prof. S.C. Malik.

In addition, the Kalanidhi Division also produced two important Bibliographies on Shadow Pupperty and Zoroastrian Studies.

Under the "Great Masters India Series", IGNCA recorded in-depth interviews with Ms. Zohra Sehgal, well-known actor and theatre expert in July, 1998 and

Shri B.C. Sanyal, reputed painter in his nineties, in August, 1998.

Kalanidhi Division in 1998-99 documented nearly ninety one events through Audio/Video recording and still photography which included Life of Gaddis of Himanchal Pradesh, Kumbhabhisekam in Brhadtsvara Temple. Thanjavur.

During the period under report, the Janapada-Sampada Division completed three pilot projects, (i) "Shamanism and Healing: Asstudy among the Indo-Tibetans of Spiti" by Shri Shrish Jain; (ii) "The Guruvayūr temple: Its role in socio-religious movements and cultural networks of Kerala" by Dr. P.R.G. Mathur; and (iii) "Basic Sounds: A study of Sound Symbolism of Santhals" by Prof. Khageswar Mahapatra. Further, three new projects (i) Water Cosmology and Popular Culture: An Anthropological Study of Indian Civilization; (ii) The Healing Chants; and (iii) The Calendrical Rites and Rituals of the Meiteis (of Manipur); have been, respectively, assigned to Dr. Govinda Rath, Dr. Desmond L. Karmawphlang and Dr. N. Debendra Singh.

Visitors

A large number of specialists and distinguished scholars including International Consultants, visited the IGNCA. Academic Affiliations

IGNCA granted academic affiliations to five foreign and two Indian scholars during the year 1998-99.

Seminars/Conferences

The following eight seminars/conferences/workshops were organised by the Centre during 1998-99:

 IGNCA's Special Session in the 14th International Congress of Authropological and Ethnological Sciences.

The IGNCA organised a special academic Session " Alternative Paradigms in Anthropology" during the "14th International Congress of Anthropological and Ethnological Sciences" held in Williamsburg, Virginia, U.S.A. from July 26- August 1, 1998.

The IGNCA session aimed at putting across to scholars and researchers, the perspective, aims, objectives and achievements of the Centre. The session challenged the hegemony of the Western/European hermencutics, and focused on evolving methodologies derived from within the cultures. In the Conference, the IGNCA was represented by Prof. B.N. Saraswati, Prof. S.C. Malik and Dr. Molly Kaushal.

The IGNCA session was well received and well attended by reputed anthropologists form U.S.A., Korea, Mexico, Venezuela, Ethopia, Europe and India.

ii. Rajbhaşa : Sanskritik Sandarhb

A seminar on 'Rajbhasa: Sanskritik Sandarbh' was held on 13.08.1998 in which the role of Hindi as an official language in the context of culture was mainly discussed. Several Hindi writers, journalists and scholars participated.

iii. "Multimedia for Humanities"

An International Conference on "Multimedia for Humanities" was organised on 5-7th October 1998 at IGNCA, discussed the issues relating to the applicability of computers in humanities. Nearly seventy-five delegates from India and abroad participated in the Conference.

iv. "Pilgrimage and Complexity"

A unique International seminar on "Pilgrimage and Complexity" was held in IGNCA from 5th to 9th January, 1999 wherein about 50 eminent scholars from India and abroad participated. Papers presented during the seminar discussed issues relating to the concept, purpose, origin, growth and current practices and complexities of Pilgrimage and its symbolism besides its connection with astronomical constellations.

v. "Indo-Thai Art"

A one-day seminar on "Indo-Thai Art" was organised in IGNCA on 30th March, 1999. Seminar was inaugurated by Prof. Lokesh Chandrs, Chairman of International Academy of Indian Culture, New Delhi. Nearly 40 scholars from India and Thailand participated in the seminar.

Workshops

vi. "Palaeography and Manuscriptology"

A workshop on "Palaeography and Manuscriptology" was organised by IGNCA in collaboration with University of Kerala in Thiruvananthapuram (Kerala) from 8-27 March, 1999. The workshop was attended by 39 young scholars and 22 resource persons.

The purpose to organise the workshop was to train young Sanskrit scholars in the methodology of deciphering ancient and medieval manuscripts and bringing out their critical editions.

vii. "Designing and Publication"

A two and half day lecture training workshop on "Designing and Publication" was conducted by Shri Abhay Mohan Lal, Project Manager on 22-23 July, 1998 at the Central Secretariat Library, Shastri Bhawan. A demo on interactive IGNCA profile was also shown to the participants along with the presentation on the Rock Art and Gitagovinda Multimedia Presentations.

viii. "Identification and Enhancement of India's Cultural Heritage: An Internal Necessity in the Management of Development"

IGNCA organised a workshop in collaboration with UNESCO on "Identification and Enhancement of India's Cultural Heritage: An Internal Necessity in the Management of Development" as a part of its Unesco Chair Programme on November 19-24, 1998. Some 20 scholars working in the field of Life-style studies from the major cultural regions of India participated and discussed various aspects of cultural heritage as a tool for development.

ix. "Dissemination: Plans, Problems and Prospects"

IGNCA also organised a workshop in collaboration with Sangeet Natak Akademi on "Dissemination: Plans, Problems and Prospects" at IGNCA complex on 21.12.1998. The workshop was attended by about 45 participants from IGNCA and Sangeet Natak Akademi.

Exhibitions

Kalādarsana Division during 1998-99 has organised six exhibitions viz., (1) Pañcatantra; (2) Water, the Sustainer; (3) Our Architectural Heritage; (4) Nāda: An Experience in Sound; (5) Thanks - Buddhist Paintings from the Stok Palace Museum, Ladakh; and (6) Transcendence; besides several film shows, hellet and puppet performances.

(i) Pañcatantra

On the occasion of the 26th World Congress on Children's Books, an exhibition on Panchatantra, the famous ancient collection of stories in Sanskrit, was arranged at IGNCA from 19th September to 30th October 1998, in collaboration with the Association of Writers and Illustrators for Children (AWIC).

Display of books, illustrations based on Pañcatantra stories by traditional Kalamkari artists of Kalahasti (Andhra Pradesh), College-paintings of Shri Haku Shah on same topic and Multimedia presentations on the contents of Pañcatantra was arranged in the exhibition.

(ii) Water, the Sustainer

Between 16th October 98 to 29th October, 98, the IGNCA mounted an exhibition titled " Water, The Sustainer" using select photographs of

Shri Ashok Dilwali. Exhibition has tried to depict wonder of nature in the presence of water in various forms like dewdrops, lakes, rivers, snow, waterfalls, frost, mountain springs, hailstorms, clouds, fog and mist.

(iii) Our Architectural Heritage

Another interesting exhibition illustrating Anil Dave's photographs was organised by IGNCA under the title 'Our Architectural Heritage' on November 3-21, 1998. In these photographs Shri Dave has tried to capture the images of beautiful and impressive old houses of India. In fact, each photographs conveyed a story of love, care and passion besides, architectural beauty.

(iv) Nāda- an experience in sound

An exhibition, entitled " Nada - an experience in sound" - a presentation of sound installations, was held in collaboration with Max Mueller Bhavan from December 10-25, 1998.

(v) Thankas- Buddhist paintings from the Stok Palace Museum, Ladakh

In collaboration with Namgyal Institute for Research on Ladakhi Art and Culture (NIRLAC), IGNCA mounted an exhibition titled "Thankas" from February 10-27, 1999 at IGNCA. Thirty five 'Thankas', exemplifying maturity of expertise of Ladakhi painters some centuries ago were displayed in exhibition. These masterpieces are stated to have been made during the reign of king Tashi Namgyal (1500-1530).

(vi) Transcendence

Entitled as "Transcendence", the Exhibition, consisting of attractive photographs taken by Shri Sunil Adesara, was held in Matighar within IGNCA complex from March 9-21, 1999. The exhibits mirrored the abundance and blossoming forth of the energy in the creative process latent in nature.

Performances

(i) Kalpavīksa

Children's Play: A Children's Play "Kalpavrksa", which highlighted Gandhiji's ideals of "non-violence" and "truthfulness", was organised at Gandhi Darshan, Rajghat and at Dilli Haat, New Delhi on 18th and 20th

April, 1998 respectively. Children from different schools of Delhi participated.

(ii) Ballet on Pañcatantra

IGNCA also organised a ballet performance by Ranga Sri Little Ballet Troupe, Bhopal titled "The Winning of Friends", based on a story from Pañchatantra at New Delhi on 23rd September, 1998. It was witnessed by some 275 delegates to the 26th IBBY conference hosted by the Association of Writers and Illustrators for Children (AWIC), i.e. the Indian Section of International Board on Books for Young People, as well as other local guests.

Film Shows

IGNCA organised a two-day film show on 20-12 May, 1998 for about 1000 children attending the music and dance classes at the Summer Camp at Bal Bhawan, New Delhi. On the occasion, a screening of Video-documentation of Rāmāyaṇa by Little Ballet Troupe of Bhopal was arranged for NDMC children on 28th and 29th July, 1998 at various schools in New Delhi. On 26th August, 98 films on the life of 'Todas' of Nilgiri and 'Hemis Festival' of Ladakh were also screened at IGNCA complex.

In addition, twenty eight lectures/lecture-demonstrations on different aspects of art, architecture, archaeology, culture, art-history, aesthetics, music, philosophy and science were held during the period under report.

Memorial Lectures

(i) Acharya Hazari Prasad Dwivedi Memorial Lecture

IGNCA organised the Fisteenth Acharya Hazari Prasad Dwivedi Memorial Lecture (in Hindi) in collaboration with Acharya Hazari Prasad Dwivedi Memorial Trust on 19th August, 1998 at New Delhi.

This year's lecture was delivered by the renowned scholar Dr. Namvar Singh of Jawaharlal Nehru University, New Delhi, on "Kabir's Anguish". The lecture was attended by a large number of scholars and authors and general public.

(ii) Dr. Suniti Kumar Chatterji Memorial Lecture

The IGNCA also organised Dr. Suniti Kumar Chatterji Memorial Lecture

on November 23-24, 1998 at New Delhi. The lecture was delivered by Prof. Satya Ranjan Banerjee of Calcutta. The first part of the lecture was on "Dr. Suniti Kumar Chatterji's approach to Indo-European Linguistics" and the second was on "Origin and Development of the Linguistic Thoughts and Ideas of the Indo-European People". The lecture was attended by a large number of scholars, journalists, and university students.

IGNCA programmes on Doordarshan

Twenty two important programmes of IGNCA have been telecast on the Doordarshan during the priod under reference.

Special Functions

- 1. Three volumes of T.K. Govinda Rao's work on "Trinity of Karnataka Music" were released by the former President of India, Shri R. Venkataraman, in a special function organised at IGNCA on 26th September, 1998. It was followed by vocal recital by Shri T.K. Govinda Rao on Karnatak Music. The function was attended by a large number of music lovers, scholars, journalists, etc.
- 2. In another important function, held on the 14th December, 1998 at Ashok Hall, Rashtrapati Bhawan, New Delhi, nearly 31 IGNCA's recent publications on diverse subjects and areas besides five video-documentations on the 'Life-style Studies' and 'Behind Curtain Series' and three CD ROM's "Devdasi Murai", "Man and Mask", and "Elizabeth Brunner's Paintings", (produced by IGNCA), were presented to the Hon'ble Shri K.R. Narayanan, President of India. This achievement of IGNCA was highly appreciated by distinguished guests, scholars, journalists and others present.

Indira Gandhi Memorial Fellowship

IGNCA announced the award of Indira Gandhi Memorial Fellowship for 1998 to two selected scholars, (i) Dr. Padma M. Sarangapani of Bangalore and (ii) Shri Bambang Sunarto of the University of Surakarta, Indonesia.

UNDP

Eight important Multimedia projects to be used for public presentations through CD-ROMS have been in different stages of preparation.

Officers of the Cultural Informatics Laboratory and academic personnel of IGNCA were imparted appropriate training and exposure to multimedia technology within India and abroad through study tours, fellowship programmes, participation in seminars, conferences, workships, symposia and in-house training programmes.

INTERNET and WEBSITE Facilities

Two Internet Services, one in the Cultural Informatics Lab and the other in the Library have been installed.

An IGNCA Website has also been established through the NIC.

Collaborative Programmes

During the period under reference, IGNCA had a close interaction with a number of academic bodies and learned institutions in diverse fields within India and abroad.

Investment of Trust Funds

For smoother and efficient investment of the Trust's funds, the IGNCA had set up two Committee's viz., "Committee for Long-Term Investment of IGNCA funds" and (ii) "Committee for Short Term Investment of surplus interest income".

Two meetings of the "Long-Term Investment Committee" were held on 10th February, 1999 and 16th March 1999 during the period under report. The Short - Term Investment Committee met as and when found necessary or its approval was sought by circulation.

During 1998-99, Rs. 22.70 crores on Long - Term basis and Rs. 5.40 crores on Short - Term basis were invested in the Public Sector Undertakings and Public Sector Banks on the recommendations of the Long - Terms Investment and Short - Term Investment Committees respectively.

Annual Action Plan:

The Executive Committee and the Trust of IGNCA accorded its approval to the Annual Action Plan 1999-2000. Targets, which were laid down within the framework of the approved programmes during the previous year were achieved, by various Divisions, in most cases. Details of activities undertaken during 1998-99 in respect of each Division are mentioned in the pages that fellow:

KALĀNIDHI

(Division of Library, Information Systems, Cultural Archives)

Kalanidhi Division comprises an outstanding Reference Library and Cultural Achives with access to multimedia data-base and information systems. The IGNCA Reference Library has besides printed books, a unique collection of microfilmed manuscripts from Indian and Foreigh sources and its archives contains slides, photographs on sculptures, architecture, paintings and other objects and a sizeable number of audio/video recordings and other materials.

Programme A: Reference Library

Acquisitions Printed Material

During the year under report, 3,950 volumes of books in print were added to the Reference Library and of them 3,143 books were either received as gifts from eminent persons and institutions or obtained on exchange basis. In the last quarter of the year a significant donation in the form of a large collection of books and periodicals was received in the Library according to the wishes of the donor, late Shri Dev Murarka, a noted Indian Journalist lived and died in Moscow. The collection comprised 6,750 books on Russian History, Art and Culture and about 11,000 issues of peridocals. Out of these 511 volumes have been accessioned. Remaining books are being added to the collection as and when these are accessioned.

Other important donors of books during the year included Prof. A.V. Suraweera Deputy Minister for Culture, Government of Srilanka; Mrs. Krishna Riboud of Paris, France; International institute for Buddhist Studies, Tokyo, Japan; French Hopp Museum of Eastern Art, Budapest; Centre for Tibetan Studies, Beijing, China; Nehru Memorial Museum and Library, New Delhi; Roerich Adhyayan Parishad, Delhi; Vipassana Research Institute, Igatputi, Maharashtra; Christian Institute for Religious Studies, Banglore; embassy of China, New Delhi; and Shri H.Y. Sharada Prasad, New Delhi.

The total collection of printed books in the Reference Library upto the end of the year comprised 1,13,033 volumes.

Journals

The Library continued to subscribe academic and technical journals as reported in the last year. The number of subscribed journals is now 399. The

subject areas covered are Anthropology, Archaeology, Architecture, Arts, Bibliography, Book Reviews, Computer and information Science, Conservation, Culture, Dance Linguistics, Literature, Museum studies, Music, Numismatics, Oriental Studies, Performing Arts, Philosophy, Puppety, Religion, Science, Social Science, Theatre and Area Studies.

Cataloguing

During the year 2785 volumes of books were classified and catalogued and 848 records of books entered into LIBSYS. Under cataloguing of non-print material 258 Audio-Cassettes were catalogued. Five rolls of National Library of Indonesia covering 50 titles of manuscripts were catalogued and twenty five records of microfilmed manuscripts belonging originally to Maulana Azad Arabic & Persian Research Institute, Tonk, Rajasthan were entered into Libsys data base.

Binding

During the Year 6000 volumes of books were bound bringing the total number of bound volumes to 51,380.

MICROFORMS

In-House Production

Duplication

The programme of duplication of microfilm rolls was also continued, as per usual practice and for supplying copies to the owners/custodians of original manuscripts and to be used in the Reference for consultation purposes. Accordingly, 3,537 microfilm rolls of manuscripts belonging to the collections of (1) Government Oriental Manuscripts Library, Chennai; (2) Oriental Research Institute and Manuscripts Library, Thiruvananthapuram; (3) Saraswati Bhavan, Library, Varanasi; (4) Bharat Itihasa Samsodhana Mandal, Pune; (5) Bhandarkar Oriental Research Institute, Pune; (6) Rajasthan Oriental Research Institute, Jodhpur; (7) Rampur Raza Library, Rampur, (8) Indian Council for Cultural Relations, New Delhi; (9) Bhogilal Lehar Chand Institute of Indology, New Delhi; (10) Keladi Museum and Historical Research Bureau, Keladi; and (11) Oriental Research Institute, Mysore; were duplicated by the in-house team of IGNCA. In addition, 4,100 microfiche received from IDC Leiden were also duplicated.

Microfilmomg

During the year 1,237 positive microfilm rolls were handed over by Inhouse Production Unit to Reference Library for the use of scholars. These included: 220 rolls of microfilmed copies of manuscripts from the collections of Oriental Research Institute and Manuscripts Library, Thiruvanantapuram; 723 rolls from Bhandarkar Oriental Research Institute, Pune; 61 Rolls from Government Oriental Manuscripts Library, Chennai; 63 rolls from Indian Council for Cultural Relations, New Delhi; 1 roll from Rampur Raza Library, Rampur; I roll from Bhogilal Leharchand Institute of Indology, New Delhi; 1 roll from Ramakrishna Math; 5 rolls from Oriental Research Institute, Mysore; 51 rolls from Saraswati Bhawan Library, Varanasi; 47 rolls from Bharat Itihasa Sansodhana Mandal, Pune; 25 rolls from Keladi Museum; 37 rolls from Rajasthan Oriental Research Institute, Jodhpur and 2 rolls of special IGNCA rare Collection.

Microfiche

During the period under report 131, microfiches were also received from Institute of Scientific Information of Social Science, Russian Academy (INION), Moscow.

Manuscript Data-base

During the year 1998-99, 8000 computer entries of catalogue cards were validated and 4000 records modified in the computer. 26,500 records of

catalogue cards were entered into the computer. In addition, 3000 records of catalogue cards were transliterated from Roman to Devnagari and prepared 2,346 data-sheets of D.A.V. college collection, Chandigarh and data-sheet on 210 manuscripts on Pañcatantra from various catalogues.

Slides

During the period under report, 343 slides on Kashmir School of miniature paintings were acquired from various sources for the library collection. Besides, slides of 968 illustrations from Balisattra Bhargvata-Purana belonging to a Assam collection have been prepared.

A total number of 1,025 archival slides from National Museum: Bhandarkar Oriental Research Institute; Himalayan Scenery Collection; Archaeological Survey of India; manuscripts of GTtagovinda from Alwar Museum; and Balisattra Bhagavata - Purana; were accessioned.

During the period under report, 693 main entry catalogue cards were prepared on slides, and 260 cards were fed into the computer to be used by researches. Duplicated slide numbering 1,500 illustrated manuscripts of Rampur Raza Library were prepared and handed over to Assistant Librarian of Rampur Raza Library. The Reference Library provided 5,766 slides with necessary information to scholars for study.

Conservation

During the period under reference, the Conservation Unit carried out preservation of artifacts, rare books, palm-leaf manuscripts, microfilms and microfiches.

Programme B: National Information System and Data Bank

Kalinidhi + B has been vested with the responsibility of assessing the computerisation requirements of all Divisions, analysing the data, designing the developing information system, maintaining and operationalising them and imparting training to staff-members.

Training

During the year an In-house Computer training programme on MS- Word/ WIN-95 was organised in August, 1998. IGNCA's academic and secretarial staff members were given training.

Document Imaging System

The system is basically used for preserving records of all the Divisions of IGNCA in the last ten years in an archival data bank. During the period under report, 1,430 pages of important documents pertaining to different Divisions were fed into the Document Imaging Systmes. Numbering 7,500 records of manuscript catalogue cards have also been intered into the Libsys Software.

Programme C : Cultural Archives

The task for collecting, photo-documenting, filming and audio recording of little-known aspects of India's cultural heritage has been assigned to the Cultural Archives Unit of the Kalanidhi Division. The details of work carried out during the year is as under:

Accessioning and Cataloguing

A total of 1,300 slides on art and architecture of India, Nepal and Cambodia pertaining to the Lance Dane Collection; 608 (78 rpm) music records of Carnatic and Hindustani classical music (VAK Ranga Rao collection); have been catalogued. Documentation on Sadguru Shri Kanchikamakoti Math and other objects belonging to Sadagopan collection and Ananda Coomaraswamy collection; of non-print material were accessed and card indexed.

Documentation

Some of the major in-house documentations cover interviews with well-known personalities in the field of art, literature, music and dance as listed below:

- (i) Ms. Zohra Sehgal, well-known actor and theatre expert by Dr. Kapila Vastyayan
- (ii) Shri B.C. Sanyal reputed painter by Dr. Kapila Vatsyayan

In addition, the following documentation programmes have been commissioned and are under various stages of production:

During 1998-99, 2000 original slides and 325 black/white photographs of the 'Bhagvata-Purana illustrations'; 125 black/white photographs of the 'Coomaraswamy collection'; and photographs of 75 masks; have been prepared for Archival references. Seven thousand slides of the Lance Dane collection were also duplicated.

Over eighty events were covered through audio/video and still-photography of the significant documentation including puppet show on 'Nehru -- Apostle of Peace'; 'Handicrafts of Varanasi' and 'Winning of the Friends' by Rangashri Ballet Troupe of Varanasi during the period under report.

Kalākośa

(Division of Research and Publication and Area Studies)

Functioning as the main research and publication wing of the Institution, the Kalalośa Division carries out investigations in the intellectual and textual traditions connected with arts in their multi-layered and multi-disciplinary dimensions. It endeavours to place the arts within the integral framework of a cultural system, combining the textual with the eral, the visual with the aural and theory with practice.

Keeping these aims in view, the Division has (a) identified primary concepts, fundamental to the Indian world-view, which has permeated all disciplines and dimensions of life; (b) specified primary textual source material hitherto unknown, unpublished or inaccessible for publication in the original languages with translation; (c) spelled out a plan of publication of works of scholars and specialists who have been pioneers in comprehending the artistic traditions through a holistic vision, a cross-cultural approach and multidisciplinary methodology; and (d) has drawn up a draft plan for launching a programme of a 21-volume Encyclopaedic work on Arts under a special project.

The programmes of the Division fall into the following broad categories :

Programme A: Kalātatīvakośa

(A Lexicon of fundamental Concepts of the Indian Arts)

The first programme, the Kalātattvakośa is intended to serve as a lexicon of fundamental concepts of the Indian arts. A list of about 250 terms occurring in primary texts of several disciplines and seminal to the arts has been prepared. Each concept has been investigated through primary texts of several disciplines to select a term having a core meaning of a pervasive nature, yet has also developed different contextual meanings. Through such a compilation, analysis and re-assembling, it is possible to reconstruct the intrinsic holistic nature of the Indian tradition and its essential inter-disciplinary approach. As mentioned in the earlier reports, the 1st volume of Kalātattvakośa containing eight terms was published in 1988; vol. If of the work dealing with 16 terms relating to space and time was released in March, 1992; Vol. III of the work on the theme of the elements or Mahābhūtas, containing eight articles on each of the eight terms, was published in the year 1996-97; and Vol. IV, covering the seminal terms comprising seven articles, indriya, dravya, dhātu, guṇa/doṣa, adhibhūta/ adhidaiva/adhyātma, sthūla/sūksma/para, sṛṣṭi/sthiti/samhāra was brought out in the year 1998.

Attempts to bring out the other volumes in the same series have also progressed well. Ten articles out of twelve of Kalātattvakośa volume V, viz., ākāra/ākṛti, sākalā-niṣkala, rūpa-pratirūpa, pratimā-mūrti-vigraha-arcā, rekhā, citi-caitya-stūpa, alankāra, prāsāda and bandha-prabandha, have been collected and their editing has been undertaken. Collection of references for Volume VI, comprising ten terms viz., ābhāsa-chāyā, abhinaya, bimba-pratibimba, sādṛśya sārūpya, vyakta-avykta, pratīka, linga, vṛtti-rīti, pratibimba and anukarana and Volume VII, containing sixteen terms viz., kalaśa, kuṇḍa, garbha, padma, maṇḍala, mithuna, mudrā, yantra, yūpa, yoni, latā, vṛkṣa, vedī/sṭhaṇḍila, sthāna and svastika/nandyāvarta have been initiated during the period under report.

The Annual meeting of the Expert Committee for the compilation of further volumes of the Kalātattvakośa was held on 12th December, 1998. The meeting finalised the terms to be included in the Kalātattvakośa volumes VII and VIII. Noted scholars like Prof. Vidya Niwas Misra and Dr. R.C. Sharma of Varanasi; Dr. H.G. Ranade of Pune, Dr. R. Sathyanarayana of Mysore; besides others participated in the discussions.

Programme B : Kalāmülśātra

(Series of Fundamental texts bearing on the arts)

The second on-going and long range programme of the Kalākośa Division is to identify fundamental texts relating to the Indian arts ranging from architecture, sculpture, painting, music dance and theatre and publish them in the series critically edited with annotations and translations.

Commencing with the release of a few publications in 1988-89, Kalakośa Division has brought out twenty-five volumes upto March 1999 under the series of Kalamulasastra (KMS).

During 1998-99, the Nartana-nirnaya (Vol. III) - a notable Sanskrit treaties on Indian music and dance, edited and translated by Prof. R. Sathyanarayana; Sangītopanisat sāroddhāra - a fourteenth century musicological text from Western India, edited and translated by Allyn Miner and Lātyāyana-śrauta-sūtra (in 3 volumes), an important sūtra text, edited and translated by Dr. H.G. Ranade; were published.

Manuscripts of Rusagangādhara, Rāgalakṣaṇa, Citrasūtra of Viṣṇudhar-mottarapurāna, Iśvarasamhitā, Caturdaṇdī-Prakāśikā, Puṣpasūtra, and Kāṇva-śatapatha-brāhmaṇa Vol. III have been received and are at different stages of editing and printing.

Preparation of critical editions of several other ancient and medieval texts, such as, Rāgavibodha, Tantrasamuccaya, Tantrasara-sarigraha, Satasāhasrikāprajňapāramitā, Bhāvaprakāsana, Sarasvatīkanthābharana and Vāstumandana have also been in progress.

Programme C: Kalasamalocana

Kalāsamālocana series comprises publications containing critical writings on different facets of the arts and aesthetics. One part of the series concentrates on works of eminent scholars who have dwelt upon the fundamental concepts, identified perennial sources and created bridges of communication by juxtaposing diverse traditions. Often their works are inaccessible, as they are either out of print or are not available in English.

In the Kalāsamālocana series, the Centre has attempted to bring to light some of such invaluable contributions through modestly priced publications.

Generally, revised and thematically rearranged editions and translations of a select number of authors and works are being published in this series.

Starting with the publication of a couple of a volumes in 1988, as many as 38 books have been published by 1998-99. During the year, Barabudur by Paul Mus translated into English by A.W. Macdonald; and A.K. Coomaraswamy's Hinduism and Buddhism edited by K.N. Iengar and Dr. Rama P. Coomaraswamy were published under the Kalāsamālocana Series.

In addition, more than half a dozen monographs including "Jain Temples of Dilwara and Ranakpur by Prof. Sehdev Kumar; Iconography of the Buddhist Sculpture of Orrisa by Prof. Thomas Donaldson; Ananda K. Coomaraswamy's Essays on Vedanta; Essays on Jaina Art; Baroque India by Prof. Jose Pereira; and The City and the Stars: Cosmic Urban Geometries, edited by Prof. J.M.Malville and Dr. Lalit M. Gujral; Anand Coomaraswamy's bibliographies; and Kitāb-i-tasavīr-i-shishāgarān Vaghairah wa bayan-i-alat-i-anha, translated and edited by Dr. Mehr Afshan Farooqui; are in different stages of publication and editing.

Other Publication

A catalogue of the publications of IGNCA was brought out during 1998-99.

Programme D: Metaphors of Indian Arts (A Five volume work)

The Metaphors of Indian Arts

The 'Metaphors of Indian Art' is planned as a multi-volume project to embody research on a few seminal metaphors, such as ' $b\tau ja'$, 'purusa', 'skambha', 'bindu', 'sūnya', etc. Under this project, the material collected for its first volume on ' $B\tau ja'$ has been taken-up for editing. The material for the next volume entitled on 'Purusa' is under compilation.

Numismatic Arts of India

The Volume containing comprehensive data on the historical and artistic aspects of Indian coins, prepared by Prof. B.N. Mukhurjee has been submitted to IGNCA. The output is in the following form:

- (i) Documentation of Indian Numismatic Art
- (ii) Concordance and Inventory of Coins
- (iii) A monograph: Numismatic Art of India upto 1835
- (iv) Album of Masterpieces of Indian Coins

Workshops

The Sixth workshop on "Palaeography and Manuscriptology" was organised in collaboration with the Oriental Research Institute and Manuscript Library, University of Kerala, Thiruvananthapuram, from March 8 - 27, 1999. The workshop was intended to train Sanskrit and Prakrit scholars of younger generation in the methodology of textual criticism and deciphering ancient/medieval scripts and bringing out their critical editions.

The entire programme of the sixth Workshop was divided in thirty-three sessions including the Inaugural and Valedictory sessions. Thirty-nine participants, viz., twelve from different educational instituions of the country, four from IGNCA and twenty-three from local academic bodies. Thiruvananthapuram, were enrolled as trainees. Fifteen senior professors and scholars were invited as resource persons. Dr. K.K. Thaplyal, retired professor of Ancient History and Archaeology, University of Lucknow; Dr. Prakash Pandey of Shri Ganganath Jha Sanskrit Vidyapeeth, Allahabad; Prof. N.P. Unni. Vice-Chancellor, Shree Sankaracharya Sanskrit University, Kaladi, Kerala; Dr. Ratna Basu, Head of the Department of Sanskrit University of Calcutta; Prof. K.V. Sarma, former Director of VVRI, Hoshiarpur; Dr. S.A.S. Sarma of French Institute of Indology, Pondicherry; and Prof. T.N. Dharmadhikari, an outstanding scholar of Vedic studies from Pune, delivered lectures on structure, richness and importance of Sanskrit language; history of manuscriptology; preparation of various indexes to the critical editions of Vedic texts; reading and editing of inscriptions for reconstructing the political and cultural history of different periods; causes of corruptions in the manuscripts; canons of textual criticism, besides on the origin, growth and decipherment of Sarada Newart and Granthascripts.

Training of scholars

Dr. V.S. Shukla and Dr. S. Chattopadhyaya, Sanskrit scholars serving in Kalakosa Division of IGNCA were sent to Germany under UNDP scheme for three months from September to November 1998 for receiving training in textual criticism at the Institut fur Kultur and Gaschichte Indiens und Tibets, University of Hamburg under Prof. Albrecht Wezler, Director of the Institute.

Programme E: Area Studies

Under the Area Studies Programme of IGNCA, Kalākośa Division focuses attention on some specific cultural areas with which India has had a close and active interaction viz., South-East Asian, East Asia, Central Asia, etc. The progress in this field during 1998-99 is as under:

South-East Asian Studies

Select research papers on the history and culture of South-East Asia authored by late Prof. H.B. Sarkar, an eminent scholar on the subject, have been finalized for publication.

A seminar on "Indo-Thai Art' was organised in IGNCA on 30th March, 1999. The seminar was inaugurated by Prof. Lokesh Chandra, Chairman of International Academy of Indian Culture, New Delhi. The seminar was attended by 40 participants from India and Thailand.

East Asian Studies

The following two publications have been brought out under the East Asian Studies Unit.

- (i) In the Footsteps of Xuanzang: Tan Yun-Shan and India edited by prof. TanChung.
- (ii) Across the Himalayan Gap: An Indian Quest for Understanding china edited by Prof. Tan Chung.

This first book, containing sixty mostly written by contemporary Indian experts on China, also includes observations of Indian scholar on the subject and three speeches delivered by Indian leaders in Chinese Universities. This monograph can provide a good source book for individuals interested in the study of Sino-Indian relations. Chinese version of this book editied by Prof. Tan Chung has also been brought out by the Hong Kong University.

The second book comprises many learned research articles by Indian Sinologists of different aspects of Chinese culture, keeping in view ancient historical as well as modern context.

These publications were released by Hon'ble Shri K.R. Narayanan, Hon'ble President of India at a Special Function organised at Santiniketan, West Bengal, in connection with the commemorating the birth centenary of Prof. Tan Yun-

Shan, founder Director of the Cheena Bhavan, Visvabharati, Santiniketan, on 7th November, 1998. On this occasion, a book authored by the Hon'ble President Shri K.R. Narayan, giving a warm message for this volume was also released.

In addition, monograph titled "A Chronology of India-China Interface through the Ages", is under compilation. The book to be edited by Prof. Tan Chung in collaboration with Prof. Geng Yinzeng of Beijing University.

As a part of its cultural exchange programme, a young lady painter, named Linki from China, popularly known as the 'Wonder girl' was invited to visit India during the month of November 1998. Ms. Linxi is credited to have painted to her canvas a very difficult theme, like the "Paradise of Amitabha". With the help of IGNCA she held exihibitions of her paintings in India International Centre and Santiniketan. The Unit also organised a public lecture in March 1999 by Prof. Wong Sui-Lun, the Pro-Vice-Chancellor of the Hongkong University in IGNCA and he spoke on the "National Minorities of China".

Slavic and Central Asian Studies

This unit was established to facilitate the study of historical interaction between Central Asia, Russia and India. It has been attempting to collect significant research and reference material from outside India on the subject.

Accordingly, research material in the Russian language is constantly ordered on microfiches from the Institute for Scientific Information in the Social Science (INION, Moscow) and The Inter-Documentation Company (IDC), Leiden, the Netherlands. So far 97,177 microfiches from INION and 11,527 microfiches from Inter Documentation Index Series for the reference purpose. Further, the Ministry of External Affairs has launched a project to copy historical archives from Tashkent, Uzbekistan, etc., and subsequent to this a consultant from IGNCA visited Tashkent to identify the collections.

The Library subscribed to about 16 current periodicals in Slavic and Central Asian Area Studies, of which three are in German and one in French.

IGNCA deputed on behalf of the unit Dr. Arup Banerjee, Associate Professor, to Moscow to attend a conference on Museum Collections, organised by the Centre for Comparative Studies of Ancient Civilisation (Russian Academy of Sciences) in September, 1998. He presented a research paper on the Stein collection in the National Museum, New Delhi.

JANAPADA-SAMPADĀ

(Division of Life-style Studies and Research on Regional Cultures)

Janapada-Sampadā Division complements the programmes of Kalākośa. Its focus shifts from the text to the context of the rich variegated heritage of the small- scale societies. Interspersed and moving in and out of major cultural movements, these communities have brought into play the dynamics of cultural continuity and change that has provided than the stimuli for rejuvenations to frozen and comparatively more rigidly codified traditions called classical. Research activities of the Division aim at re-establishing the arts in their ecocultural and socio-economic contexts. Popular Indian terms connected with the day-to-day life, e.g., jana, loka, deśa, laukika, and maukhika serve as key words for evolving programmes.

The programmes of the Division are classified into:

- (A) Ethnographic Collections: Core collections comprising originals, reproductions and reprographic formats are being acquired as basic resource material and study collections.
- (B) Multi-Media Presentation and Events: The programmes aim at the establishment of two Galleries namely (i) \$\bar{A}di\text{-D}t\sqrt{s}ya\$ (Primal Vision) prehistoric rock art of India and other countries; and (ii) \$\bar{A}di\text{-S}ravya\$ (Primal Sound) reflecting exposition of sound, both musical and non-musical; in other words, it presents the basic concepts relating to primary senses of sight and sound (of the eye and ear).
- (C) Life-style Studies: These programmes are divided into (1) Lokaparampara (Life-style Studies) and (ii) Kşetra-sampada (Regional Heritage). The first addresses itself to human life-style studies in different ecozones of India. The second envisages studies of specific cultural areas taking into account the processes of interlocking devotional artistic, geographic and social aspects.
- (D) Children's World: The programmes of this section acquaint children with the rich heritage of tribal and folk cultures and the associated realities to which they have little awareness, through their home and school environment.

Progress made by the Janapada-sampada in its various programmes during 1998-99 was as follows:

Programme A: Ethnographic Collection

Under Programme relating to Ethnographic collection, the following materials were acquired during 1998-99:

- (i) To enrich the ethnographical collection of IGNCA two masks from Assam, four from Orisse, eighteen from Garhwal and two metal masks from Manipur were acquired, besides, twenty-eight form other countries. Of these twelve Anshun Masks belonged to China, six to North-West Coast of America, two to Canada and eight to Japan.
- (ii) Under the programme of creativity of women in their daily life and lifestyle, thirty-eight Chikan embroidery garments were acquired.

Programme B: Multi-Media Presentations and Events

Presentations and events planned through this are intended to serve as primary access to the art material connected with the Indian society over the millennia. Creation of the twin galleries of (1) Adi-Dṛśya (Primal Vision) and (2) Adi-Śravya (Primal Sound) being the major programme. Taking up indepth investigations on rock-art is a crucial component of the Adi-Dṛśya. Exposition of primary sense of sound, music and musical forms Adi-Śrayya.

Adi-Drsya under this programme a series of meetings were held with Prof. Lorblanchet, UNESCO Consultant on the Multimedia Rock-Art Project of the IGNCA from 24th to the 30th November, 1998. The following topics were discussed with the Unesco Constultant:

- a) Forthcoming joint publication (Indo-French) on Jhiri Rock-Art site.
- b) How to use computer to study rock-art and to present it to scholars and to a wider public.
- c) What teachings programme on the methods of studying rock-art could be set up with computer.
- d) The plan of a rock art CD ROM.

Under this programme, a monograph "Conservation of Rock Art" edited by Dr. Bansi Lal Malla has been brought out. Editing of fifty five papers presented in the "Global Rock- Art Conference (1993) is under progress.

Adi-Śravya: Papers on "Dhvani" seminar, edited by Prof. S.C. Malik have also been published under the Adi-Śravya programme. The presentation incorporated in this volume intended to explore diverse and complex conceptual dimentions of sound, ranging from its mystrical and traditionally metaphysical to its present-day developments.

Preliminary discussions were held with scholars, musicians, museologists, in regard to develop a conceptual plan of organising the Gallery connected with Adi- Sravya.

Programme C: Life-style Studies

Lokaparampara

(Life-style Studies)

To date, research on traditions of the people and associated cultures has been largely linear and unidimensional, whether from an anthropological point of view or that of sociology, economics, socio-politics, history or art-history. These disciplines have taken into account only some parts or some dimensions and not the totality of life experience. Janapada-sampadā secks to adopt a new approach, and to evolve alternate methodologies for studying lifestyles, by re-examining the existing models. This approach is based on the premise that life is not fragmented into single dimensions, or isolated units, nor can one model replicate in full a total picture of the cultural life of any community. According to this approach culture has to be treated as a multidimensional system in demarcated or defined space.

Such studies aim at bringing out the various links and inter-relationship of the natural environment, the daily life of a people, the annual calendar and the life-cycle, world-view, cosmology, agricultural and other economic functions, social structure, knowledge and skills, traditional technologies and artistic manifestations. They are multidisciplinary in nature covering the diverse regions and the rich interaction of the tribal, rural and urban traditions including, the oral and the literate.

With the goals enumerated above and the multidisciplinary methodology

adopted, a number of pilot projects have been launched. Scholars of the IGNCA are coordinating and collaborating with multidisciplinary groups drawn from several institutions in the country. A meaningful dialogue has been established with those who have been working in the fields of anthropology, ethno-botany, ethno-history and Himalayan studies, oral tradition, etc.

In pursuance of the above goals, the programmes of the Lokaparampara projects have made a headway during the year as below:

Collaborative Project

The following projects in collaboration with other institutions undertaken during previous years were completed:

- (i) "The Guruvayur temple: its role in socio-religious movements and cultural networks of Kerala" by P.R.G. Mathur
- (ii) "Basic Sounds: A Study of Sound Symbolism of Santhals", by Prof. Khageswar Mahapatra.

The new 'Collaborative projects' taken up during 1998-99 comprise:

- (i) "Water Cosmology and Popular Culture: An Anthropological Study of Indian Civilization", by Dr. Govinda Rath
- (ii) "The Healing Chants", by Shri Desmond L. Karmawphlang.
- (iii) "The Calendarical Rites and Rituals of the Meities", by Shri N. Debendra Singh.

In-House Project

The 'In-house projects' undertaken by the IGNCA scholars have progressed during 1998-99 as under :-

- (i) Monograph on "Cultural categories of space and time among the Gaddis of Bharmour, Chamba (Himachal Pradesh)", by Dr. Molly Kaushal, is under preparation.
- (ii) A thesaurus "Santhal Perception of body, Womb and Seed", by Dr. Nita Mathur, is under preparation.
- (iii) A Ph. D. thesis on "Pandava dance form as an exponent of the indigenous folk theatre of Garhwal Himalaya and English

- Avantgarde theatre: A comparative study", by Ms. Richa Negi, has been submitted to the Garhwal University, Srinagar, Garhwal.
- (iv) Under a Ph.D. Project "Structure and Cognition of the folk-song of Mithila: An analytical study of Anthropology of music", by Shri Kailash Kumar Mishra, has documented one hundred and seventy eight folk songs and out of those he has transliterated about fifty five.

Seminars

1. "Rajbhasha : Sanskritik Sandarbh"

On the occasion of Golden Jubilee celebration of India's Independence, the Indira Gandhi National Centre for the Arts organized a seminar, 'Rājbāshā: Sanskritik Sandarbh' on August 13,1998. Experts from different disciplines, e.g., Hindi, Sanskrit studies, Anthropology, and Environmental studies, including Research Faculty of the IGNCA were invited to deliberate on the cultural dimension of the Hindi as Rajbhasha. The participants discussed at length the position of Hindi in historical and contemporary contexts focusing on social and cultural issues.

II. "Pilgrimage and Complexity"

An International Seminar on "Pilgrimage and Complexity" was held from 5-9 January, 1999, which was attended by delegates from Canada, Germany, Italy, Japan, Mexico, Nepal, Switzerland, U.K., U.S.A. and India. Discussions in the seminar revolved around three aspects of the subject, viz., (i) the interconnection of the humanities and sciences; (ii) the historical dimensions of pilgrimage; and (iii) the movement in space and time.

Publications

The following publications have been brought out:

- (i) The Third Nirmal Kumar Bose Memorial Lecture, by Prof. M.A. Dhaky, highlighting "Bose's contribution to the study of Orissan architecture" and "The Laksanasamuccya of VairocanT and the Medieval Architecture of Kalinga".

- (iii) "Life-style and Ecology", edited by Prof. Baidyanath Saraswati.

Kşetra-sampadā (Regional Heritage)

In India, certain regions/areas have developed into cultural centres attracting people from all parts of the world. These have been places of convergence and radiation where centrifugal and centripetal forces, have been evident. They have served as a centre place, provided space and motivated mobility and interaction. Often a temple or shrine or a mosque is the physical or notional centre. So far these have been studied from the point of view of chronology, history, religion or economics as linear phenomenon but not in totality from which emanates multiplicity of creative artistic activity. The Ksetra-sampada envisages therefore, a study not only of a specific place of a shrine and its units but the process interlocking devotional, artistic, geographic and social aspects of a particular centre. The IGNCA has taken up two such centres for study, namely, Vraja and Brhadīsvara.

1. Vraja Prakalpa

Architectural documentations of ten temples of the area have been completed and the work in other selected temples is in progress.

Under this project a monograph titled 'In Favour of Givinddevji' by Monika Horstmann is in the final stages of publication. It contains several important historical documents relating to the Govindadeva temple, particularly, pertaining to land grants and other related matters.

The second volume of Bhaktirasāmṛtasindhu with Hindi commentary by Dr. Premlata Sharma is in the Press.

2. Brhadīśvara

A sixty minute tape of Tevaram hymns used in temple rituals has been prepared.

The volume of "The Iconography of Brahadīśvara temple" by late Dr. F. L. Hearnult, formerly of 'Institut Francais de Pondicherry', is under editing. The film on Kumbhabhisekam, at this shrine under reference, has been finally edited

Programme D : Children's World

This programme aims at acquinting children with the traditional art and cultural heritage through various activities like puppetry, puzzles, games, etc. which are not generally covered by school curricula.

In connection with the exhibition on Pancatantra, an on the spot Painting Competition was organised by IGNCA for School Children in September-October 1998.

The Pañcatantra exhibition was complemented by the Rangasri Little Ballet Troupe (LBT)'s performance titled as 'The Winning of Friends' based on a narrative 'Mitra-labha' from the Pañcatantra, at the Little Theatre Group Auditorium (New Delhi), on September 23,1998.

Another significant event for children was a puppet show on Chacha Nehru by Sriram Institute of Shadow Theatre (Angul, Orissa) held between 26th and 28th November, 1998 and also at IGNCA, Gandhi Darshan and Bal Bhawan.

Kalādaršana (Dissemination and Projection Division)

Kalādarsana is the fourth Division of the Institution. It provides the venue and forum for facilitating a creative dialogue amongst cultures, disciplines, levels of society and diverse arts. Through its programme it has established a unique style of projection and presentation of the arts. It organises exhibitions, inter-disciplinary seminars and performance on unified themes and concepts for furtherance of the objects of the IGNCA.

Programme A: Collections

The Division is responsible for organising IGNCA Exhibitions within the conceptual framework of the Institution. Extensive academic work including indepth research is conducted before organising these exhibitions. The text and illustrative panels as well as the exhibits go into the Exhibitions Archives serving as the reference and resource materials for scholars/institutios who wish to draw upon from these academic inputs. The exhibition and supported items of exhibition are also loaned out from the Exhibition Archives from time to time. Efforts have been continued to classify accession and re-arrange diverse variety of materials collected through the exhibitions, seminars and lectures held during 1998-99.

Programme B: Seminars and Exhibitions

Seminars

Kaladarsana Division rendered logistic and other support to the other Divisions in organising Seminars on (i) 'Identification and Enhancement of India's Cultural Heritage: An Internal Necessity in the Management of Development" on November 19-24,1998; (ii) "Dissemination: Plans, Problems and Prospects" on 21.12.1998; (iii) "Pilgrimage and Complexity" held on January 5-9, 1999; and (iv) " Indi-Thai Art" on 30th March, 1999.

Exibibitions

Division during 1998-99, the Kaladarsana Division has organised six exhibitions viz., (1) Pañcatantra; (2) Water, The Sustainer; (3) Our Architectural Heritage; (4) Nada: An Experience in Sound; (5) Thankas - Buddhist Painting from the Stok-Palace Museum, Ladakh; and (6) Transcendence; besides several film shows and puppet performances.

1. Pañcatantra

An exhibition of multi-lingual books, paintings and multi-media presentation on Pañcatantra was organised by IGNCA in collaboration with All India Writers' and Illustrators' Association (AIWIA) on the occasion of IXth World Book Congress held in New Delhi from 20th to 24th September, 98. A major attraction of the exhibition was the representation of stories from Pañcatantra in Kalamkari paintings, specially made for the exhibition by artists of Secunderabad (A.P.), as well as in contemporary paintings in attractive colours on the same theme by Haku Shah well-known painter from Gujarat. Papier masche murals, made on Pañcatantra stories were also displayed in the exhibition. In its modern representation, the Pañcatantra stories were presented through CD ROM and video. The exhibition was activated by participation of a large number of school children in Painting Competition on spot on the theme. More than 600 paintings have been collected through this competition.

Programme C: Memorial Lectures

IGNCA has instituted a series of memorial lectures in honour of eminent scholars who have made significant contributions to different fields of study. During the year, the Centre organised the following two Memorial Lectures:

1. Acarya Hazari Prasad Dwivedi Memorial Lecture

IGNCA organised the Fifteenth Acarya Hazari Prasad Dwivedi Memorial Lecture on the 19th August, 1998 in collaboration with Acarya Hazari Prasad Dwivedi Smriti Nyas.

This year's lecture was delivered under the presidentship of Dr. Kapila Vatsyayan, Academic Director, IGNCA, by renowned scholar Dr. Namvar Singh, Professor of Hindi at Jawaharlal Nehru University, New Delhi on the topic, "Kabir's Anguish".

The lecture was attended by a large number of scholars and writers, sociologists, journalists and others.

2. Dr. Suniti Kumar Chatterjee Memorial Lecture

IGNCA also organised Dr. Suniti Kumar Chatterjee Memorial Lecture on 23rd and 24th November 1998 at New Delhi

The Lecture was delivered by Prof. Satyaranjan Banerjee from Calcutta University in two parts. The first part of the lecture was on "Dr. Suniti Kumar Chatterji's Approach to Indo-European Linguistics" and the second was on "Origin and Development of the Linguistic Thoughts and ideas of the Indo-European People."

The lecture were presided over by Dr. Sarojini Mahishi, Vice-Chariman of Rashtriya Sanskrit Sansthan.

Programme D: Other Programmes

Film Shows

From the Archival collection of IGNCA, several films were screened on different occasions. The details are as under:

Special film shows were held for 5000 children of Bal-Bhavan summer camp on May 19-20, 1998. Films screened on this occasion were Songs and Dances of 'Bhils' and 'The Cosmic Dance of Siva,'

At another session special screening of video documentation of ballet performance by LBT Ramayana was conducted at NDMC schools on 28th and 29th July, 1998. Some 2000 children watched the video film.

A documentary film on 'Todas' by Bappa Ray and the documentation on 'Hemis Festival' by M.K. Raina were screened for general audience on 26th July, 1998 in IGNCA complex.

Book Release and Music Recital

Three books on Carnatik music by famous musicologist and artiste Shri T.K. Govinda Rao were released by Hon'ble Shri R. Venkataraman, former President of India on 26th September 1998. The release was followed by a vocal recital by Shri T.K. Govinda Rao himself based on some of his select compositions from the three volumes that were released. The function was attended by a large number of music lovers, scholars, journalists, etc.

Persentation of IGNCA Publications, Video films and CD Roms

At a special function held on the 14th December, 1998 at Ashoka Hall, Rashtrapati Bhawan, New Delhi, 31 recent publications on diverse subjects besides five video-documentations on the 'Life-style Studies' and 'Behind-Curtain Series' and three CD-ROM's, "Devdasi Murai", "Man & Mask", and "Elizabeth Brunner's Paintings", produced by IGNCA, were presented to the Hon'ble Shri K.R. Narayanan, President of India. This achievement of IGNCA was highly appreciated by distinguished guests, scholars, journalists and others.

Public Lectures

In the year 1998-99, twenty-nine public lectures were delivered by experts/scholars on diverse subjects from all over the world. Special mention may be made of (1) Dr. George Michell's talk on "Kingdoms of Decean and Vijayanagar Art Traditions" and "The Arrival of Europeans"; (2) Prof. Farid Khan's lecture on "New Discoveries in Gandhara Art"; and (3) Mrs. Umebe N. Owyejekwe's speech on "Introduction of African Art" and " Various Art Cultures of West Africa: An Appraisal".

In addition, Prof. Farzand Durrani, former Head, Department of Archaeology, University of Peshawar spoke on "Recent Archaeological Discoveries in Pakistan", Prof. Santoshi Ihara, Toohoka University, Japan gave an interesting presentation on "Technological Development and its Social Requirements in the Case of Japan"; and Prof. Dilip Basu of USA lectured on "Satyajit Ray's Devi: The Father-son debate". Dr. R. Narshimhan gave a brilliant talk on "Future of Multimedia in Arts and Humanities".

Dr. Kamla Choudhary delivered a thought provoking lecture on "Spirituality and Sustainability" and Prof. P.K. Mukhopadhyaya talked on "Nyaya Perspective of the Philosophy of Language: Knowing it Second-hand". All these lectures were most well received by the audience.

Grants From Abroad

UNESCO Chair Programme

Under the Unesco Chair Programme during 1998-99, studies on "Identification and Enhancement of Cultural Heritage: An Internal Necessity in the Management of Development", involving a study and analysis of both the tangible and intangible heritage of India, have been taken up. In this connection a meeting of consultants was held on 10th August 1998 at Unesco House to discuss the objectives of the project. The meeting was attended by the leading anthropologists and sociologists of the country.

Workshop

A five day workshop was organised from November 19-24, 1998 for finalisation of the research design of the above mentioned project. In the workshop the sampling framework, schedule and plan of action was exclusively discussed. It was decided to undertake pilot studies of two villages, one in north and one in south. The work in this regard has made satisfactorily progress.

A sum of Rs. 7,37,975/- has been received from Unesco in December, 1998 for the Programme "Identification and Enhancement of Indian's Cultural Heritage".

Publications

Two monographs titled (i) "The Cultural Dimension of Ecology" and (ii) "The use of Cultural Heritage as a Tool for Development", both edited by Prof. B.N. Saraswati, have been brought out by IGNCA during the period under report.

UNDP

"Strengthening of National Facility for Interactive Multimedia Documentation of Cultural Resources"

IGNCA has been implementing a project entitled "Strengthening of National Facility for Interactive Multimedia Documentation of Cultural Resources with UNDP assistance. The primary objective of this project is to develop a national capability for comprehensive and integrated study, documentation and dissemination of cultures through interactive multimedia technology. The facility created is also expected to help in the re-construction in a virtual format of a heritage, which is fragmented or threatened to extinction.

Hardware and software worth Rs. 395 million have been procured and a networked multimedia computer Lab with the name "Cultural Informatics Laboratory" (CIL) has been set up. Staff members relating to the project comprising of computer professionals, graphic designers, artists, etc., have been engaged in this Lab.

Multimedia Projects

Eleven pilot projects have been taken up for preparation of multimedia presentations through CD-ROM's. They are (i) CATCAT & Manus Database; (ii) Multimedia Digital Library; (iii) Bṛhadīśvara Temple Project; (iv) Mukteśvara Temple; (v) Agnicayana; (vi) Viśvarūpa; (vii) Elizabeth Brunner Paintings; (viii) Devadāsī Murai; (ix) Oral Epic of Dev Nārāyana; (x) Rock-Art; and (xi) Man and Masks. Out of these a multimedia database on Devadāsi Murai, a proto-type for the ritual component of the Bṛhadīśvara Temple. "Man and Mask" an interactive multimedia presentation to support study of Masks traditions world-wide, and "Elizabeth Brunner's Paintings", have been completed. Elizabeth Brunner was a Hungarian painter, who lived in India for a number of decades. These have been published and copies of the CD-ROM's are available for sale. Other projects are in various stages of preparation.

The scholars and experts from both the streams have been able to creatively collaborate on several projects. New Models for using computers as a pedagogical tool are being developed. Research is also going on to develop a methodology for developing pedagogical multimedia systems.

Rudget and Expenditure

The UNDP contribution for the project is US \$ 22,25,460. The UNDP has granted an advance of Rs. 5,23,46,500/- so far, to meet the Rupee disbursements. Out of this advance, an amount of Rs. 5,18,76,300/- has been spent upto 31.03.1999. The foreign exchange component of the project is directly disbursed by the UNDP and UNESCO.

Ford Foundation

The Ford Foundation approved a grant of US \$ 2,50,000 to IGNCA for development of national research and resource facilities for the arts and humanties in September, 1992. This was to be utilised for procuring equipment, acquisition of materials, staff training and Consultant. In the 'equipment' component, Video Editing Studio has been installed and operationalised. Approved Budget for this purpose has fully been utilised. In the 'Acquisition of materials' components, masks, rock-art replica and microfilms/microfiches have been acquired. A total amount of US \$ 71,029.03 against the allocation of US \$ 75,000 has been spent upto 31.12.1998. In the 'consultants' component out of an allocation of US \$ 35,000 an amount of US \$ 30,140 has been spent upto 31.12.1998. Efforts are being made to utilise the balance amount during the current year for funding visits of scholars to IGNCA or other specified purpose.

- iii. Prof. Dilip Dasu of California University, Santa Cruz, CA was engaged as consultant in connection with publication of "Balisatra Bhagwata Purana"...

iv. The visits of Prof. John Emigh, Brown University, USA; Prof. Micheal Mechike and Mrs. Umiebe M. Onyeijekwl in connection with exhibition and Seminar on "Mind, Man and Mask" held in Feburary, 1998 were funded from this grant.

Japan Foundation

For the fiscal year 1998-99, proposals viz., 'To organise a Conference on 'Culture and Technology', holding of 'Gīta Govinda Multimedia Experience; in Tokyo, besides proposal for 79 titles of books under the Library Support Programme for the fiscal year 1998-99 were submitted. However, Japan Foundation have recently intimated that the proposal under the Library Support Programme has not been agreed to.

For the fiscal year 1999-2000 a request for 68 titles of books worth Yen 7,95,456/- under Library Support Programme of the Japan Foundation, has also been submitted to Japan Foundation.

SÜTRADHĀRA

(Administration and Finance Division)

The Sultradhara Division of IGNCA represents the administrative wing of the institution providing managerial and organisational support and services and supply to all other Divisions and units. It continued to function as a nodal agency for policy planning and coordination of various programmes and activities of the Centre and also looked after the maintenance and management of accounts of the institution.

A. Personnel

During the year 1998-99 some new officers were appointed for manning some of the important positions in the organisation. A list of Officers, Research Fellows etc. as on 31 March, 1998 is appended as Annexure - III and IV.

B. Services and Supply

The Services and Supply Unit continued to extend logistic and related support to the Academic Divisions of the IGNCA. It helped in making arrangements for several National and International Seminars, Workshops and Exhibitions during the year. It also maintained coordination with the concerned Ministries/Departments and other organisations for the smooth and efficient functioning of the Centre.

C. Branch Offices

Varanasi: Set up in 1988, the Branch Office at Varanasi continued to function as a unit of Kalalośa Division with a group of employees and researchers under the Hon. Coordinator and carried out its activities and data collection for IGNCA's projects with the help of experts besides organising of lectures, discussions etc.

Imphal: The Imphal Unit of IGNCA established in 1991, forming a part of Janapada-sampada Division functioned under the Hony. Coordinator. The employees of this office have been engaged mainly for the collection of data in Manipur area.

D. Finance and Accounts

The Annual Accounts of IGNCA for the financial year ending March 31, 1998 have been approved and adopted by the IGNCA Trust in accordance with Article 19.1 of the Deed of Declaration of the Trust.

The Government of India have issued notifications extending the following benefits/concessions to the Centre:

- (i) The Income of the Trust has been exempted from Income-Tax upto the assessment year 2000-2001. Necessary exemption under Section 10 (23C) (iv) of the Income-Tax Act has been granted vide Notification No. 10337 (F. No. 197/39/97-ITA-1) dated the 9th April, 1997.
- (ii) The IGNCA Trust has been notified as an Institution under Section 35(1) (iii) vide Notification No. 1884 (F. No. D.G./I.T.(E)/CAL/nd-22/35(1) (iii)/90-91) dated the 8the December 1998 for the period 1.4.1998 to 31.3.2000, under which any sum paid to this Centre for research in social sciences, etc., will be allowed as deduction on the income of the donor under the Section of Income-Tax Act, Ministry of Science and Technology has granted their recognition to this Institution under Rule 6 of the Income Tax Rule, 1962. Their recognition also entitles the Centre to avail of exemption from custom duty on import and facilitates the import procedure.
- (iii) The capital gains to individuals on sale of any work of art, manuscript, drawing, painting, photograph, print, etc., to IGNCA have been exempted from Income-Tax upto the Assessment year 1999-2001 under Section 47 (ix) of Income-Tax Act vide Government of India, Ministry of Finance (Department of Revenue) Notification No. 10447 F. No.207/5/93 I.T.A. II dated the 28th October, 1997.
- (iv) Any donation to the Centre by individuals qualifies upto 50% for rebate from Income-Tax under Section 80 (G) of the Income-Tax Act. This exemption has been granted to the IGNCA upto 31.3.2000 vide Director of Income-Tax (Exemptions) letter No. DIT (Exemptions)/99-99/379/87/154 dated the 10th May, 1999.
- (v) Ministry of Finance (Department of Revenue) CBDT, vide their Order No.199/1/99-ITA-1, dated 17th May, 1999 have granted exemption to Indira Gandhi Memorial (IGM) Fellowship scheme for the purpose of Sub-Clause (1) of Clause (17-A) of Section 10 of the Income Tax Act, 1961.

E. Housing

The main office of the Centre continues to function in the Central Vista Mess (C.V. Mess) and No. 3, Dr. R.P. road, New Delhi. The C.V. Mess Building continues to make available office space to accommodate various Divisions and Units. The building at No. 5, Dr. Rajendra Prasad Road has been demolished, and a new building within the IGNCA complex has been under construction since 1993. The work has progressed well during 1998-99.

F. Fellowship Scheme

(i) Research Fellowships

IGNCA continued to operate its Research Fellowship Scheme and the strength of the Research Fellows during 1998-99 was as follows:

(ii) Indira Gandhi Memorial Fellowships

With a view to providing an opportunity to eminent and exceptionally talented persons to devote themselves with freedom to creative critical work in the areas of the arts, humanities and culture, the IGNCA has instituted a scheme of Memorial Fellowships in Smt. Indira Gandhi's name. The Fellowships are open to scholars and creative artists of any discipline who will undertake creative projects or research work of a multi-disciplinary, interdisciplinary or cross-cultural nature. The applicants must have a proven record of creative or critical work which does not confine itself to narrow field of pure academic nature. The Fellows shall have complete freedom to work at places of their choice within India. The number of Fellowships given at any time will not be more than six.

The Fellowships carry a monthly stipend of Rs. 12,000/- besides contingent and travel expenses, for a period of two years. The Fellowships for the year 1996 was awarded to famous Marathi and English writer Shri Dilip Chitre of Pune, and in 1997, it was granted to two well-known personalities Ustad R. Fahimuddin Dagar, a famous traditional musician and Prof. K. Ayyappa Panikar, reputed writer in English and Malayalam.

In, 1998-99, two deserving scholars (Ms) Dr. Padma M. Sarangapani from Bangalore, an Anthropologist and Shri Bambarg Sunarto of Surakarta University, Indonesia, an expert on Indonesian Music, have been selected for the award of the Fellowships. Under the scheme Dr. Sarangapani has proposed to work on the project "Indigenous Knowledge and Knowledge transmission: A study of Baiga Children", and Shri Bambarg Sunarto on his project "Indian Classical Music Gamlan (Orchestra) of Indonesia".

Janapada-sampada

In the context of the implementation of its academic programmes in different parts of India through its Project directors and researchers, the Janapada-sampada Division maintained association with different research organisations both within the university system and outside. The Division has succeeded in establishing regular interaction and dialogue with leading institutions in the field of the fundamental sciences and technology, viz., the Centre for Astrophysics, Pune; the Institute of Sciences, Bangalore; and the Indian Science Academy, New Delhi, Many Departments of Anthropology in the University system are also associated with the research programmes of the IGNCA. Of these, the Departments which deserve to be mentioned in the present context include Department of Anthropology, H.N. Bahuguna University, Srinagar, U.P.; Social Science and Development Research, Bhubaneswar; Anundoram Borooah Institute of Arts, Language and Culture, Guwahati; Department of Botany, Bhagalpur University, Bihar; Department of History, Fine Arts Faculty, University of Baroda; and Indian Anthropological Association, Department of Anthropology, Delhi University, Delhi. It has also set up networking arrangements with the Institute of Tribal Studies, i.e., Adimiati Seva Sangh, New Delhi; Department of Tribal Studies, Arunachal University, Itanagar; and Assam State Museum, Guwahati.

In Kşetra-sampadā Programme, the Janapada-Sampadā- has set up a regular networking with both the Central and State Departments of Archaeology and National Institutes such as Sri Caitanya Prema Sansthana, Vrindavan; Indian Council of Social Science Research (ICSSR); Indian Council of Philosophical Research (ICPR)- Centre for Advanced Study in History, Aligarh Muslim University, Aligarh, U.P.; and School of Planning and Architecture, New Delhi. For its Childrens' Programme in the field of arts, especially puppetry and music, the Janapada- sampada Division is interacting and collaborating with National Institutions viz., Sangeet Natak Akademi; Gandhi Smriti and Darshan Samiti, New Delhi; Bal Bhawan, New Delhi, AND Association of Writers and illustrators for Children (AWIC).

There is a regular exchange programme planned with the National Centre for the performing Arts, Mumbai; the Gallery of Art Trust, Chennai; National Centre for the Performing Arts, Mumbai; the Gallery of Art Trust, Chennai; National Institute of Design, Ahmedabad; National Gallery of Modem Art; National Museum and Archaeological Society of India, New Delhi, as also with Cultural Centres of some of the diplomatic Missions and foreign Cultural Centres; Japan Foundation; Australian Cultural Centre; and the Max Mueller Bhavan, New Delhi

BUILDING PROJECT

The Library, the first building of the IGNCA Building Project is now visibly in an advanced stage of completion. During the year, works amounting to Rs. 17 crore were executed with the focus on stone work and completion of various support services. The services are now being commissioned. After extensive discussions with the Architect of the Design under implementation i.e. Prof. Ralph Lerner, who is also the Dean of the Faculty of Architecture at the University of Princeton, the external landscaping and other details, including the design of the compound wall, are being finalised. Barring any unforcement delays in the clearness and the supply of power by the Local Authorities, it is expected that the Library Building would be ready for use by June 2000. Total expenditure on this building up to 31st March, 1999 has been about Rs. 46 crore.

- 2. Through extensive dialogue running for about four years, the Local Authorities finally approved the Submission Drawings of the next set of buildings also, namely, Sūtradhāra, Underground Parking 'B', Janapada-sampadā, Exhibition Galleries and Residential Block. Physical work has commenced on a component of this set of buildings i.e. the Sūtradhāra Building.
- 3. The system of project execution, its administration and management practices, including technical detailing, have already made a mark in the country's building construction activity. It is expected that with the passage of time, not only will the IGNCA be a unique building project but it shall also act as a catalyst for significant improvement in the construction sector, particularly the institutional buildings.

It is for the first time that a complete critical edition of the Satapatha Brāhmaņa of the Kāṇva school of the Sukla Yajurveda along with its English translation is published. 14. MAYAMATAM Volumes I & II (KMS Series Nos. 14 & 15)

The Mayamatam is a Vāstušāstra, i.e. a treatise on dwelling, and as such it deals with all the facets of gods and men's dwellings, from the choice of the site to the iconography of the temple walls. It contains numerous and precise descriptions of villages and towns as well as of the temples, houses, mansions and palaces. It gives indications for the selection of a proper orientation, right dimensions, and of appropriate materials. It intends to be a manual for the architect and a guidebook for the layman. 15. SILPARATNAKOŚA (KMS Series No. 16)

The Silparatnakośa is 17th century Orissan text composed by Sthāpaka Niranjana Mahāpātra, describing all the parts of the temple and the most important temple types of Orissa, such as the Mañjuśrī and Khākāra. It also contains a section on sculpture (Prasādamūrti) and an appendix on imagemaking (Pratimālakṣaṇa). This text, though much later than the temples described, reflects the still living tradition and it contributes much to clarify the terminology of Orissan temple architecture. 17. THE KR\$NAGĪTI OF MĀNAVEDA (KMS No. 20)

The Kṛṣṇagīti is a lyrical and devotional poem composed by Māṇavcda, Zamorin of Kozhikode (17th cent. A.D._. The poem composed in Sanskrit celebrates the life of Kṛṣṇa from his incarnation (avatāra) to his ascent to Heaven (svargārohaṇa). Composed in eight chapters and perhaps modelled on Jayadeva's Gītagovinda and written in the form of a monologue addressed to Kṛṣṇa, the poem is suffused with the sentiment of spiritual devotion (bhakti). 18. RISĀLA-I-RĀGADARPANA (KMS No. 21)

Tarjumā-Mānakutūhala and Risāla-i-Rāgadarpaņa is a combined treatise by Nawab Saif Khan, better known as FaqTrullāh; the first is translation (tarjumā) and the other an original treatise, on the subject of the practised music of the time.

As the seal on the manuscript folio declares, FaqTrullah was both malik and musannif (owner and the author) of this nuskha (handwritten script). It is evident, FaqTrullah finally completed both his translation and composition (tasnif) in the same continuation in the year 1076 A.H. (1666 A.D.).

His treatise is in ten babs (chapters) the 1st bab dealing with reason of its compilation. Had bab is on identifying ragas; IIIrd on assignment of season and appropriate hour of day and night to every raga; IVth on the perception of surs (svaras); Vth on the correct identification of various saz (vadya, instruments); VIth on explaining the de-mertis of goindah (a poet composer cum performing musician); VIIth on the delineation of awaz (various throat qualities), their categorisation and consideration of the hanjarah (larynx); Bab VIIIth on knowing about the qualities of the Ustad-i-Kamil (master of art); IXth on understanding of brindah (vrnda, orchestra) and about the advantages of performing in orchestration; Xth as regards the go'indahs (poet-musicians) who have lived during the time.

The Khātimah (conclusion), occurring towards the close of the book conveys the author's brief note on the Kashmiri music of the time.

19. THE SANGITOPANISAT-SÄRODDHÄRA (Composed by Vacanacarya Śrisudhākalaśa)

The SangTtopanisat-Sāroddhāra is an important medieval text written in 1350. 45. THE TEMPLE OF MUKTESVARA AT CAUDADÄNAPURA

The northern part of Karanataka is one of the richest areas of India in monuments of great artistic value. It was subjected to the rule of several royal families, Calukyas of Kalyana, Kalacuris and Seunas in the 10th, 11th, 12th and 13th centuries A.D. which has been a period of great cultural refinement. It was the time of the greatest expansion of the Kalamukha-Lakulasaiva movements, and of the rise of Virasaivism. The temple of Mükteśvara at Caudadanapura (Dharwar District) is a beautiful representative of the style and the high culture of that time. Its history is known to us thanks to a set of seven long inscriptions, composed in literary medieval Kannada, engraved with great care on large steles. They provide informations on the local rulers, kings of Guttala who claimed a Gupta ascendancy, on some constructions in the temple complex, on diverse donations to the deity, and very interesting details on a few prominent religious leaders. It introduces to us Muktajīyar, a Lākulašaiva saint, and Sivadeva, a Virasaiva saint, who entered the place on the 19th of August, 1225 and led there a long life of renunciation, asceticism and spiritual elevation. The legacy of this age of intense Saivite faith is a jewel of architecture and sculpture. It is a single cella temple in what is popularly known as Jakkanācarī style, sometimes called Kalyana-Cālukyan style, which is not appropriate, as many temples of the same style have also been built under the partronage of Kalacure or Seuna dynasties. 89. EVENING BLOSSOMS: THE TEMPLE TRADITION OF SÄNJHI IN VRNDÄVANA

In the late 19th century $S\bar{a}njh\bar{\tau}$ became a temple art, initially made on a cowdung background on house walls by unmarried girls, it is now made on a vedi (platform) within the temple by priests. This type of $S\bar{a}njh\bar{\tau}$, perhaps borrowed from the ancient art of $dh\bar{u}li$ citra, is prepared using coloured powders, originally ground from natural substances, which are applied using stencils. Thus, the forest flowers are replaced by belas, intricate, intertwining flowering vines that frame the hauda or central medallion of the design.
