

# Concept:

The Indira Gandhi National Centre for the Arts (IGNCA), established in the memory of Smt. Indira Gandhi, is visualised as autonomous Centre encompassing the study and experience of all the arts in each form with its own integrity, yet within a dimension of mutual interdependence, interrelatedness with nature, the social structure and the cosmology.

This view of the arts, integrated with and essential to the larger matrix of human culture, is predicated upon Smt. Gandhi's recognition of the role of the arts as essential to the 'integral quality of a person, at home with himself and society'. It partakes of the holistic world-view so forcefully articulated throughout the Indian tradition and emphasised by modern Indian leaders, especially Mahatma Gandhi and Rabindranath Tagore.

The arts are here understood to comprise the fields of creative and critical literature, written and oral; the visual arts; ranging from architecture, sculpture, painting and graphics to general material culture; photography and film; the performing arts of music, dance and theatre in their broadest connotation; and all else in festivals, fairs and life-styles that has an artistic dimension. In its initial stages, the Centre has been focusing attention on India; it will later expand its horizons to other civilizations and cultures. Through diverse programmes of research, publication, training, creative activities and performances, the IGNCA seeks to place the arts within the context of natural and human environment. The fundamental approach of the Centre in all its work is both multi-disciplinary and interdisciplinary.

# The principal aims of the Centre are:

- (1) To serve as a major resource centre for the arts, especially written, oral and visual source materials;
- (2) To undertake research and publication programmes of reference works, glossaries, dictionaries and encyclopedias concerning the arts, the humanities and general cultural heritage;
- (3) To establish a tribal and folk arts division with a core collection for conducting systematic scientific studies and for live presentations;
- (4) To provide a forum for creative and critical dialogue between and among the diverse arts ---- traditional and contemporary, through performances, exhibitions, multimedia projections, conferences, seminars and workshops;

- (5) To foster dialogue between the arts and current ideas in philosophy, science and technology, with a view towards bridging the gap in intellectual understanding that too often occurs between the modern sciences on the one hand and the arts and culture, including traditional skills and knowledge, on the other;
- (6) To evolve models of research programmes and arts administration more appropriate to the Indian ethos;
- (7) To elucidate the formative and dynamic factors in the complex web of interactions between the diverse social stratas, communities and regions:
- (8) To promote awareness of and senstivity to historical and cultural linkages between India and other parts of the world;
- (9) To develop a network of communication with national and international centres of arts and culture, and to affiliate with universities and other institutions of higher learning within India and abroad, towards the conduct and recognition of related research in the arts, the humanities and the cultural heritage.

Through specific programmes and projects, the interdependence amongst the arts and between the arts and other forms of cultural expression, the mutual influences between diverse regions and the inter-relationship of the tribal, rural and urban as well as the literate and oral traditions will be investigated, recorded and presented.

#### Formation of the Trust

In pursuance of the Government of India, Ministry of Human Resource Development (Department of Arts) Resolution No.F.16-7/86-Arts dated 19th March, 1987, Indira Gandhi National Centre for the Arts Trust was duly constituted and registered at New Delhi on 24th March, 1987. Initially, a Seven Member Trust was established which was reconstituted from time to time.

The Trust was reconstituted by the Government of India vide Government of India, Ministry of Human Resource Development O.M.F.No.16/15/95-Lib II dated 07.01.2000. The list of Trustees appointed in the reconstituted Trust is given in Annexure I.

The list of Members of the Executive Committee of the newly constituted Trust is given in Annexure II.

# Organisation:

To fulfill the objectives outlined in the Conceptual Plan of the Indira Gandhi National Centre for the Arts and its principal aims, the Institution functions through five Divisions that are autonomous in structure but inter-locked in programming.

The Kalānidhi Division comprises (a) a Cultural Reference Library of multi-media collections to serve as major Resource Centre for research in the humanities and the arts,

supported by; (b) a computerised National Information System and Data-Bank on arts, humanities and cultural heritage; (c) Cultural Archives and multi-media collections of artists/scholars; and (d) Area Studies'.

The Kalākośa Division undertakes fundamental research. It initiates long-term programmes for (a) a lexicon of fundamental concepts and interdisciplinary glossaries/ thesauruses on basic technical terminologies in the arts and crafts; (b) a series of fundamental texts of the Indian arts; (c) a series of reprints of critical writings on Indian arts; and (d) a multi-volume encyclopedia of the Indian arts.

The Janapada-Sampadā Division develops (a) a core collection of material and documentation of folk and tribal arts and crafts; (b) makes multi-media presentations; and (c) launches multi-disciplinary life-style studies of tribal communities for evolving alternative models for the study of the Indian cultural phenomenon in its totality and the interwebbing of environmental, ecological, agricultural, socio-economic, cultural and political parameters. This Division has established (d) a Children's theatre and has (c) proposed to set up a conservation laboratory.

The Kalādarśana Division provides a forum for inter-disciplinary seminars, exhibitions and performances on unified themes and concepts; the buildings will comprise three theatres and large galleries.

The Sütradhāra Division provides administrative, managerial and organisational support and services to all the other Divisions.

The Academic Divisions of the Institution, namely Kalānidhi and Kalākośa concentrate on the collection of multi-media, primary and secondary material, exploration of fundamental concepts, identification of principles of form, elucidation of technical terminologies at the level of theory and text (śāstra) and intellectual discourse (vimarśa) and interpretation at the level of mārga. Janapada-Sampadā and Kalādarśana focus on manifestations, processes, life functions and life-styles and oral traditions at the level of the loka, deśa, and jana. Together the programme of all the four Divisions place the arts in their original context of life and relationship with other disciplines.

Methodologies of research, programming and final output are analogous. The work of each Division complements the programmes of the others.

# ANNUAL REPORT FOR THE PERIOD 1st APRIL, 2002 TO 31st MARCH 2003

# **BRIEF SUMMARY AND HIGHLIGHTS**

#### KALĀNIDHI

#### (Division of Library, Information Systems, Cultural Archives)

Kalānidhi Division comprises an outstanding Reference Library and Cultural Archives with access to multimedia database and information systems. The IGNCA Reference Library has besides printed books, a unique collection of microfilmed manuscripts from Indian and Foreign sources and its archives contain slides, photographs on sculptures, architecture, paintings and other objects and a sizeable number of audio/video recordings and other materials.

# Programme A: Reference Library

#### **Acquisitions of Printed Material**

During the year under report 628 volumes of printed books were added to the collection. These include 328 purchased volumes and 300 volumes received as gifts from scholars and institutions. The total number of volumes in Library is now 1,23,094.

#### **Journals**

The Library continued to subscribe for academic and technical journals. The number of subscribed journals including institutional membership is now 271. The subject areas covered are Anthropology, Archaeology, Arts, Computer and Information Science, Conservation, Culture, Dance, Folklore, History, Humanities, Library and Information Science, Linguistics, Literature etc.

# Cataloguing

During this year 2185 volumes of books were classified and catalogued.

#### **Binding**

2500 volumes of books were got bound during the year under reference.

#### Services

- (i) During the year 20 scholars have become the subscribed member.
- (ii) 609 users in addition to IGNCA faculty and staff members were provided services. 745 volumes of books were issued to the faculty and staff members of IGNCA and 702 were received back from them.

(iii) 7 volumes of books were loaned and 13 volumes of books were borrowed under Inter Library Loan Services.

#### Non Print Material:

**Microfiches**: A total number of 2729 microfiches were added in the collection in which 490 were received from INION, Moscow and 2239 from IDC, Netherlands.

**Microfilms**: This year 458 duplicated microfilm positive rolls of GOML, Chennai and Shankaramath were prepared by the in-house team of IGNCA.

Slides: During the period under report 244 slides, photo-documented from the rare books were added to the slide collection. 204 slides were accessioned (GSL-24344-24477; SL-49606-49705). 103 slides on the living and religious traditions of Bhutan were catalogued. 244 slides were duplicated for the reference purpose.

1700 slides were issued to 42 in-house and visiting scholars for study. This also includes 31 slides, the photographic enlargements of which were displayed during the exhibition on "Art of Afghanistan" in IGNCA from Jan. 17th-Feb. 10th, 2003.

Data of 1700 slides on illustrated rare books was provided to CIL also for making the images and data available online on the IGNCA website. Two articles in

Hindi were contributed for the IGNCA Coil-net website and the data of 2000 slides in Hindi were also provided to CIL for Hindi Coil-net website. The project titled "Research and photo-documentation of Archaeological and Ethnographic collection in Museums and Galleries" was taken up by the Unit and in the first phase 200 letters were sent to Museums across the country to access their collection.

# **BIBLIOGRAPHY**

- 1. An Annotated Bibliography on Gandharva Art: During the period 6 more annotated records were prepared on the topic. Now the total number of the records is 221.
- 2. An annotated Bibliography on Masks: During the period 4 more entries were prepared on the topic. Now the total number of the entries is 259. All records are put in the computer.

# Programme C: Cultural Archives

The Kalanidhi C comprises the Audio-Visual Unit and the cultural archives.

- 1. The Audio-Visual Unit documents the events and activities of IGNCA and produces programmes on the IGNCA's programmes on video and film format. The Audio-Visual Library of the Cultural Archives.
- 2. The Cultural Archives collects, preserves and documents personal collections and also original and reprographic materials related to Arts and Humanities.

#### 1. Kalātaranga

Since 26th January, 2002 IGNCA had been contributing regularly two hours of programme per week for "Kalātaraṅga" to DD-Bharati and the contribution was continued in the 2002-2003 financial year also. From 2nd April , 2002 to 27th February, 2003, 91 hours of programme were telecast on DD-Bharati. This is a major achievement of IGNCA since IGNCA has disseminated its ideology, perspectives and aesthetic endeavour through "Kalātaraṅga" on regular basis. Almost all our programmes were well appreciated and received good response from cross-section of public.

#### 2. In-house documentation

- (i) Vedic Chanting: In-depth documentation of the oral tradition of Vedas existing in four States of India viz Maharashtra, Tamil Nadu, Kerala and Karnataka was taken up. Based on this documentation six exclusive programmes were produced for telecast on DD-Bharati. In addition to this 100minutes trailer was made so as to submit it to UNESCO for consideration which was followed by three hours edited footage.
- (ii) Documentation of Hampi, Belur, Helabid and Shravanbegola: The detailed documentation of the World Heritage Sites of Hampi, Belur, Helabid and Shravanbegola was done. Six episodes of 30 minutes duration each were telecast on the DD-Bharati.
- (iii) Documentation of Mahāmastakābhiṣekam of Bhāhubali held at Karkala: The rare event Mahāmastakābhiśekam of Bhahubali held at Karkala, Costal Karnataka was documented in detail. In addition to this, IGNCA has done exclusive coverage of 1000 Pillars of Basadi of Mudabiduri and Jain monuments of Varanga and Venur.

#### 3. Commissioned Programmes

- i. The Legacy of Tana Bhagat Part II: The role of Tana Bhagat in eradication of social evils among the tribes of Jharkhand region is highlighted in this episode.
- ii. Behind the Mask, Part I&II (Arunachal Pradesh, Manipur, Mizoram and Sikkim): These audio-visual documentaries endeavour in-depth study on the ethnic culture, religion, folklore and artistic perspective behind the process of mask making in the various rural communities especially tribals in the North Eastern states like Arunachal Pradesh, Mizoram, Manipur and Sikkim. These programmes give details about the making of the mask and their historical, cultural, artistic attributes.
- iii. Fighting for Survival Urumi: Urumi is one of the most unusual lethal weapons known in the world. A dying art today, with few exponents who demonstrate their skills only at festive occasions and in the "Gurukuls" of south India, this is a weapon which is about to disappear in the haze of the legends that surrounds it.
- iv. Documentary on "Dakshina Kannada" The Land of Divine Mother: It is a film about the folk tradition of Karnataka which touches upon various traditional belief system.
- v. Documentary on Nāgamandala an ancient ritual of Nāga worship in Costal Karnataka: It revolves round a traditional celebration of Nāga worship in Dakshina Kannada. It touches upon the folk concept of serpent worship and its reflection at the theo-cultural level.

#### **Cultural Archives**

In the year 2002-2003 the Cultural Archives has been chiefly occupied with packing, shifting, unpacking and arrangement of materials in the new building complex at No.5, Dr. R.P. Road, New Delhi.

As such, no major projects could be taken up and the work of packing shifting of fragile archival objects and artefact continued.

Some routine work such as listing, accessioning, cataloguing, issuing of materials and making information and copies of archival articles etc. available were taken up simultaneously, alongwith the shifting work.

The following work was taken up in the year 2002-2003:

#### 1. Lance Dane Collection of Slides

(15735 Colour 35 mm. Slides)

350 catalogue cards were prepared. A balance of nearly 6500 slides remain to be catalogued. 1000 cards were checked and arranged.

# KALĀKOŚA

#### (Division of Research and Publication and Area Studies)

The Kalākośa investigates in the intellectual traditions connected with arts in their multi-layered and multi-disciplinary dimensions. As a principal Research and Publication Division of the Institution, it endeavors to place the arts within the integral framework of a cultural system, combining the textual with the oral, the visual with aural and theory with practice.

Keeping these objectives in view, the Division has

- a) identified primary concepts fundamental to the Indian world-view, which has permeated all disciplines and dimensions of life;
- b) specified primary textual source material hitherto unknown, unpublished or inaccessible for publication in the original languages with translation;
- c) spelled out a plan of publication of works of scholars and specialists who have been pioneers in comprehending the artistic traditions through a holistic vision, a cross-cultural approach and multi-disciplinary methodology; and
- d) has drawn up a draft plan for launching a programme of a 21 volume Encyclopaedic work on Arts under a special project.

The programmes of the Division are slated into the following broad categories:

# Programme 'A' Kalātattvakośa

(A series of fundamental concepts of the Indian arts)

The first programme, the Kalātattvakośa is a series of fundamental concepts of the Indian Arts. In consultation with eminent scholars, a list of about 250 terms occuring

in primary texts of several disciplines and seminal to the arts was prepared. Each concept has been investigated through primary texts of several disciplines to select a term having a core meaning with pervasive nature and yet has also developed different meanings. Through such a compilation, analysis and re-assembling, it is possible to reconstruct the intrinsic holistic nature of the Indian tradition and its essential inter-disciplinary approach. As mentioned in the earlier reports, the volume I of the Kalātattvakośa containing eight basic terms was published in 1988 and vol.II of the work dealing with sixteen terms relating to space and time was released in Marhc, 1992. The vol.III of the work on the theme of elements,  $Mah\bar{a}bh\bar{u}tas$  containing eight articles covering eight terms was published in 1997. During the year 1998-99 the vol.IV of Kalātattvakośa titled Manifestation of Nature: sṛṣṭ-vistāra, and it containing seven articles was released and presented to the Hon'ble President of India on 14th December, 1998.

During the year under report vol.V of the Kalātattvakośa was published in October 2002 under the title: Form/Shape - Ākāra/Ākṛtī. It contains the articles on ten terms viz. rekhā, ākāra-ākṛti, rūpa-pratirūpa, sakala-niṣkala, arca, mūrti, pratimā-pratikṛti, vigraha, bandha-pratibandha and prāsāda

Under this programme the revised and enlarged edition of the *Kalātattvakośa* vol.l was published under the title: *Pervasive Terms - Vyāpati* in 2001. A revised edition of the second volume was also brought out in 2003 under the title: Time-Space:Deja-Kala

The articles received for the vol.VI on the concepts of **Perception**: **Abhāsa** are at the editing stage. This volume will cover nine terms viz. **ābhāsa**, **chāyā-bimba-pratibimbha**, **sādzsya-sārūupya**, **avyakata-vyakta**, **pada**, **linga-cihna**, **vṛtti-rīti-pravṛtti** and **anukṛti-anukaraṇa-anukīrtaṇa**.

The on-going work of the preparation of reference cards for the Kalātattvakośa project continued further as per routine.

# Programme 'B' Kalāmūlaśāstra

(A series of fundamental texts having bearing on the arts)

The second on-going and long-range programme of the Kalakosa Division is to identify fundamental texts related to the Indian arts ranging from architecture, sculpture and painting to music, dance and theatre and publish them in the series critically edited with annotations and translations.

Commencing with the release of a few publications in 1988-89, this division has already brought out 32 volumes upto March, 2002 under this series. During the period under reporting (2002-2003) the first volume of The *Caturdaṇḍiprakāśikā* of Venkatamakhin, a fundamental treatise on Karnataka music edited and translated by Dr. R. Sathyanarayan has been brought out. Also, two volumes of the

*Baudhāyanasrautasūtra*, a critical edition with English translation done by Prof. G.C. Kashikar was published and released in Vedic Samsodhan Mandala, Pune on 28th February, 2003 by Dr. L.M.Singhvi.

# Programme 'C' Kalāsamālocana

(A series of analytical and interpretative writings on the arts)

The Kaāsamālocana Programme of the Kalākośa Division of the IGNCA relates to publications on critical writings on different facets of the arts and aesthetics. While one part of the series concentrates on works of eminent scholars who have dwelt upon the fundamental concepts, identified perennial sources and created bridges of communication by juxtaposing diverse traditions; the other part deals with revision and re-arranged editions and translations of a selected number of eminent authors and their works. The most important part of this programme is to bring out the Collected Works of Dr. Ananda K. Coomaraswamy, re-organised thematically and with the author's authentic revisions, edited by eminent scholars, in about 30 volumes.

Starting with the publication of a couple of volumes in 1988, as many as 45 books have been published under this programme till date. During the period under review, the following publications have been brought out:

Under Ananda K. Coomaraswamy series the following publications are expected to be published soon :

Lastly, under the Selected Letters Series, the volume entitled *Hazari Prasad Dwivedi Ke Patra*, had been published in 1994(in Hindi). Now the publication of the *Selected Letters of Banarsidass Chaturvedi* compiled and edited by Sh. Narayan Dutt is in press.

# Programme 'D' History of Arts

# 1. Metaphors in Indian Arts

The project seeks to investigate in detail some of the basic concepts of Indian Arts which have not only influenced it but have also lent it a special form of its own. The work has been already done on two metaphors 'Bija' (seed) and 'purusa' (human being). The first volume is ready for press and final shape is being given to the second volume.

# 2. Glossary of Key Art terms

The work gives details in form of Sanskrit quotations on some of the principal premises of Indian culture and thought. It is ready in raw form and is being revised.

#### 3. Numismatic Arts of India

The project has already been completed. The whole material is available in eight volumes. The final CRC is being prepared under the supervision of Prof. B.N. Mukherjee in Calcutta. Publication is planned in the next financial year.

#### Programme 'E' Area Studies

Under the Area Studies programme of IGNCA, Kalāskośa Division focuses attention on some specific cultural areas with which India has had a close and active interaction viz., South-East Asia, East Asia, Central Asia etc. The progress in this field during 2002-2003 is given as under:

#### **East Asian Studies**

In the reporting year the unit has done the following work:

1. It organised an International Seminar on 'Xuanzang and the Silk Route' in IGNCA from 17th - 19th January, 2003. This seminar was held in collaboration with the Department of Culture, the Nava Nalanda Maha Vihara and the Somaiya Centre of Buddhist studies, Mumbai. The seminar was inaugurated by Prof. L.M. Singhavi, Hon'ble President of IGNCA. The guest of honour was H.E. Mosood Khalili, Ambassador of Afghanistan in India. The Seminar was attended by eminent scholars from China, Russia, Belgium, Canada, USA and India. An exhibition on the 'Art of Afghanistan' was also arranged in IGNCA on this occasion. Xuanzang visited Afghanistan and left a vivid description of Colossal Buddhas of Bamiyam.

Further, the Proceedings of the Seminar are in publication process.

#### South East Asian Studies

#### I. Publications:

- (i) The Iconography of Avalokitesvara in Mainland South East Asia by Nandana Chutiwongs was published.
- (ii) The Art of South East Asia edited by Bachchan Kumar is at the final stage of publication.

# II. Research Papers:

Following two research papers were prepared during the period by Dr.Bachchan Kumar:

- (i) "Mahisasuramardini in the Art of Indonesia" presented at the International Conference on Indonesian Art organised by IGNCA from 4th to 6th March, 2003.
- (ii) "Pagodas in Vietnam: A Study of Architectural Development" presented at the International Seminar on Cultural Interface of India with South-South-East and East Asia (Religion, Art and Architecture) organised by National Museum Institute in collaboration with ICCR from 6th to 10th March, 2003.

# III. Organisation of the Conference:

This unit organised an International Conference on Indonesian Art from 4th to 6th March, 2003 in IGNCA, New Delhi. The Embassy of the Republic of Indonesia partly collaborated in this project. Besides India, distinguished scholars from Australia, Germany, Indonesia, the Netherlands, Sri Lanka, Thailand and United Kingdom participated in the Conference and presented their respective research papers. During the three days Conference, a total number of twenty-eight papers were presented in six academic sessions.

#### Organisation of Exhibition

I. An Exhibition on "Art and Culture of Indonesia" in collaboration with the Embassy of the Republic of Indonesia, New Delhi was organised from 5th to 30th March, 2003.

#### Supervision of Ph.D. Students

Following research scholars of the Department of Buddhist Studies, University of Delhi, are working for their Ph.D thesis under the supervision and guidance of Dr. Bachchan Kumar and their research are at the advance stage under following topics:

#### Slavic and Central Asian Studies

This unit was established in order to facilitate the study of historical interaction between Central Asia (Russia) and India. It has been attempting to collect significant research and reference material from outside India on the subject.

IGNCA has an agreement with INION, Moscow, under the Cultural Exchange Programme to order microfiches of research material. INION is the Institute of Scientific Information of the Russian Academy of Sciences and their library is the Library of the Academy and one of the world's great repositories of microfiches. 670 microfiches were received from INION as a part of this collaboration.

Digitization of Uzbekistan Historical Archives: The historical archives selected by Prof. Madhavan K. Palat at Tashkent (on a programme supported by the Ministry of External Affairs) are being digitized at IGNCA. Approximately 1,50,000 sheets have been scanned and digitized so far.

# JANAPADA SAMPADA

(Division of Life-style Studies and Research on Regional Cultures)

Janapada Sampadā Division deals with research and documentation on the contextual aspects of culture including life style, traditions, folklore and art practices of communities, from eco-cultural, socio-economic points of view. Concentrating on the oral traditions, it has a wide canvas covering regional studies from a multi-disciplinary perspective emphasizing the inter-relationships between different cultural groups and communities. The activities pertaining to this division are: (A) Ethnographic Collection (B) Multimedia Presentation and Events (C) Life Style Studies under which there are two programmes: (1) Loka Parampara and (2) Kshetra Sampada and (D) Heritage Studies.

# A: Ethnographic Collection

# 1. Digital Documentation

- a. 650 masks were digested for the production of the CD Rom on masks.
- b. Work on digitization of Puppets for the CD Rom was initiated and 350 puppets have been digitized during the period.
- c. Data of 45 items of chikankārī textiles were fed into computer.

A list of Officers, Research fellows as on 31st March, 2003, is appended as Annexure III and IV.

# B. Services and Supply

The Service and supply Unit continued to extend logistic and related support to the Academic Divisions of IGNCA. It helped in making arrangements for several National and International Seminars, Workshops and Exhibitions during the year. It also maintained coordination with the concerned Ministeries/Departments and other organisations for the smooth and efficient functioning of the Centre.

#### C. Branch Offices

Varanasi: Set up in 1988, the Branch office at Varanasi continued to function as a unit of the Kalākośa Division with a group of employees and researchers under the Hony. Coordinator and carried out its acitivities and data collection for IGNCA's projects with the help of experts besides organising of lectures, workshops etc.

**Guwahati:** The Guwahati unit of IGNCA established in 2000 as field station is functioning under the Hony. Coordinator.

# D. Regional Office

The Southern Regional Centre of IGNCA was opened on 24th July, 2001, by H.E. Shri Anant Kumar, Minister of Tourism and Culture.

Shri P.V. Krishna Bhatt the member of IGNCA Trust has been nominated as coordinator of the regional centre.

# **ACCOUNTS AND FINANCE**

Audit of IGNCA was awarded by Govt. of India to the Director General of Audit, Central Revenue, from 1995-96 onwards. A special team of DGACR had audited the Accounts of IGNCA from 1995-96 to 1998-1999 (four years) in the first instance and had suggested some amendments to be made in these accounts.

As suggested by the DGACR the Annual Accounts for the period from 1995-96 to 1998-99 (four years) have been revised and sent to them for necessary certification. A team from DGACR has audited the revised accounts and sent a reply to the effect that they have accepted these accounts but did not issue any certification. The matter is being pursued with them to issue the certificate of Audit in respect of the above accounts.

DGACR has also audited the accounts of IGNCA upto financial year 2000-2001 in the year 2002-2003 but the audit certificate has not been issued by them, since the certificate on revised accounts is still pending with them.

The Government of India have issued notifications extending the following benefits/concessions to the Centre:-

- i. The income of the Trust has been exempted from income tax upto the assessment year 2001-2002 to 2003-2004 under Section 10(23)(c)(iv) of the Income Tax Act vide Notification No.76/2001 (F.No.197/39/2001-ITA-I) dated 21st March, 2001. IGNCA has further applied for renewal of the exemption from 2004-2005 to 2006-2007 and the notification in this connection is still awaited from the Director of Income Tax, CBDT.
- ii. The Trust has been notified an Institution under Section 35(i)(iii) of the Income Tax Act vide notification No.281/2003(F.No.203/29/2002-ITA-II) dated 7.11.2003 for the period 1.4.2000 to 31.3.2003. By issue of such notification, any sum paid to this Centre for research in social sciences will be allowed as deduction on the income of the donor under the said Section of Income Tax Act, a prelude to this exemption under Income Tax Act, Ministry of Science & Technology has granted their recognition to this Institution under Rule 6 of the Income Tax Rule, 1962. Their recognition also entitled the Centre to avail of exemption from custom duty on import and facilitates the import procedure. IGNCA has further applied for renewal of Recognition from 1.4.2003 to 31.3.2006 and the notification in respect of the exemption is awaited from Department of Revenue, CBDT.
- iii. The capital gains to individuals on sale of any work of art, manuscript, drawing, painting, photograph, print, etc. to IGNCA have been exempted from Income Tax upto the assessment year 2001-2002 to 2004-2005 under Section 47(ix) of Income Tax Act vide Government of India, Ministry of Finance (Department of Revenue) Notification 11375 (no.207/1/97-ITA-II) dated 24th May, 2000).
- iv. Any donation to the Centre by individual qualifies upto 50% for rebate from Income Tax under Section 80(G) of the Income Tax Act. This exemption has been granted to the IGNCA upto 31.3.2005 vide Director of Income Tax (Exemptions) letter no.DIT(E)/2001-2002/I-379/1997 dated 17.1.2002.

#### F. Housing:

The main office of the Centre continues to function in the Central Vista Mess (C.V. Mess) and No.3, Dr. Rajendra Prasad Road, New Delhi. The C.V. Mess Building continues to make available office space to accommodate various Divisions and Units. The new building at No.5, Dr. Rajendra Prasad Road was completed and inaugurated by Hon. Prime Minister Shri Atal Bihari Vajpayee on 19th November, 2001.

# G. Fellowship Scheme:

Indira Gandhi Memorial Fellowship: With a view to providing an opportunity to eminent and exceptionally talented individuals to devote themselves with freedom to creative critical work in the areas of the arts, humanities and culture, IGNCA has instituted a scheme of Memoral Fellowships in the name of Smt. Indira Gandhi. The Fellowships are open to scholars and creative artists from any discipline who undertake creative projects or research work of a multidisciplinary, inter-disciplinary and cross-cultural nature. The applicants must have a proven record of creative or critical work which does not confine itself to narrow field of pure academic nature. The Fellows shall have complete freedom to work at places of their choice within India. The number of fellowships given at any time is not more than six. The Fellowships carry a monthly stipend of Rs12,000/-, besides for secretarial assistance, contingent and travel expenses for a period of two years.

The Fellowship was instituted in the year 1996 and was awarded to famous Marathi and English writer Shri Dilip Chitre of Pune. In 1997, it was granted to two well-known personalities, Ustad R. Fahimuddin Dagar, a famous traditional musician and Prof. K. Ayappa Panikar, reputed writer in English and Malayalam. In 1988, two deserving scholars Dr.(Mrs.) Padma M. Sarangpani of Bangalore an Anthropologist and Prof. Bambang Sunarto, an Indonesian musician, were awarded the Fellowship. In 1999, two illustrious scholars, Prof. K.S. Bahera, Prof. of History, Utkal University, Bhubaneswar and Prof. Nalini Madhav Thakur of the School of Planning and Architecture, New Delhi were selected for the award of Fellowship. In 2000, the Fellowship was awarded to two renowned scholars, Prof.D.D. Sharma of Uttarakhand and Prof. S.N. Goswami from the North East. For the year 2001, the three Fellowships were awarded to Prof. Sunita Jain, Prof. Gopi Chand Narang and Dr. R. Satyanarayan. The subjects of the Projects are "Indian Poet Painter Study, 1900-2000"; "A critical study of Kekterar's first even grammer of Hindustani and its relevance to present day Hindi and Urdu and "Investigation into creativity in Indian Music" respedtively.

# Short term research project scheme:

No new assignment given.

IGNCA has established "Short term Project Scheme to benefit young scholars and mid career professionals interested in undertaking research on Indian Art, Humanities,

Folklore and other Multidisciplinary area and interest to IGNCA. The Centre plans to institute six projects grants every year from different disciplines of study.

#### Other Research Projects:

Vedic Chanting: IGNCA Prepared candidature file on Oral Tradition of Vedas and Vedic Chanting for submission to UNESCO, Paris for 2nd Proclamation of Oral and Intangible Heritage, UNESCO. IGNCA has received US \$ 18000 for preparing the candidature file.

ABIA Programme: IGNCA Initiated the project Annotated Bibliography of Indian Archaeology (ABIA), an International project of the compilation of bibliographical data on Indian arts, architecture and archaeology. Under the programme, the Office Editor, ABIA from Sri Lanka came to IGNCA and trained IGNCA's ABIA team for collaborating on the project.

National Mission for Manuscripts: IGNCA is in the process of launching a National Mission for Manuscripts in IGNCA. It has prepared the Project document and CD in English & Hindi for the Mission.

- Text Entry and composing of 4 books and articles on various themes are over.
- Text Entry of new books: Varanasi Vaibhav, Mithila Vaibhav, and Braj vaibhav and Documentation report on Kabir in Uttarakhand, etc. is going on.
- Over 2000 pages (Hindi and some text in English) have been composed in Web pages. (4 Books, Articles, Devanarayan prose, Agra and Fatehpur Sikri (English and Hindi), Jataka Stories (English), and text from Braj, Varanasi, Mithila etc.)
- Over 2050 Digital Images have been linked in Digital Library accessible through Database (ACSAA Collection, Rock Art, Mask, Jataka; Agra & Fatehpur Sikri, Devanarayan, Udai Shankar etc.)
- Over 1 hr. 30 min. Audio and 20 min. Video has been incorporated.
- 5-6 Multimedia Authoring Tools are being prepared to be used and shared by COIL-Net Project Members, the same will be linked in IGNCA web site also. (View images by Thumbnails, Zoom Tool, Hot Spot Viewer, Cognitive Map, Slides show, etc.)

# Indian Society of Technical Education (ISTE)

Proposal submitted to Department of Space. Proposed duration three years. Outlay Rs.14.17 lakhs. Awaiting for the reply.

# **Building Project**

The Indira Gandhi National Centre for the Arts(IGNCA) Building Project, after having traversed a complex and difficult path, which is common in such projects, has now made a visible presence in the Central Vista of the Capital with the inauguration of its first building component - Kalā Nidhi, Kalā Kośa, Shared Resources 'A' - in November

2001 by the Hon'ble Prime Minister of India. After the inauguration, process of shifting of various units of IGNCA to the new building was taken up and some of the Divisions such as the Cultural Archives, the Library, had already been moved to the new building and started operating from there.

Though the Building has been completed to the extent of 90-95% with all the support services installed, facilitating IGNCA to start functioning from it without any hindrance, still works to the extend of 5-10% are pending to be completed which could not be taken up in absence of release of funds from the Government.

The next group of building comprises Sūtradhāra. Underground Parking 'B', Janapada Sampadā, Exhibition Galleries, Museum and Residential Block. After the statutory approval of the Building Plans submitted for these set of buildings was received from the Local Authorities, Sūtradhāra building was taken up for physical construction in 1999. The work on this two level basement building is suspended at its foundation stage for more than two years now in line, with the decision taken to stop further construction on this building till further funds are received from the Government. To save the construction already carried out, round the clock pumping of sub-soil water is continuing by the contractor.

While disbanding the Building Project Committee (BPC), the Executive Committee of IGNCA Trust in its 26th meeting held on 18th April 2002, constituted a four-member Sub-Committee to monitor and advise the EC/Trust in respect of issues connected with the IGNCA Building Project.

In view of financial stringency, a decision has been taken to close down as many contracts as are possible on 'As is where is' basis. The Sub-committee constituted by the Executive Committee deliberated upon the issue in its various meetings and as a result could be able to finalize 28 contracts out of the total 35.

With the closure of a number of contracts on 'As is where is basis', the Estate Management Unit (EMU) of IGNCA is in the process of taking over the new building.
